HISTORY OF DANCE-O-RAMA

The growth of Western round and square dancing in the Rochester area is reflected in the history of the annual Dance-O-Rama.

On April 18, 1959, four Western square dance clubs banded together to sponsor the first co-operative endeavor known as Dance-O-Rama. Since then it has become an annual event with eight round and square dance clubs participating under the sponsorship of the Rochester Area Federation.

Each year between five and six hundred people have gathered together to shuffle and strut their stuff to a skilled stable of callers. The event offers an opportunity to mingle with old friends and make new acquaintances.

Cutler Union was the scene of the first Dance-O-Rama and it has been continually used down thru the years.

The program format has had little change since its origin. There has been two halls of simultaneous dancing; one to satisfy those who enjoy club level dancing and one for the "busters" who call out "let that hammer down."

The 1962 Dance-O-Rama added two national callers to the staff and this year's committee has done the same.

Do you remember the anticipation and excitement of YOUR first Dance-O-Rama??? Let's encourage all our new members to join this year's event.

In the evening we danced at Victoria Hall with the English, American and Canadian GI's. Next night we attended a show at the Palladium. During the day we toured the beautiful countryside, saw Oxford University, Shakespeare country, Warwick Castle, Westminster Abbey etc.

After three days in London, we headed for Paris. As usual, toured and saw as much as three days would permit. We went by bus to a school and danced with our own and Canadian GI's as well as some government workers. One night we saw the Follies Bergere. Charlie said "Oui la la" while I nearly lost my breath.

On to Germany where we danced with more GI's in Heidelberg Castle. Three days in Wiesbaden and three in Munich and then to Lucerne, Switzerland.

Our hotel room overlooking Lake Lucerne was fabulous. The Swiss mountain scenery, with the quaint homes and cowbells tinkling, was very beautiful. We danced at our hotel with the Swiss people who put on a folk dance for us.

CLUBS IN REVIEW---SWINGIN' EIGHTS

It was at Summerville Presbyterian Church, in September of 1958, that a tall, slender red-head dressed in western clothes and sporting a badge which read "Tink" Tinkler, spoke to a group of people interested in doing some square dancing, Western Style. This meeting was the result of the combined efforts of Al and Jane Manning, who had a taste of the Western Style when Tink, called some dances for Summerville's Couples Club; Russ and Doris Jenkins from Lakeside Presbyterian Church and Bill and Inez Boyd just returned from California where they were exposed to this more refined type of square dancing.

By word of mouth and through Church announcements, news spread fast that there would be a square dance at Summerville Church. The first night twelve squares filled the hall and after three open dances, there were enough couples to form a club. We danced twice a month with Tink as our caller. Al and Jane Manning guided us through the beginning months. In March of 1959 the first election was held with the Mannings carrying on as President.

A move to Iroquois School came in the fall of 1960 when the Swingin' Eights went under the sponsorship of the Irondequoit Recreation Commission. The first beginners class was held at Seneca School with Tink as instructor. . . . now meets every Tuesday night at Hosea Rogers School due to the remodeling at Seneca.

The Club still meets on the 1st and 3rd Saturdays of each month and has two or three National Callers a year. Round dancing has always been a part of the program and in September 1962, Mike and Mary Prado were added as instructors.

The past presidents have been: Al & Jane Manning, Bill & Inez Boyd, Jim & Pat Palmer and Bud & Fran Macomber. Our newly elected presidents for 1963 are Earl & Bonnie Stafford.

The Swingin' Eights conclude their season with a dinner party and trail end dance for members only. It is the highlight of the year with dancing to the calls of our own "Dearie".

5-8 Apart, Draw; Together, (to Butterfly) Touch; Roll, 2;3,4,(to Sem-Closed):

9-12 Fwd Two-Step; Fwd Two-Step; Turn Away, 2; Together,2(to Semi-Closed);

13-16 Repeat action of Meas. 9-12

17-20 Step Fwd, Point Fwd; Step Bwd,Point Bwd; Fwd-Two Step; Fwd Two-Step;

21-24 Repeat action of Meas. 17-20.

25-28 Step, Kick; (Turn In) Step, Kick; (Face) Swd Two-Step; Swd Two-Step;

29-32 Bend, Chug; Bend, Chug; Walk, 2; 3, 4 (to Semi-Closed);
