CLUBS IN REVIEW.....

EKC-0 SQUARES

Late in 1960, an article about Western Square Dancing in an industrial publication caught the eye of Kodak's Cap Carroll. With the subsequent help of another Kodaker (who prefers to remain anon) arrangements were made for Don Duffin to teach a mid-season class at Kodak Auditorium. Promotional efforts netted a total of 9 people the first night, Jan. 9, 1961.

Rollaway members on two occasions came to dance, demonstrate and encourage the building up of that first, small nucleus. Howard Baglin and Ralph Weber held the group together until members got to know each other. Then, spirited voting netted the name EKC-0 Squares, suggested by Sue and Pat Borrelli: Joe Walker was named president, Ed Fox veep, and Mary Peters sec-treasurer to see us thru the growing pains of a club banner, badges, and our own weekly news publication.

Don Duffin taught the new class on Monday nights and Joe Reilly called to the club on Wednesday nights in the second year. During Joe's illness, Danny Dedo and Art Harris filled in to keep us from going down the sewer.

In 1961, Ed Fox became president and the club expanded to include all Kodak Plants in the city. Bernie Boulet and Mary Peters served briefly as officers with Howard Ducker and John Welch completing the unexpired terms, assisted by two board members. Carl Presgrave represented the beginner group. Ed's energetic program of booking national callers is still being enjoyed by our dancers.

We sponsored summer national caller dances in our 35-square air-conditioned hall, receiving the welcome support of many Rochester clubs and dancers. Acceptance into the Federation saw Doris and Chuck Rademaker and Ruth and Ralph Weber as our club delegates.

Year three started off with Howard Ducker, Carl Presgrave and Gloria Hipp ably assisted by Earl Pike and Ray Brayer as our leaders. Joe Reilly took the teaching chore and alternated Wednesdays with Art Harris for club dancing. The club meets every Wednesday night, 8 till 10:30, Sept. thru May. All club functions, without exception, are open as is our membership.

PROMENADER SALUTES RCA

Altho this is not the final issue of your subscription year, we do wind up our official "season" with this issue and it is apparent that the trend of thought in our club articles, etc. is one of retrospect and "Auld Lang Syne".

Thus, we feel tribute due the members of the Rochester Callers' Association. The RCA has come a long way.

The success of our local group is due largely to the Swinging 8's club which was the first to invite the original, small nucleus of amateurs to call for them on a regular basis. The 8's set up one extra night a month for the amateurs to call and appointed George Kerridge as general chairman of the program, with Bob Didier, Myron Huss, Jim Palmer and Earl Stafford as mainstays of the group.

It was the expressed opinion of this group, as well as their supporters, that an organized caller group was essential to the growth of Rochester area dancing. The first organizational meeting with 10 couples attending was held at the Didier home, Bob & Dot Brunshidle were chairman, Myron & Peg Huss were vice-chairman, Mike and Mary Prado were secretary-treasurer. A constitution was set up and ratified and the Echo Club was available as their regular meeting place.

Tink Tinkler serves as program chairman of the caller workshops. Prados and Principes handle the round dance workshops and helped to set up an area wide agreement on 4 round dances to be featured by all member clubs together.

Thus it has been that the RCA has grown thru its own bootstraps and now this organization is certain of continued support by our local clubs, many of whom have sponsored these callers into their programs.

We salute the Swinging 8's for the impetus in getting the group started, we salute the RCA members for their skills and ambitions to call the turns for our area dancers!

HOW TO GET THERE FROM HERE

To those who wish to visit the Grand Square Club of Lima and dance with them during their summer program at The Barn in East Bloomfield, we issue the following instructions, courtesy of Dick Holmes, the club secretary.

Go to East Bloomfield via Routes 5 & 20 and at the four corners, turn south. As you near a Y in the road (less than a mile from the turn) take the left fork, the Barn is the first place on the right.

It's sort of like a square dance call, "go right, then left and right, and there you are".

HAPPY CANADIAN DANCERS
