## BEGINNERS BEGIN

Federation clubs have now organized their classes and the beginners are in full swing. The response this year has been fairly satisfactory. All in all about 38 sets will be taught this season -- this is "par for the course" and speaks well for the officers and their committees.

The Belles 'N Beaus tried something new this year in offering a cash prize to the member who brought in the most beginners. The innovation seemed to help for the club ended up with 7 sets. Myron Huss has taken over Art Harris' job while he is recuperating from a recent operation.

A newcomer among instructors is Chuck Prister, an EKC-0 Square member, who is doing a good job with his 4 sets at the Irondequoit Squares.

"Tink" Tinkler has been coerced out of retirement to instruct for his first love, the Swingin' Eights. Four sets usually show every Tuesday night at Hosea Rogers School.

The Country Twirlers are running the B's 'N B's a close second with 6 sets of beginners. Bob Brunshidle is again instructing the Twirlers as well as the Boots 'N Slippers, an up and coming new club from out Hilton way, who have put 5 sets on the floor.

Out at the Barn in Henrietta, the Genesee Dancers, with veteran Don Duffin calling, have only 5 sets. However, they are entitled to an off year -- the past three classes have contributed an average of 10 sets to the area's square dancing movement.

Joe Reilly is doing his customary able job for the EKC-0 Squares at the Kodak auditorium. Five sets have enrolled so far this

year.

Lima Grand Squares, with Don Stumbo instructing, has only 2 sets at the present writing but expect more within the month.

Several non-federation clubs, Don Pratt's Friendship Squares and Bill Bartsch's Scottsville Stars, have classes but they are not overcrowded.

Again, hats off to the club officers and their committees for a job well done.

A LETTER

To the Editors, PROMENADER:

"This letter is in reply to the question asked of the Irondequoit Squares why they have only 20 lessons (60 hours) in the beginners group. The following are our own opinions and may not necessarily reflect those of the other club members.

First: We cannot expect that each club run on the same policies. Each club under Federation rule has freedom to do as they see fit. It reflects the individualities and feelings of its members and still keeps the dignity in square dancing. This is born out by the large number of clubs in the area of varying "levels" of dancing.

Second: It seems that each year more lessons are added to bring the graduates up to "level". We believe that 20 well designed lessons are adequate for membership in our club where fun, friendship and relaxation prevail. It is our personal experience that lessons in excess of 20 and the worry of level has only succeeded in scaring away people from the movement. Furthermore, it is an imposition to require people to attend a long lesson session. This is our form of progress in offering an evening's entertainment to more people."

We would welcome any comments.

The Square Dancers International Club flew non-stop to Long Beach, Calif. The first day was used for sight seeing in the Los Angeles area--Farmer's Market, Grauman's Chinese Theater, Dodge's Stadium. That evening, a parade started the National Square Dance activities. Most of the states had beautiful floats in the parade. Too bad New York was not represented. We spent 3 days at the Convention. The Arena housed 3 floors of squares but the round dancing and discussion groups had to meet at other nearby buildings. The weather was good for walking. Colorful clothes, excellent demonstrations--especially by the teen-agers, lots of dancing, interesting square dance shops. The Toe Stompers were SDI's sponsoring club. Friday eve they treated us to an elaborate after party. Excellent dancing to 2 callers, Hawaiian lunch and Polynesian floor show.

Later, in Honolulu, we were greeted with a lei of orchids, kissed by an Island girl, given pineapple juice and then entertained by dancing girls. ## EVERYTHING FOR THE SQUARE DANCER

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### GENESEE DANCERS

Recently we came across a list of suggestions on how to be a good square dancer--perhaps some of you haven't seen them.

- 1-Be a good listener. Remember your "quarterback" caller has to get his signals across to you. LISTENING really is the most important thing in square dancing.
- 2-Adapt yourself quickly to the fundamentals and become well grounded.
- 3-Be friendly. Welcome newcomers into your set and, if possible, introduce yourselves before you start dancing. Dance with someone different each night and don't stick to your special friends.
- 4-Cooperate. You have the best time when each individual does his part on the team.
- 5-Practice-Practice-Practice until the movements become automatic.
- 6-Get sets formed early. Don't hold up the show.
- 7-Take it easy. Don't overdo. Avoid the skipping and running and learn to slide your feet and relax as you dance.
- 8-Have fun. The prime purpose of square dancing is to enjoy yourself.

Do you remember the 1960 Dance-O-Rama? George and Marian Kerridge were chairman --Lew and Ruth Dietz were publicity chairman and it was one of the best.

"Dancing Through The Years" put on by Bea Westwaters' Teen Twirlers provided delightful entertainment. Authentic costumes were made or borrowed for the young people as they illustrated the most popular types of dancing in the U.S. from 1650-1960.

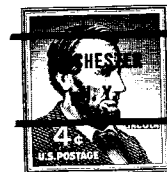
