"TRIGGERS" JOINS FEDERATION

At a meeting held October 27, 1964 in Cutler Union, the Triggers Square Dance Club was unanimously accepted as a member of the Federation. This makes a total of eleven clubs that now belong to the Rochester Area Federation of Western Round and Square Dance Clubs.

Among the other matters acted on at this time by the Board of Delegates were:

A proposed amendment, authorizing and approving (by a majority vote of the Board) any and all financial obligations incurred by any committee or committee member on behalf of the Federation, was defeated by a 10 to 5 vote.

A discussion of the number of lessons for beginner classes resulted in a motion (carried) that the delegates abide by the Constitution and not interfere in the internal affairs of member clubs. Also, the subject of caller fees was decided to be a club function.

The acceptance of Teen Dancers' Clubs as members of the Federation was discussed. As there was no clear understanding of their operation, the consensus of opinion was that the Federation not accept Teen Dancers' Clubs for membership at the present time.

Changing the date of future Dance-O-Ramas was considered. However, no serious proposals developed.

Reference was made to a recent letter of Bill Bartsch, president of RCA, concerning square dance problems in the area. General opinion suggested inviting Mr. Bartsch to a future meeting, at which time, he might be allowed to present any concrete proposals that could help alleviate these square dance difficulties.

TRIGGERS

January 1963, Myron Huss opened the first beginners class in Bethany Church. Four couples responded with another couple joining half-way thru.

December 17, 1963, Myron graduated his first class after 31 lessons and founded the Triggers with Bill & Myrtle Wiley, president, Bob & Barb Patchin, vice-president, Bill & Sandie Tacy, secretary, Bob & Ruth Muir, treasurer and Charlie & Millie Tacy, directors. Incidentally, the Patchins came up with the name "Triggers".

January, 1964 saw a class of nine couples start their dancing with Myron. They graduated Sept. 8, after having 32 lessons and with the addition of two more couples, brought the present membership to 16 couples.

During the summer of 1964, the charter members drew up existing By-Laws. In September the club moved into the Longridge School located on Longridge Avenue off Wildwood Drive. Every Tuesday is dance night; Peg Huss teaches Rounds from 8 to 8:30 and Myron calls till 10:30. Visitors are always welcome.

LETTER TO THE EDITORS

This letter is an unsolicited reply to the letter by Paul and Anne Mutter which appeared in the last issue of PROMENADER defending 20 lessons for the beginners of the Irondequoit Squares.

The Federation was set up to benefit all square dancers in the Rochester Area, and its representatives are chosen by each club for their interest in square dancing and their willingness to give of their time to make square dancing more enjoyable for everyone involved.

If these representatives concur that 30 lessons or more will yield the most adequate dancers, then every club should abide by their decision. This is a case where the will of the majority of the Federation members will benefit the majority of dancers. Perfection in dancing is not necessary but competence is. This is similar to any school or work situation.

Square dancing is analogous to piano playing. You may know what to do after 20 lessons, but being technically able to do it is another thing. Only practice and repetition will improve a persons reaction time and make them able to take direction quickly and accurately.

Everyone picks up Western square dancing at a different speed and 30 lessons per club just assures us of more happy club members. Persons who feel successful at this endeavor are less likely to drop out of the class or club.

When I was a beginner and early club member, there were "Be kind to Eddie" nites --and my light slowly dawned. I am now comfortable in any company - and we've stayed with it 6 years.

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HAWAII CALLS

Note: This is the conclusion of the report of a trip to the recent National Convention plus a trip to Hawaii by Fred and June Krasselt, sponsored by Square Dancers International Club.

The tourist trade is Hawaii's number one business. Prices of imported items are higher but food, as an average, is about the same as in Rochester. The average house is slightly smaller; land is expensive.

We toured the Honolulu area and around the Island of Oahu, seeing the principal buildings, the Punch Bowl which is a war memorial cemetery in a volcano crater, fields of pineapple and sugar cane, banana trees, coconut palms and huge banyan trees. We visited the Dole pineapple plant, a perfume factory and a woodcarving factory. We also saw Pearl Harbor, the Arizona memorial and other evidence of that fateful Dec. 7, 1941.

We enjoyed a "luau", the Hawaiian feast with all its ceremony and pig wrapped in ti leaves, chicken, taru, abalone, poi, yams, baked bananas, seaweed, coconut milk pudding and other foods. Then followed entertainment, singing and dancing island style with a flaming sword dance.

The Hawaiians are a mixture: Chinese, Japanese, Korean, Tahitian, etc. We ate with chopsticks at the famous Lau Yee Chai Chinese restaurant. There was swimming in the ocean, the Kodak sponsored Hula Show, shopping at the International Market Place with a nightly Polynesian show.

Then there was the flight back to San Francisco to fog and cold weather. We danced at Bob Page's Calico Squares where John Barbour was guest caller--an excellent dance.

We toured around the area to see the Golden Gate Bridge, Alcatraz, Muir Woods--the giant redwood forest, ate at Fisherman's Wharf, rode the famous cable cars and had a very busy time.

It was a vacation long to be remembered.
