No doubt you observed that our group consists of geriatrics and it is very difficult at times to get them to take part in any feature which requires exertion; I was watching a couple of the more elderly men who, I was afraid, might collapse from too much exercise as they were very feeble, I asked one of them if he would like to sit down for awhile and although he was trembling like a leaf, he said, "Oh, No!" That was a great compliment to the girl who was his partner.

Thank you all for helping with the singing. It was a delightful evening. Please convey our thanks to the other members of your troupe. We all hope you will come again soon.
