## 1966 DANCE-O-RAMA

Devotees of Western Square Dancing and of Rochester's own spectacular DANCE-O-RAMA are probably no doubt anxiously awaiting news of the 8th such adventure in this area's square dance history.

The committee, headed by Chairman Lou and Lillian Stork and Co-Chairman Ambrose and Dorothy Baker, have brushed the cobwebs off the crystal ball and revealed to us the following information concerning this event.

The sliding and stomping of many feet will shake the timbers of BISHOP KEARNEY HIGH SCHOOL on April 16, 1966 from 2 P.M. until 12 M. with chow being served from 5 to 7. The gym here provides for 9,000 square feet of good tile floor and the cafeteria 7500 sq. ft. of Terazzo floor.

The dancers will be able to refuel in the school cafeteria which is capable of seating 600 at one sitting. Facilities provide for two separate lines to hurry the dishing up of the chow.

And now the answer to the question that is on everyone's tongue now that the answer is here on the place. Who are the MEN behind the mike? There will be stampeding to get tickets with this year's roster that the callers' committee has come up with

They are George Jaybush from Loraine, Ohio; Earle Park, our neighbor from way across the border, Yorktown, Saskatchewan; Curley Custer from Hagerstown, Maryland; and Bob Norton from Mason, Michigan. Each one will provide a wide range of dancing style and content as only they can do in their own individual way of calling.

They tell us there will be plenty of space at the school to halter our horses while we are "sliding thru-casting off-starring thru - etc." In fact there is room for about 1000 of those "critters" we get around in now.

So polish up the boots, starch up the petticoats, stitch up all the new dresses while the committee spurs itself on toward the preparation of the greatest DANCE-O-RAMA ever.

## QUICKIE WORKSHOP

TRADE - From any line, made up of dancers facing any direction, those designated by the call (men, ladies, ends, centers, heads, sides, etc.) will trade places in the same line by walking forward and around in a half circle, to end facing the opposite direction in the position just vacated.  
WAVE THRU - From a half, three quarter or full square thru (or more) follow the same directions as a square thru. On taking the final hand, instead of pulling by, retain the hand hold, join hands in a line four ready to balance forward and back.
