IN MEMORIAM

George W. Kerridge passed away Sunday, Mar. 13, 1966 in Strong Memorial Hospital. He had been hospitalized with a blood disease since August of 1965.

Surviving are his widow, Marion E.; a son, Guy; and a brother, Jack, of Chicago.

George was an employee of Eastman Kodak for 40 years. Since 1940, he had worked in the color photography division of the research laboratories.

A native of Worthing, England, he came to Rochester with his parents when he was nine years old.

George was always an active person. He was never satisfied to be a spectator. Tennis, hiking, bowling, swimming, golfing all had his interest.

About ten years ago, George and Marion were attracted to Western Square Dancing. They joined Genesee Dancers and later became Belles 'n Beaus. They were charter members of both Rollaways and Fiddle A Rounds.

George and Marion also enjoyed membership in several Buffalo clubs.

George was president of Genesee Dancers in 1960 and during that year was one of the founding fathers of our Rochester Area Federation. George served as General Chairman of Dance-O-Rama in 1961.

Eventually, he became interested in calling. He was one of the founders of the Rochester Callers Association. He taught instruction classes for the Irondequoit Squares.

In 1962, George and Marion started their little basement group, the Kerridge Wheels and worked with them for two years.

It is with deepest sympathy for his family and with the saddening despair in the loss of this friend that PROMENADER honors George W. Kerridge, a square dancer.

DOES YOUR PROMENADER LOOK DIFFERENT LATELY?

Several things are going on within the hard working staff.

We've been forced to try every idea we could think of to keep our subscription price at the present \$1.50 for 10 issues. We do not know that we would lose any subscribers if we were to go to \$1.75 or \$2.00 but we don't want to try it and see. So, we are trying a new approach with this issue. Our copy, as presented to our printer fills a column which is wider and longer than this column you are now reading; we are able to get more news per column because the large, over-size column is photographically reduced to 75% of its size which, when printed, comes out to what you are now reading.

True, the type itself is smaller than you've been reading in PROMENADER. But, it compares almost identically with the size of type you receive in the local newspapers.

We are able to get approximately 1½ columns of news material of our previous type size into one of our present over-size columns which is reduced to the column content you are now reading. This means that we can squeeze our former 7 or 8 pages into an issue with 6 pages. This represents a savings in our printing costs.

We must have continued advertising in order to exist and be able to pay our own way and not ask for money from the Federation treasury.

An additional advantage with the photographic method is that we can introduce black and white art work and improve the appearance of our pages. You can see for yourself per our front page and also the heading for Club News.

If you are inconvenienced in any way by this new approach, we'd like to hear from you. This issue is largely experimental to see how it looks and how much additional work it will mean for the staff to prepare it. Bear with us, won't you please? If you have any comments, we'd like to hear them.

Another big event in the life of PROMENADER is that with this issue, we will be well over the 500 mark on subscriptions! This is due largely to the continuing practice of the clubs providing subscriptions to the graduating members of their instruction classes as a part of their moving into the clubs as full fledged dancers.

We haven't heard from all the clubs on this as yet but we expect the usual wonderful cooperation. We feel that PROMENADER should be a definite part of the square dancing picture in Rochester and we are working many hours to get this paper to you and to make it worthwhile.

We are proud that our Rochester area dancers are supporting us in the manner in which it really shows...additional subscriptions.
