The Dance-O-Rama is coming closer! With this in mind we thought that you would be interested in information about the callers: "Red" Bates, Jim Brower, Don Roberts and John Hendron. We'll discuss two in this issue and continue in March.

"Red" Bates, New England's singing caller, began calling as an under-graduate at Springfield College back in 1948 and then he continued after graduation with records, entertaining at church groups, clubs, children's dances and at other affairs.

In 1957, "Red" began calling contemporary style square dancing and he soon found himself in such demand that he has been calling club level dancing exclusively ever since. "Red" is a club caller for six area clubs in New England. Guest appearances throughout the East Coast fill much of his remaining time. He has found time to make several square dance recordings. These include "Five Foot Two", "Bird of Paradise" and "Can You Believe Me?". All are on the Hi-Hat label.

In addition to his calling, "Red" is a Junior High Guidance Counselor in Wilbraham, Mass. He and his wife, Shirley, live in Hampden. She is kept busy caring for their four children, a horse, a dog, and a cat, but she still finds time to enjoy square dancing and to take an active part in New England's square dance functions.

Jim Brower and his wife took square dancing lessons in 1948. After dancing a year, he began to call. He then started four square dance clubs and also promoted square dancing in Texarkana for eight years. He turned "pro" in 1959 and is still at it. He makes a six month tour each year. He travels in 45 states and in Ontario, Canada. This adds up to 60,000 miles a year!

He starts on January 1st and ends the last Saturday in June. He also works four camps: Kirkwood Lodge at Osage Beach, Missouri; Camp 8, Clayton, Georgia; Chulla Vista Lodge in Wisconsin Dells, Wisconsin; and the Washington Area Festival. In between are many other jamborees, festivals, callers' clinics, National conventions and other affairs.

CUES - N - CALLS

As we are still, more or less, on the threshold of a new year, let's take a look this month at a couple of calls from your past and one that is definitely in your future.

First from the past, a call that was first introduced around 1963, called **CURLIQUE**, by Clarence Watson. This call was undoubtedly written ahead of its time since it fits in so well with the Swing Thru, Spin the Top, and Trade figures now being so widely used.

Definition: Man facing woman, a star thru motion with both using right hands, man does a normal star thru movement while the lady does a left turn under 3/4 (instead of 1/4 as in Star Thru) to end up facing the opposite direction of the gent. The position attained would be the same as you would have on the call to "Star Thru and the girls turn back". The value of **CURLIQUE** lies in correct dancer positioning. If you were to receive the call to square thru four hands around and **CURLIQUE** with the outside two and then Swing Thru, if the men haven't done a precise 1/4 turn and the girls a precise 3/4 turn you would find the swing thru either impossible or an armbreaker, and you would find yourself waiting for Hal Abberger's favorite song, "Left Allemande".

The call in your future I mentioned above is **CROSS TRAIL IN**. This is a combination call and an outgrowth of several ideas from the past. Definition: A crosstrail thru, U-turn back and a 1/4 in to face the girl you started the crosstrail thru with. For good styling and smooth action turn away from your partner on the U-turn back and continue on around to face her. This call was written by Manny Amor of Lakewood, New Jersey who has given us many good figures in the past and this may just be another for him. For any couple to do a crosstrail in and then star thru, the result would be the same as pass thru.

Another variation of an old idea is the **REVOLVING TEA CUP CHAIN**. I would not try to go into detail here on this one, so here is the explanation. Definition: Ladies do exactly the same as they would in a regular tea-cup chain. Head men work with the head ladies only. Side men with side ladies only. All men move left one position while passing one girl to turn the next. Good luck.

CITY RECREATION BUREAU BOOSTS SQUARE DANCING

The membership of the Rochester Area Federation of Western Round and Square Dance Clubs will be interested to learn of the efforts of the Bureau of Recreation of the City of Rochester, to spread the gospel of good square dancing in this area.

In September 1966, the Bureau secured the services of Ted Raiman, local school teacher and veteran caller, assigned him the task of setting up in-service training for the recreation leadership staff. Mr. Raiman set up a 12-hour 6-session agenda, and with the help of Mrs. Raiman, prepared an instruction manual for the leaders to use.

The Bureau was able to schedule three groups of leaders who took the training between September and December, with gratifying results. As an example, Rita M. Ross, director of Washington Recreation Center has a weekly group of 12 sets of young people, working and learning and having fun.

As each group of leaders began training, Mr. Raiman would bring his very excellent teen-age group in as demonstrators, and several times during the sessions, some of the teen-agers would help in the teaching.

The Bureau looks forward to the summer, when, with the aid of the manual, and Ted as a visiting specialist, square dance groups will be a large part of the summer program.

Mr. Raiman now has a large adult group meeting at Carter Recreation Center each Tuesday evening, with dancers coming from all over the area.
