MEETINGS KEEP DELEGATES BUSY
Delegates to the Rochester Federation of Round and Square Dance Clubs have recently been kept busy winding up Dance-D-Rama, designation of a Co-Chairman for 1968 Dance-D-Rama, solving of PROMENADER problems and election of new officers.

Meetings were held at the Echo Club on April 25 and May 23 with Executive Secretary, Ken Mayer, in charge.

Ambrose Baker, 1967 D-0-R head, reported a most successful dance both as to attendance (1092 dancers) and financial results (in the black). The delegates gave the Bakers a standing ovation for a job well done.

Bill Bible, Chairman for the 1968 Dance-0-Rama, announced that the Ealler Chairmen, Bob and Lucille Vincent, have lined up three callers for 1968 with the fourth still to go. The date
is to be April 20, 1968. Location is still not decided.

On the recommendation of the Biblers, the delegates confirmed the appointment of Howard and Arlene Newton, Boots 'n Slippers, as Co-Chairmen of the 168 event. The delegates also voted a sum of money for pre-dance expenses.

Carrying over a discussion from previous meetings, the delegates decided to set aside monies for the specific purpose of incorporating the Federation in the very near future.

Lew Dietz, editor, presented a financial roundup and a future forecast of PROMENADER. It was noted that subscription revenue does not alone carry the burden of publication; advertising is a help but unpredictable.

In lieu of raising the subscription price and/or curtailment of the Federation monthly, the delegates unanimously voted to grant the same $r_{2}$ subsidy for PROMENADER as was done last year.

A nominating committee, headed by the Metherells, presented a slate of nominations for Federation officers for next year. By unanimous approval, these are the electees: Executive Secretary - Chick and Sue Wolfe, Swingin' Eights; Secretary - Ray and Marge Biehler, Triggers; Treasurer Clive and Carole Bub, Irondequoit Squares.

Ken Mayer, on behalf of his officers, the Presgraves and DeVays, thanked the Board for their year long help and cooperation and urged the same spirit for the newly elected officers and incoming junior delegates.

And, Ken, we all thank you for your efforts!

 above you probably suspect this article concerns Round Dancing. You're right--it does. But more specifically, it cancerns "dancing". Dancing has been defined as "rhythmic movement of the body in cadence with the beat of music". Webster also defines it as "the intricate gyrations of swarming inseets". We Square Dancers differ from the insects only in our ability to move in cadence with the music. How we move, and the gyrations we perform in response to the music, reflects the training and experience we have had.

Unfortunately, the instructor of a basic square dancing class today must teach so much material (gyrations) that he has little or no time in which to teach the easy and graceful manner of "dancing" the movements. No fault of the caller, he is giving all he can in the period allowed him. As a result, the majority of the graduates move into club dancing (where even more material must be learned) without having learned the most important basic of all -- how to "dance" as you $n^{\text {square }}$.

There is a marked difference between "squaring" and "square dancing". You may have noticed in your own club one ar two sets who seem to move easily, in time with each other and the music, and with so little effort that they are not tired at the end of the tip. If you have danced in such a set you have experienced the real: joy. of dancing. If you have not, and are willing to do something about it, you have an exhilarating experience awaiting you -- if you will take the word of a couple who have been square dancing fifteen years and round dancing for twelve.

Perkie and I are convinced that, in today's situation, the best place to gain that extra ingredient which changes your "squaring" to "square dancing" is in, strangely enough, a basic Round Dance class. We feel that round dancing improved our own ability to square dance. Most of the really good square dancers we know will agree that this is true in their own experience.

How can this be? All S/D movements are designed on the measure structure of music and are intended to be danced in phase with it. This is the apparent, basic similarity in the two dance forms, "square" and "round". The music is very much the same in both, very often it is identical.

The emphasis in a R/D class is not on learning a great many figures, but rather on how to recognize the measures in music, on how to dance the movements in phase with the music. Body posture and balance, which improves your appearance on the floor, and which makes it possible to dance smoothly and easily are added.

And, you will have time to practice these "basic ingredients" until they become so automatic that you unconsciously transfer them to your square dancing. These are the "basic basics" which should have, and would have, been taught in your square dance class if time had permitted. And,

The fifty cents you paid for having me stay out of your set is just a pittance for value received. . . better dancing! Remember, I still give stamps. "IT" stamps, ask me about them.

I think the only time I didn't have any trouble in a set this past season was when Art Harris called a Mixer. I got into a set with some Toronto couples who had come to visit us. Of course, I never did have any trouble with part of a Canadian Club and the right Mixer.

Now here is something for those who are thinking of ways to improve the programs next year. I have several suggestions I would you to think about:
1)More challenge dancing. I make more money with this type of dancing. I know it's a selfish reason, but business is business.
2) Lower, or no dues. Secure a government subsidy or possibly get help from the Red Cross. They have a fund for a disaster, and boy, most of the sets I have been in have been disasters!
3)Change the makeup of the sets from four couples to seven girls and one man and the heck with that "who turns who" call.
4) I would like to hear a new type of calling. Instead of a call like "Load the Boat" where the caller calls one figure and the dancer does four or five movements, I would like the caller to call four or five figures and the dancer to do one figure . . . dancer's choice. Of course you may choose the wrong figure and goof up the set, but heck, as Kay Doris says, "I've sunk several boats already!"
5)For a change $I$ would like to go to an "after party" first and dance afterward (those who can).

Now you may not agree with the above suggestion but they may start you thinking that things could be worse. By the way, if any of you don't understand 4), don't call me, call my psychiatrist.

Looking at the summer schedule, there's still a lot of good dancing coming our way, but if I don't see you in a set
