## SPOTLIGHT ON GENEVA FRIENDSHIP SQUARES

The story of the l3th affiliate club of our Rochester Federation is written around Bill and Joan Newman, Charlie and Perkie Tucker, and . . an operation performed on a perforated, peptic ulcer!

Geneva Friendship Squares have grown into a full sized, active example of western round and square dancing in the Geneva area in about 3 years' time.

Bill and Joan Newman arrived in Geneva in June of 1965 and promptly looked for round and square dancing activity. They consulted Charlie and Perkie Tucker whom they had met prior to the move and through the Tucker's, Bill and Joan danced in and out of various Rochester clubs. Eventual contact was made with Don Pratt and Don became the instructor-caller of the first instruction class, numbering five squares.

Helpful in the development of square dancing in Geneva have been officials of the YMCA, Jean Jones of the Geneva Times newspaper who has been most goncrous in giving news space, and also the officials of Hobart College.

The success of the first class prompted the beginning of a second group in January 1966 with 3 squares. Square dance type rounds were taught by Bill and Joan during this period and soon the square and round dancers were qiving demonstrations in area shows and parties to stimulate more interest.

It was only natural that the Newmans were to be elected club presidents this first year. Also on the board were Peq and Phil Reed, Verne and Liz Marshall, Sooky and Marion Youngs. During the second year, the class numbered five squares and the Newmans started a round dance class.

Travellinq caller Jim Schnabel of Washington, D. C. was the first outside caller to appear, calling a dance on March 17, 1966 to a thrilled, neophyte aroup. Close relationships were also set up with the Henrietta Friendship Squares and exchanges of dances were reqularly scheduled. Don Pratt continues to call in Geneva and continues to merit the praise and thanks of all the group for his great spirit of co-operation.

The Geneva group is now helping square dancing get a start in the Penn Yan section.

The perforated peptic ulcer? Well, Bill is a surgeon, Joan is a nurse. They met for the first time in the operating room, fully masked and scrubbed, and that is the "romantic" story of how Geneva eventually got its Friendship Squares and square dancing qot another boost!

Mike Foos comments: Don't worry about those confused teen-agers. Give them time and they'll grow up to be confused adults.


Much has been said about the constant flow of new material being responsible for driving dancers out of the movement, after they had shown great interest by attending classes for a season. It's true that the number of basics has grown. But, it is also true that many old basics are no longer used. The caller-instructor is constantly striving to teach his current class what they need to know to dance now.

If the caller is permitted to use his own judgement and is not pressured to be constantly presenting new material, the fun of some new figures can keep dancers interested and alert but not overwhelm them. For, our wonderful activity should not demand two or three nights of dancing each week in order to be smooth, competent dancers. It must be kept possible for a dancing couple to serve the community and participate in other recreational areas, and still be club dancers.

In the 1966-67 season of the 32 new ideas, Spin Chain Thru and Barge Thru seem to have caught the dancers' pleasure.

In the $1965-66$ season, we had 37 new ideas. Round Dff, Slide Thru and Turn Thru came into general use. Can you imagine the frustration of the dancer if he had been subjected to all 69 figures?

Some of these new figures actually should be placed in the "gimmick" category. They are fun to use occasionally, but keep them directional, or give a quick walk-thru before using them. It's not fair to my way of thinking to pick some little known figure and just purposely stop a floor. After all, the folks came to dance.

Where do the new figures get evaluated? Workshop sessions for those who desire more challenge can be planned. The new materials are danced and only the best used in the club dancing programing.

A healthy activity is changing and growing in a controlled manner. Let's always remember to keep Square Dancing fun for everyone.
