DANCE-O-RAMA "69"

Happy New Year to all you enthusiastic round and square dancers from the Rochester Area Federation of Western Round and Square Dance Clubs. Another year has passed and it doesn't hurt to do a little reminiscing.

Square dancing has had another successful year. The evergrowing number of square dancers and clubs is living proof that Rochester people are sold on western style square dancing.

Our Annual Dance-O-Rama is growing more popular every year. Here is a run down on Dance-O-Rama's vital statistics. Organized in early 1959 by Anna Maria and Frank Cady, Dance-O-Rama's membership clubs included Genesee Dancers, Teen Twirlers, Belles 'n Beaus and Swingin' Eights. It was and still is the highlight of every dance season.

The number of its member clubs is now well above a full dozen (15) and Dance-O-Bama is enjoying greater popularity every year. For many, it is the once a year opportunity to meet and dance with friends who belong to other dance clubs.

This year's Dance-O-Rama, which will be held April 12, 1969 in Bishop Kearney High School, promises to be the biggest and best ever. The committees, under the chairmanship of Howard and Arlene Newton of Boot 'n Slippers, are up to their ears in work preparing for this annual event.

Callers will be Jerry Helt from Cincinnati, Ohio Dave Stevenson from Strongsville, Ohio; Jack Lasry from Miami, Florida and Jack Hague from Pittsburgh, Pa.

Round dances will be taught by Charlie and Perkie Tucker of Rochester.

Here are short biographies on Jerry Helt and Dave Stevenson.

JERRY HELT has been square dancing and calling since 1943. As a professional teacher and caller he has participated in many activities coast to coast in the United States. His home is in Cincinnati, Ohio, with his wife, Kathy, and two daughters, Greta and Neva. Jerry conducts regular clubs and classes in the cincinnati and surrounding areas.

Here are some of his square dance accomplishments:

Featured as caller and choreographer on many stage, television and radio shows throughout the country.

Jerry is associated with MacGregor Records, Gateway Records, Hollywood Records and Blue Star. Conducted callers clinics and workshops in many parts of the United States and Canada.

Serving on the faculty of many institutes and camps held in California, Wisconsin, Maryland, Missouri, West Virginia, Kentucky, Colorado, Alabama, New York, Canada, Michigan, Ohio and Florida.

Has served on the program of the National Square Dance Convention for the past 13 years.

Conducted exhibition groups and taught in many schools. Featured in an article in the National Square Dance Magazine, "Sets In Order", also in other magazines and publications.

DAVE STEVENSON has been a square dance caller for the last 10 years. He calls for 5 regular clubs in addition to conducting beginners classes and workshops.

He conducts his own "White Squaw" square dance weekend in Kentucky which is in its 5th year and serves on the staff for Willard Orlichs' Callers Workshop.

He served on the staff and committee of various festivals and Ohio State Conventions. He has been on the staff of square dance vacations in New York, North Carolina and Pennsylvania.

Aside from this he has his own business with the Clark Oil Company. Do you think we might get a free filler upper when we pull into his place of business?

His wife, Jeanne, is Square Dance Columnist for the Chronicle Telegram Daily Newspaper of Elyria, Ohio.

Where are we now? The holidays are over and the presents all exchanged. Even the bargains on next year's Xmas cards are gone. The memories of sugar plums, candy and eggnogs are coming to life in the bathroom scale. Now it's time to look at the weight problem.

I thought I had come thru the holiday food storm fairly well, until my Taw (in white man's language -- wife) said, "Why is it necessary for me to take three extra steps every time we do DO SA DO?" Well I can take a hint. So I'm going to lose some weight. How? I hate to cut down on my five meals a day sooooo I guess it will have to be my exercise, and the most enjoyable of exercises, square dancing.

I went to a nutritionist, a Dr. Lotta Crisco, for information on calories versus exercise. She sent me to a specialist, a Dr. Ima Quack. He wrote that very popular book "How to Lose Weight Through Surgery." So after two doctors and 20 dollars later, I found the answers in the 11brary. I broke down the amounts and converted the calories used into movements. Maybe you can use the following table:

CALORIE BURNING TABLE

Allemande Left burns up 10 calories. Right and Left Thru ... 5 cal. Allemand Thar Star 10 cal. (20 if you wound

up off center)

Star Thru 5 cal.

Ocean Wave 20 cal. (if partner rocks with you) 30 cal. (if Partner

rocks against you)

Tea Cup Chain 30 cal. -- Taw.

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cal. -- Paw.. Here Comes the Judge .. 10 cal. (40 cal. 1f you "Sock it to me" instead)

Quetch 5 cal. (double hug $7\frac{1}{2}$) Cross Circulate 30 cal. (usually goofed first time) 20 second

Each Goof is 13 calories but remember while you are standing you are not losing, soooo jump up down while you are waiting. Who knows, the Caller may call "Jump up and down". Ask your Caller to call higher calorie figures.

During a complete night of dancing you burn up about 600 calories, but after the dance:

A "Coffee and " after party equals 400 calories replaced.

A "Foam and bubbles" after party equals 590 replaced.

Add it all up and see how you make out.

Tho it sounds formidable now, with basic instruction barely half over, DANCE-O-RAMA is the "really big show" for the nearly or newly graduated dancers. This opportunity to mix and mingle with Rochester's square dancing population is especially geared to introduce dancer to the festival atmosphere at which club functions can only hint.

Qualified callers with varied styles tailor their talents to the vocabularies of the dancers in two halls. For those with only recent experience, the RELAXED dancing hall affords choreography limited to terms acquired in instruction groups. Although relaxing for the experienced dancer the program still affords the challenge and satisfaction of putting to use the skills developed in class. Look for ME there.

What then is the CHALLENGE hall? Much as the student progresses through grade school to high school and occasionally on to college, do does the avid dancer expand his vocabulary over the years. This hall provides opportunities for the more experienced dancer to exercise a translation of basic terms into more intricate composite movements. This pace is also somewhat faster since much of his reaction to the caller's jargon has become automatic and the flow of the patterns carry him along.

The new graduate 4s ill-advised to partake of the challenge program, risking the frustration of a vocabulary gap and the disappointment of not upholding his part of the team effort this dancing requires. The entire professional calling staff is featured in both halls so nothing is missed in the way of talent by anyone. The dinner intermission has been known to feature local talent displaying their wares, making it a day of almost continuous dancing.






