After only $s i x$ years of working with square dence beginners, it is possible to see "types" energe from the group. Dynamic types who plunge in and get involved, usually onding up as club officers or honchow ing the various comittees. The "aleopersm who start off shy or unsure and gradually emerge into the real of contributing to the club activities. There are the "hangers-on" who come and go with little or no participation or involvement. In't it great that we have all types or we would have all chiefs and no ino dians. The square dance activity 18 broad enough and flexible enough to accomodate all the types; challenge dancers, fun level dencers, intermediate level and high intermedistes, call it what you may.

An even greater variation exists in dancing styies depending on the mood of the moment or the personalities involved in a particular square. Of course the instryctors would like to soe everyone dance the way they were taught, with due ragard for the confort and considerations of otherg. Yet there exists need for enthusiasm's outlot. Callers epring from a breed who have a "hey, look et mel" complex. They can"t stand letting the other guy have the linelight. BUT they earn the right by investing tine, money and total involvement to becoming the man behind the rike. Those not wishing to make the total comitment freo quently succumb to this same desire to stand out in a crowd by adding flourishes, twirle, high kicks, etc. These cute veriations are picked up et conventions and square dance festivels where individual expressions of enthusiasm spawned them. Absolutely nothing wrong with it when executed skilliully and everyone in your square is going along with it.

Of course, square dance purists, of which callers conprise the largest group, tend to interpret these variations as an insult. Why hire a caller to calla dance if you are coing to make up your own? Why teach basics uniformiy throughout the world if see-saw means six different things to aix different couples? The answer is individumils. Individuel needs for expression within a broad framework of confornity.

The KEY to the whole approach is not to infringe on the rights of those gharing your square. Just
as the mediocre caller does not gain the wholehearted approval of the square dance population beceuse of his ineptness of doing his thing, so too, the inept, bumbling dancer poorly (and litere ally) executing the variations of the basics desere ves the frowns they receive in their square. You can* change people, they resist conformity. The surest way to fallure is to try to please everyone or make then conform rigidly.
"Expross" yourself if you must, but not at the expense of others. Self expression is important, why lse RING-ALDING DING DO YOUR OWN THING?
