Square Dancers! Take Note!

TO THE EDITOR:

You all have undoubtedly heard of the current dispute between the square dance clubs of this State and the New York State Tax Bureau regarding the imposition of sales tax on club dues and gate receipts. At the present time that particular dispute seems to be stalemated. However, a more important front has developed involving the battle for a legislative remedy to this whole problem.

Early last fall, several square dancers and myself met with Assemblyman William Steinfeldt regarding this problem. Per his request, I drafted two bills amending Sections 1105 and 1116 of the Tax Law, the purpose of which was to exempt our activities from the sales tax law. Bill was kind enough to not only introduce these bills into the Assembly, but to enlist the aid of Senators Thomas Laverne and Donald Stafford, of Peru, New York to introduce these bills into the Senate. These bills are Assembly No. 8653, introduced by Steinfeldt, and Senate No. 8739, introduced by Stafford, amending Section 1105 (f) of the Tax Law and Assembly No. 8574, introduced by Steinfeldt, and Senate No. 7553, introduced by Laverne, amending Section 1116 (d) of the Tax Law. These two bills work together and are both necessary to accomplish the desired tax relief. They are not competitive bills.

In the meanwhile, Senators James Powers of Rochester and John LaFalce of Kenmore, introduced Senate Bill No. 7467, the Assembly equivalent of which is Assembly No. 9294, introduced by Assemblyman Haley. These bills as well as the Steinfeldt, Stafford and Laverne Bills are all bottled up in the respective legislative committees - the Ways and Means Committee in the Assembly and the Taxation Committee in the Senate.

I have it on very good authority that any of these bills, particularly the Republican sponsored ones that I drew, have a good chance of passage if they can be reported to the floor from the aforesaid committees. Of course, the approval of the members of the Assembly Ways and Means Committee and the Senate Taxation Committee must be obtained for this to be accomplished. I am also well informed that the time element is now critical, since the legislature is due to adjourn in May. This means that the square dancers in the State of New York who wish to make their feelings known to their legislators must do so NOW.

Time is particularly critical in respect to contacting the members of the aforementioned legislative committees. The following is a list of legislators who are members of the Assembly Ways and Means and Senate Taxation Committees, their village or city of residence and the counties they represent.

All you square dancers who are acquainted with square dancers in the counties above listed and who are concerned about this situation, should contact these friends immediately, forwarding to them a copy of this letter. I cannot over emphasize the necessity of immediate action, particularly in respect to the letters to the members of these committees. This does not mean that you should ignore the Assemblymen and Senators who are not members of these two committees, since their vote would be necessary if and when these matters reach the floors of the Assembly and Senate and whose influence may assist in getting the bills out of committee.

Finally, I might add, that personal contacts between you and your representative are very effective. It allows for the establishment of a certain amount of rapport between you and your representative and makes it somewhat easier to put your sincerity across.

In conclusion let me emphasize again the necessity for letting your feelings regarding this matter, whatever they may be, be known to your elected representatives just as soon as possible. Anybody having any questions regarding this matter should feel free to call me, either at home (244-4038) or at my office (232-7272).

The address for State Legislators is: Assembly Chambers or Senate Chambers, depending on whether you are writing an Assemblyman or Senator, State Capitol, Albany, New York 12224.

We closed shop on April 29th and went to Churchville-Chili School for the Muscular Dystrophy Dance. Saw a lot of friends there!

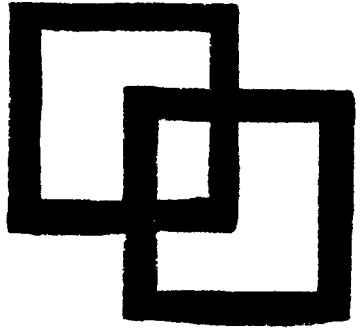

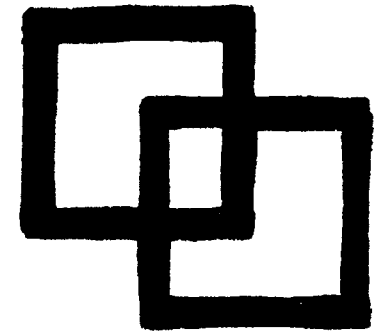

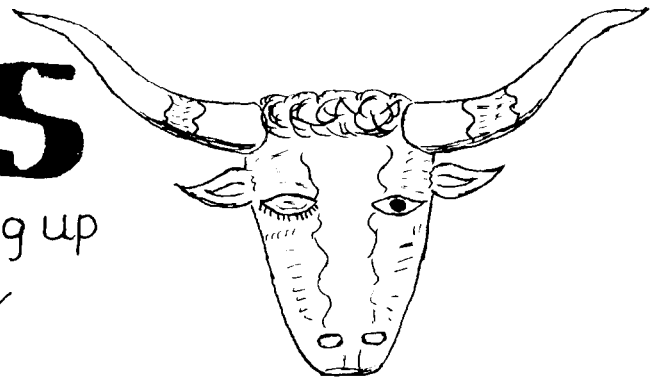

LETTER TO THE EDITOR:

Dear Editor,

During the last few weeks I've been among a group of club level dancers who have visited several area clubs for the purpose of capturing their Traveling Banner. We've enjoyed every dance we've attended very much, and have had a lot of fun. However, we have also heard comments that the Federation officially frowns on banner stealing. Can this be true?

I personally think it's great fun and should be encouraged for several reasons:

1. You get to meet a lot of wonderful, friendly people. We have been most graciously welcomed at every dance we've attended.
2. It makes a good excuse to visit another club and see how they run a dance. I think our officers have picked up a couple of new ideas already.
3. It certainly makes more experienced dancers out of those doing the visiting. There's no better way to dance to a variety of callers than visiting different club dances for an evening.
4. In order to return the banner, some members of the

club visited must come and dance with you for an evening. This furthers the interchange of friendships and experiences.

5. Lastly, to be very practical, it builds up the treasuries of both clubs with Guest fees, and what club doesn't need money?

Assuming everyone agreed with all of the above (and they won't), and banner-stealing became a common practice, one outstanding problem remains - there are no uniform rules! Some clubs don't have any formal regulations, some require only one visiting square, and others require two squares to capture their banner. Information on what each club requires is very hard to obtain.

All of the above rhetoric comes down to two questions:

1. Do the majority of Federation club members really dislike being visited by another square or two of dancers who happen to take the Traveling Banner home with them? And if they do, shouldn't the practice be stopped? (Ours is not the only club capturing banners.)

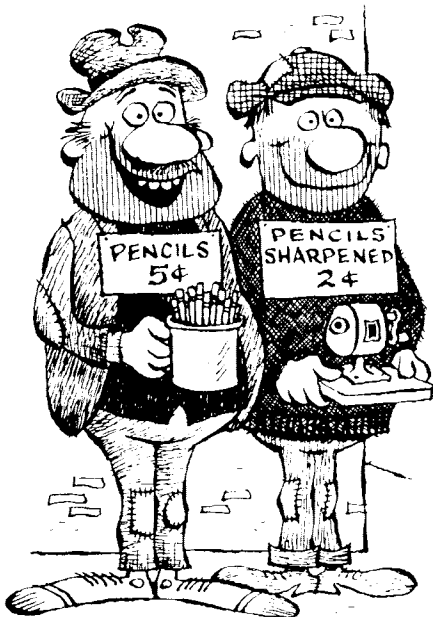
