During the past month the Rochester Area was saddened by the death of one of its callers. Jake Koch.

Jake was always an active guy. Working hami. Playing hard. He had a zest for life.

He used to do steeple jack work, break and train horses. He was an auto mechanic, a tool and die maker by trade and made a name for himself in commercial air-conditioning Swinging Squares class of little ones --ages 6-12. and refrigeration.

He loved horses, motorcycling and music especially Western.

In 1966, friends (the Nesbitts) persuaded him to join a class in square dancing -- Myron Huss and the Triggers. He was an amputee and didn"t know if his leg could take it. But it was a challenge to him and he loved it. It wasn't long before he was singing along with Myron while he danced in a square and helped the other dancers if they missed a call.

He had a good voice and used to yodel at one time so he decided to try calling. He bought the equipment and a few records but insisted on calling to an empty room.

Gradually the family was allowed in. The boys clowned around and heckled him and he would break up laughing. He relaxed.

Then he would sing for anybody who stopped in. Nobody could get out until they heard his latest number.

The following year he taught the Hilton Hillbilltes teen class. They graduated in March of 73. He was son proud of them.

He was looking forwa rd to attending callers school in August, in Troy, N. H.

Once in a while he called for the Welcome Wagon greup in Greece. He did one night stands, calling for private parties, campgrounds, snow mobile clubs, and senior citizens groups. He even appeared on T.V.'s"Louise Wilson Show"

His last calling date was for the Mormon Church on English Road. He did a terriffic job!

As I write this, Helen Fordham is in Rochester General Hospital for an operation. We all hope her a speedy



Of importance to all square and round dance individuals in the state, Assembly Bill 2493 has been reported out of committee and is being readied for a vote in the State Assembly. The same bill in the Senate (#1956) is still in the Senate Taxation and Finance Committee. It must be reported out of Committee before it can be voted upon.

We suggest that each member of every square and round dance club in New York State sit down now and write to his Assemblyman stating his views on the value of this Assembly Bill 2493.

We also suggest that, if you live in an area where there is a member of the Senate Taxation & Finance Committee, you write to this Senator giving your opinions of Senate Bill 1956 (the identical bill).

As of May 15, 1973 (and in spite of false rumors circulated last week) NO BILL concerning the problems of Sales Taxes imposed on Square Dance Clubs has been voted on in Albany. The bills mentioned in the April Newsbulletin of this Federation are still in their respective committees in the Assembly and the Senate. A third bill, Assembly Bill #2780, was brought to the floor last Thursday (May 10), read for the third time and referred back into the Assembly Taxation and Finance Committee.

With the State Legislature pointing towards adjournment the latter part of this month, you can still accomplish miracles by writing personal letters to your State Senator and Assemblyman.

With summer almost upon us here in New York State, we are already receiving requests from out-of-state dancers for places to dance in New York State during the coming vacation season. Many letters report that they have written to people who have not replied! Since we do not know all of the local dance dates in your area (an impossible job to catalog them all!), we will answer our letters as best we can and, if necessary, give the writer YOUR NAME as a contact in your area. Please answer promptly all requests you receive about square and round dancing in your area! New York State is a large and popular vacation area for a great many people and we do have a lot of square dancing going on in many areas all summer long. Let's show our out-of-area or out-of-state square dancing friends what a wonderful "bunch" we are.

The April meeting of the Temporary Executive Committee of the Federation was held at 11:00 A.M., April 28, 1973 at the Highlander Motor Hotel, Henrietta, N.Y. in conjunction with the Rochester Area Federation Dance-O-Rama.



LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor:

I am writing to you to express my views on a subject of great interest to Rochester area dancers. I trust you, the Editors, will identify with the topic even more than areaddancers, because the subject is PROMENADER.

PROMENADER, being the only square dance publication in the greater Rochester area, is the recipient of a great many comments. It is the subject of conversation at many square dance gatherings, and -- in the interests of improving the publication -- I want to pass on to you some of the The Monroe County Fair will be held August 13 - 18, 1973. comments I have been privy to in recent conversations.

It seems many area dancers do not feel that PROMENADER is very accuarate. They cite the fact that dates are wrong in the listing of monthly dances, callers are listed on the wrong dates, etc. Another recent comment was that PROMENADER carried very few promotion articles about Dance-O-Rama. A third & riticism is the fact that PROME-NADER is sometimes late in arriving at our homes. In all honesty, I had to agree -- as I think you will have to agree--that the above statements are true. But let's look a little further.

I agree that there is a need to upgrade the quality of PROMENADER -- to catch mistakes, to see that only correct dates are printed, along with correct caller information. I also agree with the need to communicate area events through the FROMENADER -- the vehicle established for that purpose. Lastly, I agree that timely information is essential to a healthy square dance picture in the Rochester area.

But who is responsible for all of these things? It seems to me the PROMENADER and its Editors receive more than their share of negative feedback. Isn't it the responsibility of area clubs to submit their club dance dates and caller information to the PROMENADER? Isn't it a club responsibility to insure that the information submitted is correct, and that it is submitted in a timely fashion? Aren't the square dancers of the Rochester area responsible for promoting area events through the PROMENADER?

I think it's time we took a good look at ourselves. How often have we quickly scribbled a note to get into the PROMENADER on the due date (or a few days later)? How often have we left it to the Editor to decipher our hastily, handwritten note? How often have we guessed at the dates (especially special events) and assumed the caller was our regular club caller all month? How often have we received a call from the Editor requesting our input to the PROMENADER so that he can meet his deadline? How often have we submitted an article early?

I am not certain, Mr. & Mrs. Editor, that area dancers realize that the FROMENADER is an accumulation of articles from all the clubs belonging to the Rochester Area Federation, as well as information from non-Federation clubs, advertisements, etc. The accumulation and organization of this maze of information (approximately 40 clubs) is accomplished each month through the voluntary

efforts of one couple.

I think it is commendable that you, the Editors, have elected to make this contribution to the square dance function in the Rochester area. On behalf of many, many dancers, I want you to know that your work is very much appreciated. Thank you for doing a job none of your critics are willing to tackle!!

Well dancers, my "subtle" message is very simple: The PROMENADER is what we make it. If there is a need to upgrade this publication, the cycle must begin with us.


