The international Assaciation
of Squore Dance Callers
For The first quarter of 1978, the CALLERLAB Quarterly Selection Committee has voted TWO movements to be used for Mainstream dancing. These moves are for the months of January, February and March of 1978.

The two movements selected are: 1. TRADE THE WAVE
2. PIN PONG CIRCULATE

TRADE THE WAVE (Harry Ed Dunkle, 1967)
From any 4 -handed ocean wave, dancers facing the same direction in the wave exchange places (Trade) with one another, walking in a semi-circle and passing Right shoulders at the half-way point. Right-hand waves change to Left-hand waves and vice versa. All dancers change their facing direction.
PING PONG CIRCULATE (Don Beck, 10/75)
This movement starts from a $1 / 4$ Tag Position which is an Ocean Wave in between two couples facing in, and parallel to those couples. The folkowing description is based on a squared up set having Heads Pass the Ocean:
The Center dancers in the Ocean Wave step thru. Evexyone does a Pass To The Center and the new center dancers step directly into a Right-Handed Ocean Wave. Cautiorremember that the dancers moving towards the outside of the set do an automatic Partner Trade in executing the Pass To The Center motion. Original Heads are now the Outside Couples and the original Sides are now in the center Ocean Wave.

## Callers' Profile

Our Caller Profile this month focuses on Jeff Elmore, Mainstream Caller for the Wayne Westerners in Williamson, New York. Jeff started dancing in 1974 when his wife, Sally, dragged him to his first open house in East Rochester. It wasn't long before he was dragging her to every dance he could find. Two years later, when some square dance friends wanted to do something different for a party, Jeff found himself on the other side of the microphone.

When he's not calling, Jeff is a Manufacturing Superintendent at Garlock, Inc. in Palmyra. He, his wife and their son, Phillip, live in Newark, New York. Jeff is an avid chess addict. He and his family also enjoy taking to the woods in their canoe and escaping it all. There won't be much time for that this summer however, because a new little Elmore is due on the scene in mid season, promising to keep them plenty busy.

Jeff enjoys calling for groups of all ages and experience levels. When asked why he enjoys calling, Jeff responded, "There's something very satisfying about standing above the dancers and watching the beautiful kaleidoscopic patterns created when the dancers and the caller work together with the music. "On the other side of the coin", he added, "there's nothing quite so stimulating as the sounds of pure enjoyment coming from a group of beginners as you first introduce them to the fun of square dancing."

Jeff hopes, soneday, to be able to call all aspects of square dancing. Sally and Jeff took Round Dance lessons this past summer, and Jeff would eventually like to be able to cue rounds also. At present, he is also working on Contras and Eastern Squares.

An Open Letter To The Square Dance Community:

Last September we encouraged everyone we know to participate in our fine activity. We are keenly aware of the problems associated with retaining those people we worked so hard to attract once they've gratuated.

Statistics have been quoted that only 20 to 40 percent of the new graduates are dancing the second year after graduation. In view of the dancers' investment (financial and emotional), the attrition is too high.

During a recent discussion with a traveling caller, the drop out problem was discussed. The caller stated that, after months of discussion between callers/club officers/ interested dancers/federations, etc., no firm plan of action could be agreed on. Sound familiar? A couple of callers decided that positive action was required to reduce the rate at which newer dancers were being lost. They defined the problem as follows:

THE DANGER RETENTION RATE IS DIREGTLY IN PROPORTION TO THE DEGREE OF EXPERIENGE AND CONFIDENGE THE NEWER DANCER HAS IN HANDLING THE VOGABULARY REQUIRED FOR MAINSTREAM DANGING.

The two possible solutions were:

1. Extend the class time from 30 to 40 plus weeks.
2. Provide a weekly dance whereby the class members could dance at their level without the frustration of learning additional calls.
They elected to try the second solution since the dancers could dance with a large number of dancers and to many callers.
Were they successful? Here are the results--you be the judge!!
3. The drop out rate in their own area has been cut dramatically.
4. The average class member attends $50 \%$ or more of the weekly dances, in addition to the 30 classes. This is a total of 45 dances prior to graduation.
5. Area clubs are not obliged to reduce club dance level after graduation as much as in previous years.
6. There is more visiting between clubs since the newer dancers have been exposed to more callers and dancers and become accurtomed to dancing more than once a week. (continued in next column)
7. Attendance at festivals and club dances with visiting callers has increased because of increased confidence.
8. These weekly dances have been held for several years with over 20 squares in attendance.

Since we have the same drop out problem, we believe we should try an approach which has proven successful elsewhere.

A WEEKLY SERIES OF DANCES WILL BE HELD AT A CENTRAL LOCATION FOR CLASS MEMBERS AT WHICH NO "ADDITIONAL" BASIC CALLS WILL BE TAUGHT. ALL CALLERS WILL BE PROVIDED IN ADVANCE WITH A LIST (updated weekly) CALLS TO BE USED. THE MAJORITY OF THESE CALLS WILL have bern taught and used by the area instructors for A MINIMUM OF THREE WEEKS.

For this program to be successful, we need your full cooperation and support and request that:
l. Federation/Callers' Co-op--publícly support this program (we are not asking for financial support.)
2. Callers/Instructors--------actively participate in this by: a. recommending and stressing the importance of class attendance at these dances. b. call at one or more dances (for a fee) c. provide periodical feedback on material covered in each of your classes.
3. Club Officers-----------urge your class members to attend these dances to gain the dancing experience and confidence in their ability to use the terminology acquired. Small classes will discover the fun and excitement generated by large groups, while improving their proficiency in dancing. More confident and experienced class members will help maintain your club level by shortening the gap between class abd club ability.
4. Fellow Square Dancers------urge their friends and acquaintances to attend these dances. If possible, go with them to break the ice (at no cost to you).

These dances will be held as a service to all clubs and our fellow square dancers. They will take place every Saturday night beginning in either January or February, 1978, and ending in August.

AT NO TIME NOW, OR IN THE FUTURE WILL THESE DANCES BE USED AS A SPRINGBOARD TO FORM A NEW CLUB.

Looking forward to your cooperation and hop to see you around the square.

## Contra Corner



To most people traditions are things you did when you were growing up. If your family stayed in one place, you may have traditions stretching beck for genexations. Traditions give one a feeling of place, of belonging; they're ties to the past, to history.
Many of us, caught up in migrations to new territories, lost that sense of tradition-learned to live only for the present. We invented a "throwaway" culture. We discarded the old for the new. Many of us have now come to the realization that such waste is too expensive. We're turming back to conservation of the old.
Some, of course, have thought that way right along, treasuring for example, family fumiture and pascing it on for generation after generation as part of their tradition, their ties to the past. Some furniture was solid and well built, but most was of poor quality. The latter, however, didn't survivel Some of the good stuff was discarded as junk also, but if repaired and restored, metamorphosed into antiques. Age operates, therefor, not as a guarantee of quality, but as a very effective screening device. That which survives and remains functional is worth preserving and restoring.
With that as a useful analogy, lets turn to square dancing. New dances, new gimmicks, new "basic movements" have been written, published and taught for hundreds of years. Old dance books are full of "modern", "new", and "stylish" dances. Then as now, every dance master wanted to have his name remembered as an originator of new, exciting dances - after all where would dancing master be if no one wanted to learn new dances? Most have not survived, but those which have are gems. Sure, what survived in New England is different from what survived in Georgia, New York, Texas or Ohio, but in all cases what survived did so in competition for the dancer's favor not just for a few years, but for 25 or 100 or more years.
In Western square dancing today, the flood of new dances continues. Most are poorly conceived and awkward-a monument only to the ego of the creator. Of the thousands in Burleson's encyclopedia, only a few will survive even a few years. Those that survive into the next generation will become traditional. There's nothing wrong with the process; what is wrong is that we're forcing the great majority of square dancers to help us experiment, when they should be enjoying good dancing. Let the challenge dancers - those who enjoy experimentation - try everything, if they wish, but lets stop driving club dancers away with our constant workshopping. After putting them through 20-30 lessons, we should be able to let them dance without anymore teaching.
I believe it is possible with as few as ten lessons to reach a level where there can be an unlimited variety in dancing, There are thousands of dances already in the traditional category. These dances have survived the test of time; they're fun to do and easy' to remember. Sure, they require some study on the caller's part, but the variety is there and they're pretested. If the only way the caller can introduce variety into his program is with a "new" basic, he's not doing his job.
Old-fashioned has been used as a term of derision during the wasteful, always new phase of American culture. We now recognize that old may mean the best survivors of old time craftmanship. Its true with furniture and its true of square dancing as well.
What is traditional dancing? Its the very best surviving from 300 years of invention, experimentation, and dance experience. Lets use it; its our to enjoy.

The calls on this list were selected by vote of a variety of advanced-level callers throughout the country and has been approved by CALLERLAB
The CALLEREAB All-Position Concept, which is an option for Mainstream and Mainstream Plus dancing is considered automatic for Advanced Level This does not mean that a dancer is required to be an Alt-position dancer in order to begin not mean that a dancer is required to be an Alf-Position dancer in order to begin learning the Advanced Dancing s Basic Calls, However, as dancers progress within All-Position dancing

You will note that some of these calls have been used from time to time at club-level dancing; some of the calls are relatively easy and can be learned by a simple directional statement from the caller; viz: acey deucy, quarter - in/out, and wheel and spread. They do however, need to be worked over and over again until they become almost as automatic and as quickly executed as a right and left thru or a starthru. Others are more intricate and take repeated work-shopping to master but are a delight to do and give great satisfaction when executed well by all in the square. The later include calls such as: all 4 couples star-thru, arky allemand, remeke the set-up and slip-slid-swing and slither.
Note the comment at the end of the list concerning the (AP) All Position Concept.

Next month in this space we'll describe a typical advanced/challenge weekend as attended by two veteran challenge couples from the Rochester area, and we'll list a few of the upcoming weekends and festivals that will be featuring advanced and challenge dancing as well as mainstream plus.
