BECOME A BETTER DANCER

ATTITUDE is a very important aspect of a dancer. It is not enough to only remember and execute calls perfectly, but to have a feeling for the whole square dance picture and how we can help it be better and grow.

I have noticed lately a trend to urge dancers fresh out of class into Plus 1 and 2 dancing, and from there, into clubs other than the club they learned with. Although this may be fine with the people concerned, let's take a look at the possible effect on the growth of square dancing in Rochester.

Our mainstream clubs grow or sustain their membership levels by sponsoring beginner classes. Since the Plus 2 and advanced groups generally sponsor no beginner classes they must recruit their membership exclusively from other clubs. Our problem arises when new dancers are recruited into clubs sponsoring workshops to advance them into another level. Normally it is these first and second year dancers who bring in the bulk of a new class. Many not only bring them, but dance with them as well during the class. If these dancers now progress into another level and stop dancing with the club they learned with, they will probably not bring their nondancing friends to an open house. As a result, our classes and clubs will become smaller and the whole square dance picture will suffer.

What is a solution? Clubs that sponsor beginner classes should refrain from trying to reach and sustain a Plus 2 level of dancing since that is too large a jump for most to make in the time normally allotted for classes. Clubs and callers should discourage their new graduates from attending Plus 2 and advanced workshops until they have danced with their club at least a year. Finally, clubs that do not sponsor a beginners' class should encourage their members to continue to dance with their home club. Total division by levels of ability and experience is one of the worst things that can happen to square dancing. Who was it that said, united we stand, divided we fall?

Imagine 26,841 of your friends congregating in one place! Wow! Second largest Square Dance Convention ever; largest convention in history of Tennessee.

Shuttle busses took us to and from the Cook Convention Center. They ran every half hour all day. The temperature ranged from low of 75° to high of 98°. I don't understand how the air conditioning took care of that many active people: Absolutely comfortable all the time --inside.

The dancing went non-stop from 9:00 AM to 2:00 AM the next morning. There was a different caller every five minutes. I was told this before the convention--now I believe it. Hundreds of callers including Rochester's own Ed Butenhof, Chuck Prister and Ted Whitacre. They were all at their best. There never was a wait to square up by either caller or dancer. You just joined a square or started one and immediately started dancing. The sound system, by Hilton, was great of course. Very good dancers and each hall held to its advertised level.

So much to do and see: square dance shops, clogging, demonstrations, and lovely costumes on the Southern belles. We attended some educational panels, (not enough of them) each filled with meaty information. Lee Kopman's workshop was outstanding as noted by a five-minute ovation from the floor. He bowed humbly.

There were after parties sponsored by record companies and square dance associations. We attended one, but the next evening we had to eat. Seems somehow we danced right through supper hour and beyond. Many restaurants remained open all night for the square dancers.

The hospitality of the city and square dancers was permeated with the flavor of Tennessee. Everything organized down to the last ice cube. We can hardly believe an event of that magnitude running so smoothly.






It is with a certain amount of anticipation, expectation, trepidation, and anxiety that I look forward to the forthcoming square dance season as the only Federation president who has twice walked this path.

It is with anticipation, because I always look forward to the beginning of the square dance season, after the summer respite, for a reunion with old friends and the meeting of new ones. This is my fourteenth year as a western square dancer, approximately my thirty-fifth year of square dancing of any kind, and I have yet to tire of it.

It is with expectation, because I have certain agenda items, as this year's president, that I would like to see accomplished, all with the primary aims of expanding, developing, and encouraging western style square and round dancing and the more traditional contras and square dancing in this area. In these times of economic stress, what better activity is there than the fun filled, inexpensive entertainment provided by this type of dancing? I want to see it nurtured, and the Federation is an excellent vehicle with which to do this.

It is with trepidation, because much responsibility goes along with the role I have undertaken. We have a big investment in the Federation. I would like to be able to look back and say that I left it in at least as good a shape as I found it!

It is with anxiety, because of the disquieting fact that dancer participation in the maintenance of the institution of square dancing in this area is shockingly limited, especially when one considers that there are 36 clubs which are associated with the Federation, not to mention a number of others which are not, all with a membership which has to average somewhere between 50 and 100 or so people. An example is the fact that only 12 of our clubs responded within the necessary time to the Federation's call for information regarding club open houses and classes so that this could be included in our flyer at the County Fair. Poor attendance at Federation meetings and the difficulty many clubs have in obtaining Federation representatives are two more examples. A willingness to complain about Dance-O-Rama with a corresponding lack of willingness to participate in its planning and execution is another.

Being a born optimist, however, I like to view the last two emotions as motivators towards the ends of the first two. I am hoping that your clubs will provide the Federation with conscientious and interested representatives whose goals include the advancement of traditional dancing in our community and the improvement of the Federation and its services to better meet the needs of the Rochester area and its dancers:

Welcome back! Let's have a good year!

Country Dancers

Autumn is here and Country Dancers are going strong. Ed & I attended several dance camps this summer and there was much talk about the state of Club square dancing. Most of the callers we talked with felt strongly about new dancers combining contra and round dances along with vocabulary training necessary to execute the square dance maneuvers. Since we realize time is very limited in class, new dancers might be encouraged to try dancing with us once or twice during the learning period--better yet, come with them. Remember, we will have our open house on Sept. 18--with live music. We have no special dress code--just wear something comfortable, with soft soled shoes.

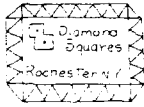
Each dance we do is explained during the "walk-thru" and "calls" are given as the situation demands. It is up to the dancer to time his/her steps to the 8-count phrase of the music so that body flow is continuous. Most of us, while learning a new dance, concentrate on the pattern the first few repetitions and then start "feeling the music" working our movements with the phrase. The "calls" at that point act only as a reminder. There are no "tricky callers" so the music is King. The vocabulary terms are the standard square dance basics plus a few others used in Scottish dancing--notably "contra corners" and "heys" (reels for 3 or 4). The main difference is that we dance in lines--opposite our partners--progressing towards (inactive) or away (actives) from the caller.

Contra dancing is very social since you dance with everyone else in the set as the progressions are made. Single women can easily do the "man's" part, as it is truly "all position" in nature. Come! Try us some Thursday evening.

To enable Round Dancers to better evaluate a round dance, ROUNDALAB, the International Association of Round Dance Teachers, has adopted a point system devised by Dave & Shirley Fleck of Toledo, Ohio. Introduced at the 26th National Square Dance Convention in Atlantic City, The Fleck Rating, as it has come to be known, was carefully studied, evaluated, and slightly modified before its formal acceptance by the ROUNDALAB membership.

Basically every dance figure and/or combination, dance position and the repetition and layout of sequence are assigned a point value. By using a special formula a total figure is determined for every dance. The Point System committee is working closely to coordinate its evaluation with the Standardization Committee.

By comparing the dance rating number to the current "guide," a Round Dance teacher and/or dancer can more accurately determine where a dance fits in the total round dance picture. These are the plateaus currently in use:

0 - 60	easy - for non round dancers
61 - 125	square dance rounds
126 - 175	easy intermediate
176 - 250	intermediate
251 - 299	high intermediate

The determination for the various plateaus among the advanced to challenge dances falling in the 300 and above rating will be determined at the next meeting of ROUNDALAB.

Some dance record companies and Round Dance Magazines include this point rating on their cue sheets. All choreographers are encouraged to send their cue sheet, and record if possible, to Dave & Shirley Fleck, 3444 Orchard Trail Drive, Toledo, Ohio 43606, prior to releasing their dance, so that the point rating can be included with the final release. There is no charge for this service.

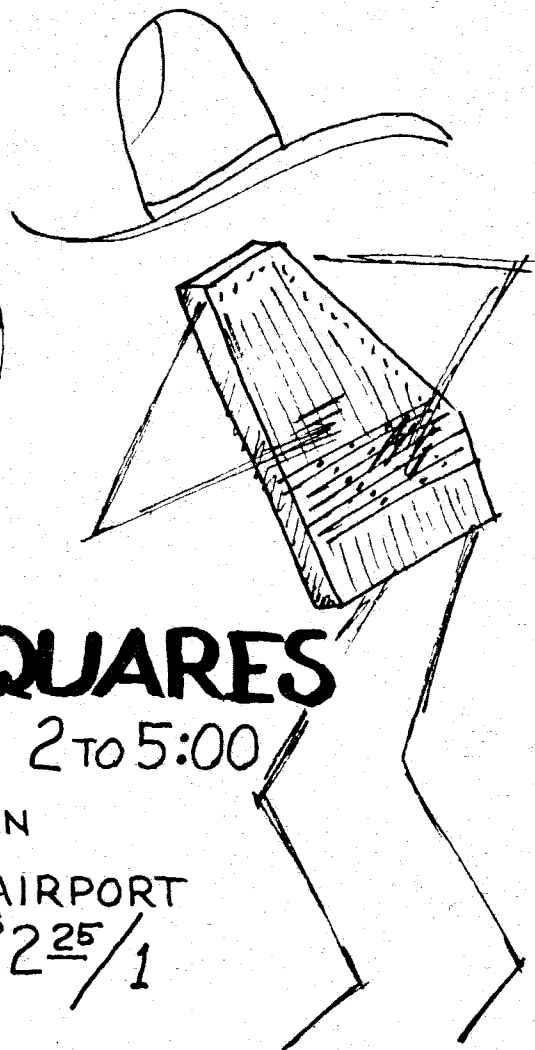
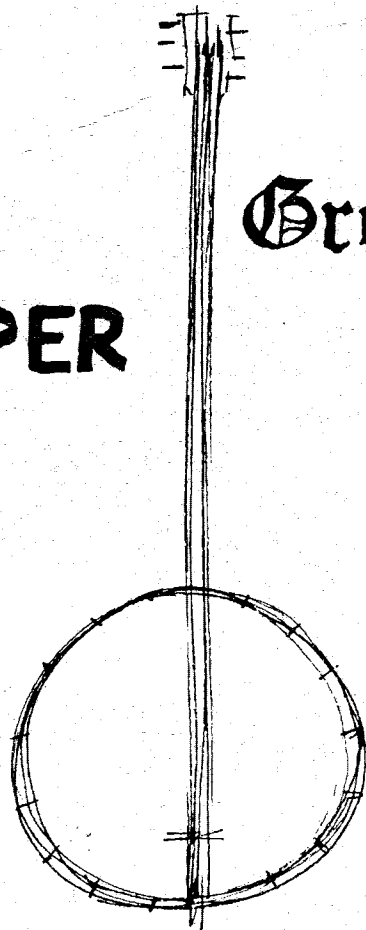
