## SILVER CLUB

Starting in September, the Federation will offer a new service to the area dancers. It is called the Silver Club, and works very much like the Century Club. A small booklet is available for you to collect the signatures of at least 25 callers when you dance to their calling. At least 15 of them must be a regular caller or teacher for one of the Federation-affillated clubs, or a member of the Callers' Cooperative of Rochester. Not more than 10 may be any caller at a dance of one of the Federation clubs, or at any Federation-sponsored dance, including DANCE 0 RAMA.

When you have the required signatures, show the booklet to the Silver Club Committee Chairman, who will verify the signatures and authorize you to wear the special badge dangle. [^0]SHARING...isn't that what square dancing is all about? We think this should be the theme of DANCE $O$ RAMA 1982. We belleve such a big dance to be a success needs the effort of all square dancers in the area. We welcome your ideas and advice on how we can make it a "looked forward to dance ${ }^{14}$ at the close of the dancing season, not a tedious job that has been done the the past and we should "keept it going." Last year a third of the dancers came from out of town. This is a statistic we think should be cut to $10 \%$ Why didn't you attend last year? Cost of dance? too long a dance? location? time of year? heat? Ask your fellow square dancers if they went last year. If they did, ask them if they had a good time. Bet you won't find many who didn't enjoy themselves.

LOG0. Since we were asked to chair this dance we have been thinking of ways to include more of you, to make this dance more personal like your club dances are. It was suggested to us that we have a "logo" for DOR. OK, let's have your ideas on this. Send them to us and we will have past chairmen look them over and pick one without knowing who sent it in.

HANDBOOK. We also thought a Hand Book for Square Dancers would be good. Sewing hints, how much material does it take to make a circle skirt, etc. A recipe section including one for the working dancer, dishes prepared in a hurry or the night before for "potluck dinners," Christmas goodies, a how-much section--helpful in planning your club's strawberry social, how large a cake do we need for six squares? etc. This would save over-buying and coming up short. Special recipes and ideas you have used that have been well received by the many dancers that surround the refreshment table. Maybe some clever, inexpensive decoration ideas for your club's dance. All ideas you think would be helpful to others should be in this book. Your name and club will be noted above your suggestion, idea or recipe. The book will be mimeographed and given free at DOR to all who contribute to it and will be available to everyone else for a donation.

PICTURES and MEMENTOS. Many of you have danced in other states and countries. If you have pictures or mementos we would like to use them in the dance halls this year for interesting decorations. Also, memorabelia of past DORs and pictures you may have of these. We believe square dancers are a sentimental lot and save things that remind them of the fun times they have had. So start now to gather up what you think would be interesting. We will mount it on poster board and get it ready for all to see.

GRADS. This year we want to feature all graduating classes at the ceremony before the night dancing. We would like each club to encourage their class to attend and be in a grand march carrying their club's banner.

CLOGGING. A clogging demo is great to see. Who can help us get this together?

SHAR I NG. . We think that's what it is all about. Let's pull together and make DOR 1982 a fun time to remember. Fun is spelled with "u" in the middle middle, and that's where we want "you" to be. It is your DANCE $O$ RAMA.

Square dancing is fun! We teach our new dancers this and that is how it should be.

Twenty-three years ago the Rochester Area Federation of Round and Square Dancing Started Dance-0-Rama for the purpose of blending recent graduates in with the seasoned veterans. DOR has grown and now has a contra hall, a round dance hall, and four square dance halls, accommodating every level of the dance as it is known today. All well and good, certainly fitting the idea of fun.

However, this year a blemish touched DOR, one that has caused controversy in recent years. We refer to the methods and reasons for awarding the Tucker Award. It is given, supposedly, to the club that participates the most in DOR and creates a contest-like atmosphere. It is not a Federation award, but is given by a private individual using Federation information and ticket sales. Under special control this might be O.K.

This year, though, due to a lack of communication, mistakes, and a refusal of cooperation by one individual for an extra 10 minutes of time, three and possibly more clubs were put out of contention for the award. This is not right. It could even be the reason for declining attendance at DOR. The facts regarding these irregularities were presented to the Federation board at its May 13, 1981, meeting.

We make three possible suggestions to the new board to take over the helm of the Federation:

1. Scrap the award--eliminate the competition between clubs.
2. Put this award in the hands of the Federation.
3. Keep this award as is, and have the Federation establish a new award based solely on the percentage of a club in attendance, using visible rules and points that can be clearly seen by all.

Let's re-examine the reason for DOR and hope that our new federation officers will try to put an end to this type of problem.

Please, keep the fun in square dancing.

As the time for Fall classes approaches, CALLERLAB wants to encourage clubs and caller-teachers to take a critical look at their class programs and goals.

Review the current Basic and Mainstream Programs carefully in light of the time available for instruction and the clear need to graduate well-grounded dancers. Dancers should be taught not only the choreography of the various basics but also an introduction to the topics of history and heritage, dress, dance customs and manners, as well as simple rounds, mixers, and contras. Teach the basics from more than just a single set-up and insure both heads and sides can dance each part comfortably. Note that the new Basic Program (which combines the previous Basic and Extended Basic lists) makes an excellent 30 week package and is well suited for those areas where conditions limit class time to about 30 weeks a year.

CALLERLAB recommends 41 sessions of 2 to $2 \frac{1}{2}$ hours each to teach the complete Mainstream Program, and many areas are phasing into a two year program of instruction to ensure that graduating dancers meet with success when they enter the square dance world. It seems clear that much of our dropout problem is rooted in the fact that some dancers are rushed through class too quickly and find that they cannot cope after graduation. Rushing dancers through class to increase club membership or the club treasury is short-sighted at best.

How much better to produce dancers who will be around for a long time because they are comfortable with and enjoy their square dance experience. The freezing of the Mainstream list for a period of three years enables us to look ahead and plan our teaching program without fear of disruptive changes. Let's make the most of our opportunity and rededicate ourselves to graduating really capable, smooth-dancing, happy dancers who are well-prepared to take their places in the square dance world and have the background and motivation to prepare for positions of leadership.

CALLERLAB recommends 29 sessions of 2-2 $1 / 2$ hours each or approximately 60 hours of instruction to teach the BASIC PROGRAM (Calls 1-48). 41 sessions to teach the MAINSTREAM PROGRAM (Calls 1-68). Do not teach from just a single position/formation and remember to teach styling as well. Calls in italics may be deferred until later.


Dancer
The "Dancer" is made of glove tanned leather, fully lined with nylon tricot and foam to cushion the lining. Bounce back toe, steel shank, poron insole and split leather outsole are all standard quality features as well as a $3 / 8$ " leather strap with elasticized buckle and a "Cuban" heel of $1^{3 / 4}$ " height. Blk. Wht, Gold, Silver, Red, Navy, Brn. Bone. Narrow (AA) - Sizes 5-10; Medium (B) - Sizes 4-10; Wide (D) - Sizes 5-10

## Majestic

Glove tanned leather upper, $3 / 4^{" l}$ leather strap with a hidden elasticized gore for the buckle. Full "bounce back" toe. Entire upper lined with a foam cushion enclosed by nylon tricot. Insole cushion of $1 / 8^{\prime \prime}$ "breathing" poron. Steel shank arch support. Leather outsole. 1" matched heel. Blk, Wht, Gold, Silver, Red, Navy, Brn., Bone.
Slim (AAA) - Sizes 6-10; Narrow (AA) - Sizes 5-12; Medium (B) - Sizes 4-12; Wide (D) - Sizes 5-10.


## Scoop

The strap is $3 / 8$ ". The heel is "cowboy stack" at $5 / 8^{\prime \prime}$. The outsole is manmade cinnamon evertone. Leather upper, leather strap, elasticized buckle, steel shank, poron insole. BIk, Wht, Gold, Silver, Red, Navy, Brn, Bone.
Narrow (AA) - Sizes 5-10; Medium (B) - Sizes 4-10.

## Swinger

A traditional style with elastic gore ring in the strap. Glove tanned "unlined" leather upper. Split leather outsole. $1 / 2$ " cushion crepe heel. Steel shank support with poron cushion insole. Blk, Wht, Gold, Silver. Narrow (AA) - Sizes 5-10; Medium (B) - Sizes 4-10.


## Clogger

The upper is patent leather, fully lined with foam backed nylon tricot. Steel shank, bounce back toe, and 3/4" strap. The Clogger has a heavier than usual leather outsole and a solid maple wood heel that will "hold taps" and take a beating. Nails, screws, or glue may be used for tap attachment. Black and White Patent.
Narrow (AA) — Sizes 6-10; Medium (B) — Sizes 2-10.
Cheyenne
The Cheyenne is a full leather upper. The vegetable tanned process provides exceptional softness yet retains the beauty and strength of natural leather. Fully lined, again in leather, double ribbed steel shank in the arch, cushion insole and outsole. The Cheyenne can be worn for dancing, casual dress or work. Bone, White, Brown.
Medium (D) - Sizes 7-13; Wide (EE) - Sizes 7-13.

## "The World's Greatest Square Dance Event"

In lace June this year Marion and 1 combined a trip to visil our son with participation in the National Square Dance Convention being held in Seattle.

The convention activities started on Thursday, June 26 thru the Saturday. The largest convention ever to meet in Seattle comprised 27,500 people. There were registrants from all 40 states and 15 foreign countries. Each day dancing and workshops started at 8:30 AM, continuing thru 10:30 PM, with a break for lunch and supper. All levels of dancing were going on at all times from class level thru Challenge.

One morning: Marion and I went to a workshop in an Advanced A\&B level. We lasted about five mimutes, if that long. We had been a little cocky about our performance in Mainstream $1 \& 2$ and just knew we could fit in. Well, the only place we could fit was in the group of spectators around the perimeter of the large hall. We then migrated over to the plus 182 area and had a ball.
As usual wherever square dancers congregate there was no shortage of people to talk with. It is very interesting to us that square dancers are always gracious and warm.
As we were in seattle primarily to see our son we naturally didn't dance as much as most. We did have about 2 to 3 hours daily and one evening. There were two events which were outstanding in our minds. On the last evening there was an attempt (we as yet don't know the outcome) to have the largest square dance in the World. Prior to this time the largest was just over 15,000 dancing to one caller at the same time. To stage this event there was a grand march by states (153 registrants from New York state) to the football stadium at Seattle Center. They used astroturf on the field. When all the marchers were on the field, the music started, the caller started, and we started. Before the tip was over an 8-person star was called, and the music stopped. We were all told to hold the star position while a hellcopter flew over and took pictures. In this way it was possible to count the stars and multiply by 8 to obtain the number of participating dancers. If the number were over 15,150 it would be the largest, and eligible for the Guinness Book of Records. At any rate if the number was large enough, Marion and I have proof that we were intter.

Probably the most outstanding event of all as far as we were concerned happened at an exhibition on the last evening. As a matter of fact it was just before the close of the whole affair.

We, along: with about 750 others, went to a large theatre or playhouse to watch various types of dancing-some square dancing, some clogging, some folk dancing-then came the pièce de résistance.
sixteen people, men and women, came out on the stage and made up two squares. These people were in handpowered; wheel, chairs. (one powered). Thru the efforts of a dedicated Vancouver, B.C. caller who modified standard calls just milighty, this group along with others who were not present, learned to dance in the wheel chairs. They really learned. Some of us had trouble learning the Teacup Chain. Maybe this group had trouble learning it but if so, you'd never know it. They danced for about 30 minutes with turn thrus, right and left thrus, grand right and left-reven grand squares.
If l ever gripe about any capabilities or lack of them, I should be shamed for life. That 30 minutes was one of the most inspiring either Marion or 1 had ever had.

The whole convention wound up with everyone saying it was the best ever. Next year it will be in Detroit. We expect,to go, at least for one day, and we recommend it to others.
