## AMERICAN

SQUAREDANCE is the national magazine with the swinging lines published and edited by Stan and Cathie Burdick, Huron, Ohio. This magazine is full of new ideas and interesting features covering the whole square dance scene. Stan is a traveling caller, Meanderin' Stan, who makes dates all over the United States and writes about it monthly. Stan has been the featured caller at Boots ' $n$ Slippers several times. He has many subscription dances that are fun for clubs and also promote his magazine.

The NEW ENGLAND CALLER is edited and published by Charlie Baldwin, recently ushered into the Square Dance Hall of Fame. New England is a hotbed of square dancing, and Charlie Baldwin and the NEW ENGLAND CALLER both played a major role in the growth of dancing in that area. If you serve on the board of your club you may find new ideas there by noting what other clubs are doing. It is great to have a copy when traveling in New England where the dancing is excellent and the dancers friendly.


SQUARE DANCING, the official magazine of the Sets In Order American Square Dance Society has a weal th of information for dancers and callers alike covering every subject in this activity. Membership In the Society entitles you to the magazine and to new Square Dance LP Documentary square dance records. This magazine, out of California with Bob Osgood, editor, was known for many years as Sets In Order. It covers the whole square damce movement coast to coast. In the September issue we found a picture of cur Federation booklet for promoting square dancing, a feature on Red Bates in its workshop pages, and a picture of Tom Trainor in an ad for Mountain Records. Tom was caller for Swingin' 8's for years; Red Bates from Massachusetts has often called here at festivals and special dances. This issue also Included an lliustrated Basic Handbook of Square Dancing endorsed by Callerlab.

Presidents: We hope you will promote PROMENADER in your club, and also give your class members an opportunity to subscribe.

Reporters. The deadilne for the November issue is October 10. We hope you will include your club level if it is higher than Mainstream. Fostal regulations for Third Class Bulk Mall forbid any mention of raffles, games of chance, or $50-50 \mathrm{~s}$, so please omit any reference to this sort of thing in your club news or ads.

SEATTLE ' 81
The 30th National Square Dance Convention registered in excess of twenty-seven thousand dancers, however cancellation requests have taken their toll and the Convention goes on record with an official registration total of 24,379 . Washington had 8461 dancers in attendance, California had 4736, and Oregon sent 1793. Numbers were well below the thousand mark after that with 116 registered from New York. 8 provinces of Canada were represented as were 16 foreign countries.

There were 2,946 At-the-Door registrations, unbel ieveably this included dancers from all States with the exception of Alabama and West Virginia. Additional statistics obtained from registration forms: 10,275 persons indicated they had attended previous National Conventions and 697 indicated a desire to be programmed in some phase of the Convention. There were 1,164 requests for RV space and/or information and 5,051 requests for housing. 737 Cookbooks and 8,645 Program Books were ordered. 277 persons registered on Register-A-Friend registration forms which were mailed with confirmations. Totals include 1,207 Teen and Pre-Teen and 2,590 Solo dancers.

Country Dancers have enjoyed seeing some club square dancers at our programs--more often those from Country Twirlers, Cloverleafs, and Swinging Singles. Come again! Many others of you came into our contra hall at DANCE 0 RAMA to hear Ted Sannella and our live music. I hope you had the courage to dance too-some of you did. Perhaps you would like to try our group some evening as a change of pace. Starting this month I will try to remember to mark the dances that will probably have 'better" teaching, (k) --not all callers TEACH well. While none of our dances can be termed "workshops" or "classes" we always walk through all dances and teach the vocabulary that proves bothersome. So much depends on the ratio of newcomers to oldtimers. Do feel free to come to any of our dances. Be prepared for the differences that occur due to our different callers and different bands. While most of our dances are about $80 \%$ in contra formation, with some traditional squares and couple dances thrown in for variety, we do have other specialized evenings. Tom Bohrer, one of our regular callers, generally calls English country dances which have a very different styling and type of music.

This month we will also be lucky to have a return engagement by Sandy Bradley--a rapid fired, dynamic, nonstop styled Iraditional Western square dance caller from Seattle. She is traveling the Eastern coast with her own musical group doing concerts as well as dances. I guarantee anyone who dances with her will accumulate their aerobic points for the week! I recommend her for those with energy to burn as well as to understand the roots of our Modern Square Dance movement. The music will be fabulous! (Sandy is an auctioneer, which should give you some idea of her delivery.)

My husband, Ed Butenhof, has become a traveling caller. Last May, during our trip to England, he had a chance to call a traditional dance in Kent with Jack Hamilton of the Southerners Band. We found lots of interest in contra dancing there. Ed also was guest caller for Tony Parkes summer dance series in Concord, Massachusetts, one evening in August and had a delightful time calling to the superb music of the Yankee Ingenuity Band. The music in New England gets better and better.

The Orleans Orbits requested and were granted Federation membership. Delegates were reminded that Federation dues of $\$ 8.50$ per club should be paid by Oct. 31.

Thanks to those responding to the poll last month. Thanks also to those who took the time to write a letter expressing their opinions. l'll report the results in a future column.

I wonder if you took the time to read and think about what was being said in the CALLERLAB article in last month's PROMENADER? Are we turning out lop-sided dancers who enter the club scene half-prepared and frustrated? Does the pressure to perform take all the fun out of square dancing? Why else would so many people faithfully attend classes for 30 weeks and drop out of the square dance picture shortly after graduation? One of the problems of conducting a class is many clubs are expecting quantity. Dancers feel they are judged by how many calls they know rather than how well they dance them. How about it--is quantity better than quality?

I personally feel the square dance picture in Rochester would be much better if the clubs would require the callers to teach their classes to provide a balanced program and give them the time to do it. This includes styling, simple rounds, mixers, contras, and the basics from more than just a single set-up. Conduct each class like a club dance and give them time to have fun! To accomplish this why not try a two-year program? Start a new class every second year. Since most clubs like to consider themselves Plus 1 or 2 , it seems a two-year program would fit in quite nicely. It would provide ample time to dance and become comfortable with almost the entire program. The second year would be just the right level for those drop-outs who want to get back dancing. Mathematically, it makes more sense, too. Currently, if we graduate 4 squares, we are lucky to see one square return in the fall. Now, what if we were to graduate 4 squares after two years and keep them for another 2 or 3 years? Of course, there are no guarantees, but can anyone come up with a better idea? If so, there are thirty or more clubs in Rochester and hundreds more throughout the country waiting to hear from you.

For the quarter beginning October 1, CALLERLAB has selected two new movements for use in workshops at Mainstream Dances. The movements are CHAIN DOWN THE LINE, written by Don Beck, and STAR THE ROUTE, authored by Don Williamson. The definitions and some dancing examples follow.

CHAIN DOWN THE LINE: from a right-hand two-faced line or left-hand ocean wave, centers trade while ends adjust as necessary. Then the ends courtesy turn the centers. Ending formation is facing couples.

STAR THE ROUTE: from a static square, those designated (heads or sides) will complete the call. Example: the heads will Right Hand Star $3 / 4$ to meet the couple on their right with a Left Hand Star one full turn....heads will meet back in the center of the set to Star Right 1/2 Way to meet the other sides with a Left Hand Star One Full Turn.... Heads meet in the center for a Right Hand $3 / 4$ Star back to home position. It takes 32 beats to execute STAR THE ROUTE.

Please remember that these are the selections for the quarter beginning October $1,1981$. It does not mean that all clubs or all dancers must use the calls but rather, they are for groups that would like to try something extra. They should be workshopped before being used at any dance labeled Mainstream. Not all clubs enjoy or desire other than standard positioning.
