Mona's afternoon class consisted of lancers and quadrilles and both sessions were sprinkled with contras. The band members that worked with Mona were fantastic--without their concern for her need to have special music the experience could have been a disaster. During the week, the group has a chance to do progressive squares, tantum squares--and some good old cowboy dances.

One of Mona's activities in Ohio is directing an exhibition group that do Shaker Dances. On the day she gave her mid-day presentation she divided the hall by sex and taught us some of the dances. The song leader has spent the first two days teaching the songs to the camp so we had music for the dancing,

Food at Pinewoods is the greatest. The camp is 140 strong-mand it can't be easy baking quiche for that number of people. Onion soup is traditional for one of the lunches--and the grand finale is always roast beef with Yorkshire pudding.

## APD-WHAT'S THE BIG DEAL?

Aside from advanced dancing, one of the most controversial and misunderstood topics to most dancers is the term APD and what it stands for. It is regarded much as an invader from outer space, or as something foisted upon the dancers to purposely create confusion. APD is a Callerlab-originated term meaning All Position Dancing. To many, this means doing the girls part or doing the man's part. This is all wrong. In fact, there are very few calls in use today that specify the man does this and the lady does that.

Before we proceed further, let us distinguish between gimmicks and APD, A gimmick is something that doesn't fit the definition of a call or of a square and requires special rules to accomplish such as, hexagon squares, progressive squares, having the men chain with the ladies courtesy turning, etc. APD involves doing the call according to the definition, but from different partner orientations or positions in the square. Hence, CURLI-Q facing same sex is a gimmick and TOUCH $\frac{1}{4}$ is not.

When I learned to dance many years ago, what we call APD today was just dancing the basics. It was usually the spice thrown in for a little extra fun and challenge and no one took offense or became upset if the caller "worked the basics". I for one, cannot understand why a dancer would rather learn a brand new call than expand his knowledge and ability to dance calls he will probably hear as long as he square dances.

Perhaps dancer attitude of this sort is a reflection of the callers' use of material -or rather, the lack of use, Can it be we callers are neglecting the basics in favor of what is considered more "exotic"' plus level material? is it a credit that our dancers can execute LOAD THE BOAT and SPIN CHAIN THE GEARS flawlessly, but cannot do a SCOOT BACK or CLOVERLEAF properly?

All calls have a starting formation such as facing couples, lines, waves, columns, etc. Definitions usually include two parts; a left-hand and right-hand person, a center and end, an in-facing or out-facing person. Rarely is there a man's part or lady's part perse. Examples of such calls are SLIDE THRU, STAR THRU, CURLI-Q, CALIFORNIA TWIRL, COURTESY TURN. Concerning other calls which do not specify a particular sex, if we learn only one part or one-half the action of a call and are asked to do the other half, we become confused because we have not danced it offer enough to learn it, Our square breaks down and we are embarrassed and irritated. So, the real culprit is two-fold---inadequate dancer-preparation and the callers failure to teach and use calls from other positions often enough so they can be learned.

If we really think about it, it is not APD we don't like. It's becoming confused and breaking down the square. There is no square dance we go to where APD is not used and part of our excitement and enjoyment comes from variations of formations and positions we can do the call from. If we start from a wave and SWING THRU DOUBLE, that's APD because we have started as an end, then as a center. If we WHEEL \& DEAL from a two-faced line and from a line facing out, we have done itfrom two positions. If we SCOOT BACK, then SCOOT BACK again, we have started the call as in-facers once and out-facers next.

I have always felt that people who know their basics well have more fun because they dance more during the evening. For example, if someone else (naturally) makes a mistake and you find yourself in the wrong position, chances are if you do not know the call from that position, you will break the square down. However, if you know position, you will be able to continue to dance from where you are and will not be standing around watching while others dance. Since the fun comes from dancing and not watching, you will have a better time.

I recommend that dancers urge their callers to pick a different basic each dance and teach it from another position. The secret is not just doing it one dance, but to continue using it each dance thereafter. In this fashion you will become a better dancer and the caller will be able to provide more variety within a given framework, How a caller uses WHEEL and DEAL LAn $b \in$ just as challenging as RELAY THE DEUCEY, and proper training will allow you to get through it. Let's forget the term APD and think 'knowing your basics,!
