## SQUARE DANCE ORGANIZATIONS

Useally our first experience with a square dance organization is the local club. The local club may be dancer owned and operated, caller owned and operated, to some combination of these two. It may or may not sponsor classes and useally adhears to a certain dance program/ programs, squares, rounds, clogging, and/or contra. These clubs are a framework on which many other organizations are based.

Area organizations such as our own; Rochester Area Federation of Round and Square Dance Clubs, Inc., serve to promote and coordinate square dance activities in that area. The Buffalo Area is served by FLADA (Frontier Leaders and Dancers Association). The Syracuse Area is served by Central New York Square Dance Association. There are others in the state.

Callers Co-op of Rochester (C.C.R.) is another Rochester Area organization geared to the callers and cuers in this area. C.C.R. and R.A.F. (Rochester Area Federation) work hand-in-hand and yearly cosponsor a Leadership Seminar for all square dancers.

CALLERLAB is an International Association of Square Dance Callers. Membership of about 1,400 callers. Its purpose is to provide leadership and direction for the calling profession while lending strength and direction to the Square Dance movement as a whole. This organization is responsible for establishing the Basic, Mainstream, Plus, Advanced and Challenge Programs. It has established a code of Ethics for callers, an accreditation system for callers, and caller's school currecuilum.

LEGACY (an International Assembly) is a leadership, communication, resource center, attempting to establish a public trust for the continued development of square dancing. Legacy represents: Square and Round Dancers, Square and Round Dance Organizations, publications, and caller organizations, National Convention Executive Committee, Square dance record companies and suppliers. It helped form the National Association of Square and Round Dance Suppliers, and Roundlab. It has drawn up the "Leadership Manual", a valuable aid to all square dancers.

The Lloyd Shaw Foundation's objective is to recall, restore, and back the folk rhythms of the American People in dance, music, song, and allied folk arts, as a tribute to the memory of Lloyd Shaw.

The National Square Dance Convention Executive Committee is the organization that sponsors and guides the Annual National Convention. It has completed thirtytwo natiomal Conventions.

Roundlab is a professional teacher's organization to promote, protect and perpetuate the general Round Dance Movement. It developed a Code of Ethics and Dress for Roundancers, it is standardizing definations and words, and it is developing procedures for accreditation for teacher-training schools, and is forming the first Round; lab classic list.

Square Dancers of America, Inc., is a National Organization. Many of the above organizations are members. Square Dancers of America has obtained an excellent insurance policy that is geared specifically to the Square Dance scene, and is available to its members. (Rochester Federation is currently studying this opportunity.)

## WHO'S YOUR PARTNER?

"Of course 1 know who my partner is!... Don't I?' of course you do when you are standing in a set next to him/her, waiting for the music to start. But finding your partner after the calling starts is one of the most complicated subjects in square dancing. The first thing is that there are two very different sets of rules, depending on what kinds of formations the caller gets the set into. You have learned many of these rules in the course of your dancing, without ever having seen a written list. You couldn't dance if you hadn't.

## Ring Formations

The two kinds of formations are 'Ring Formations' and 'Square Formations'. The basic rule for a Ring Formation is that all four men in the square are doing the same thing at the same time, and so are all four ladies. This doesn't mean that the men are doing the same thing as the ladies;--most of the time they aren't. The squared-up set at the start of the tip is a Ring Formation, and so are such other setups or movements as Left Allemande, Promenade, Allemande Thar, Alamo Star, Circle Eight, Four Ladies Chain, or anything else that can be done as long as the caller is giving calls to all four couples.

## Square Formations

Anything that isn't a Ring Formation is a Square Formation. Since the squared-up set is a Ring Formation, the only way the caller can get it into a Square Formation of some sort is to have the head couples do something that the side couples don't, or vice versa. Some of the ways that he often uses are 'Heads (or Sides) Square Thru', 'Heads Star Thru', 'Heads Lead to the Right' (whether or not he says 'Circle to a Line'), and there are hundreds of other ways. Then it isn't until he calls 'Left Allemande', or perhaps 'Right $\varepsilon$ Left Grand' or 'Promenade', that the square gets back into a Ring Formation.



WHO'S YOUR PARTNER? - continued
Some of this may sound awfully complicated, but it is really mostly things that you have already absorbed whether you knew it or not, and they are things that you need to know if you're going to answer the question, "Who's Your Partner?"

## Your Partner in Ring Formations

We've already taken a look at what Ring Formations are. Now let's see the rules for finding out who's your partner. In Ring Formations, partners are always a man and a lady, and a man's partner is defined by whichever of these things is the last one that he did:
a. The lady that he squared up with;
b. The lady he faced after doing a Left Allemande;
c. The lady he swung;
d. The lady with whom he started a Grand Right and Left or any of its variations: Weave the Ring, Grand Sashay, Daisy Chain, etc. You should always, man or lady, take a good look at this person, so you know whom to look for at the other end;
e. The lady with whom he started a Do Paso;
f. The lady who was on his right in a Circle of Eight, regardless of how many times a Rollaway or 'Ladies In and the Man Sashay' has been called;
g. The lady he received from a Ladies Chain or a Flutter Wheel;
h. The lady that he Promenaded or took home after a sequence of calls.
Notice that Allemande Thar is not on this list, and it doesn't do anything to change who was your partner at the start of the call.

## Your Partner in Square Formations

The basic principle in finding your partner in any Square Formation is that two dancers who are partners are always facing in the same direction. Couples can be 'normal', with the lady on the right, or 'sashayed', with the lady on the left. It is possible for two couples in the set to be normal and the other two sashayed, and sometimes couples are two men or two ladies. Partners are usually lined up shoulder-toshoulder, but not necessarily right next to each other. This happens for instance in an ocean wave, where your partner is not next to you but the person who is facing in the same direction as you are. This is the person you look for when you Trade the Wave.

Two partners may sometimes be in 'tandem', which means one in front of the other, or "nose-to-nape". Peel Off and any Dixie movement can only be started from tandem partners.

If you are interested in going into the Advanced and Challenge vocabularies of calls, you will probably run into some callers who will use a slightly different definition of partners.

Our own Representative, Frank Horton, co-sponsored the original bill.

## OPEN HOUSE - DO's AAND DON'Ts

1. Do make your Open House a party - one which sells the prospective dancer through fun, sociability, and the party atnosphere which music and light refreshments convey. Have promotional literature, produced by professionals (see yellow brochures), available for them to take home.
Don't use the occasion for a hard sell on square dancing. Callers: Don't overwork them; they are not used to square dancing yet.
2. Do let your caller invite visitors to consider the activity as a social and physically invigorating hobby. Let your members provide the visible evidence of what he has to say. Let your paid professional sell the activity.
3. Do answer their questions, but don't pour on the information. Burdening prospective dancers with too much information, for example, the legnth of lessons, the ultimate cost, the continuing "levels" of dancing, ets., is frightening. Let visitors convince themselves during the initial 5 or 6 sessions that they like the activity. Don't turn them off before they decide square dancing is worth their time.

4. Encourage the "timid" new comer by likening square dancing to marching band maneuvers rather than ballroom dancing. You need not be an accomplished, graceful dancer to enjoy square dancing.
5. Emphasize, if the conversational opportunity arises, the fraternal-like benefits of the activity, such as: instant friends world-wide when traveling; a caring community which supports leukemia and other charitable causes; the new friendships the actvity promotes, etc. Leave the scope of national conventions, weekends, and square dance travel tours for later, prior to graduation. 6. Don't make taking a 2 or 3 week vacation a penalty. Prospective dancers planned their year before square dancing came along. You cannot determine if a couple can or cannot "make-up" missed lessons. Some can and some can't. Better to start with 6 squares and end up with $4 \frac{1}{2}$ than to wind up with 2 at the start because you scared the rest off with rules, restrictions, and making the activity sound burdensome.
7. Remind your prospective dancers that "we all started at square one, same as you, and look at us now." But, when you demonstrate what you know, have the caller keep it simple. You can quickly create a reaction of "'1'11 never be able to do that " if what you demonstrate looks complicated or breaks down the square.
8. Do remember to tell the Open House Attendees

- How glad you are they came.
-You hope they had a good time' you did!!
-How well they danced.
-Perhaps they might like to bring their friends or neighbors next time (based on the fun they had tonight).
-Its an activity which both he and she can enjoy without competition; no scores to keep and everyone is a winner.
- Emphasize the fitness aspect; great exercise for both people, and you can do it together. Mentally stimulating and social as well.

Do's and Don'ts - During Established Classes:
9. Don't give the beginner the impression that the basic program will make them experienced, confident, and all-knowing dancers. Let them know during lessons that they are learning the language of square dancing - as unique as any foreign language-and that the basic terms and skills are taught upon which all future dance skills are dependent.

Don't refer to the 3,000 -odd listings in Burleson's Square Dance Encyclupedia... 2,500 calls are unused, and the ones which are, are only names for combinations of basic terms. The terms in Mainstream, Plus, and approved Experimantals, number less than 110 . So don't make square dance vocabulary mind-boggling. 10. Do tell new dancers something of your club's activities, special parties and history. Tell them of the other clubs and of the (optional) round dance programs. Do not make round dancing sound like a mandatory part of the program. Some people agree to square dance only because they don't have to be good 'dancers' or ballroom dancers.
11. During lessons, assure new dancers that they can go as far as they like, and that sufficient clubs and programs exist to assure places to go and enjoy the activity at their level of accomplishment or need. Do not pressure your dancers into 'higher levels.' Let them decide when they are ready to explore other programs. 12. Remember to make new dancers aware of the PROMENADER as a way of keeping up-to-date on the square dance activity in our area. You may also want to let them know (20)about the national publications as well.

1. Personal contact, this is the best. Bring friends and neighbors to open house, also names of friends. 2. Send an invitation from the club, stating time and place and name or names of persons who submitted the potential guests name.
2. Advertise in local papers, ask for free ads first, area Pennysavers, Greece Post (2 areas) picture articles would help. Calender of events, T.U. - D.C. Pat Hutter" man.
3. If approached, area fabric stores, store front windows and libraries may offer space. Include open house information.
4. Demonstrations in public affairs and parades, have flyers available on who to contact and information on open houses.
5. Store bulleten boards, pin up flyers.
6. Year around advertising, bumper stickers.
7. Summer - Supplement to D.C. c/o Pat Dougherty. 9. Recommend that 2 couples be on club advertising for 2 year term. The Chairperson to be succeeded by the Cochairperson and another couple appointed to be co-chairperson.
