SQUARE DANCE CODE OF ETHICS


1. COURTESY-As a square dancer I respect other dancers and callers and treat everyone with courtesy.
2. FRIENDLINESS-1 go beyond the matter of form because those who participate in this activity with me are all my friends.
3. LOYALTY-I support my own club in all activities because it means that the continuance of square dancing depends on my personal loyalty.
4. CLEANLINESS-I do not wish to offend anyone. I am very particular of my petsonal habits, breath and cleanliness.
5. ABSTINENCE-Many Square Dances are held in public facilities where liquor is forbidden and their continued availability is dependent upon a favorable public image of square dancers. The co-ordination required for following the calls is impaired by drinking and close contact in a square with one who has consumed alcoholic beverages may be offensive. Therefore, I recognize the validity of the efforts to maintain a separation of square dancing from drinking, and will refrain from its use before and during the dances which I

## SQUARE DAICE ETIQueTte

When you have something good going, Why Spoil A Good Thing? It's easy to do when you don't follow the simple (golden) rule of "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you''. You can write reams of do's and don't and get very specific about situations like cleanliness, not passing up a square when sets are forming and dancing in cliques but it still boils down to the fact that we are people interacting with other people for the purpose of recreation and not competition. The following excerpt from suggestions for people in the "helping professions", such as nurses, teachers, and those who work with the handicapped really says it all when it comes to dealing with people.

Be alert to needs of people and try to meet those needs. What counts in life is what we do for others.
Be genuinely interested in people. You can like almost anyone if you really try.
Speak to people. There are few things as nice as a pleasant word of greeting.
Smile at people. It takes much more effort to frown than it takes to smile.
Call people by name. The most delightful sound to anyone is the sound of their own name. (Thank goodness we wear name badges.)
Be friendly and helpful. If you want to have friends, be a friend.
Be cordial. Sqeak and act as if everything you do is a genuine pleasure.
Be generous with praise but cautious with criticism.
Be considerate of the opinions and feelings of others. A controversy often has three sides; yours, the other persons' and the right side. Always maintain a good sens= of humor, lots of patience, and just enough humility, and you will be rewarded many fold.
Friendliness and helpfulness are part of good manners. A good way to insure a friendly atmosphere is to consider yourself as a host. Your interest in others is what friendliness is all about, those who display it are never obliged to seek it.

Remember that square dance callers are people too and are not infallible even though they are expected to be a good example to the dancers they teach and call to. If you forget all else, just try to remember to strive for consideration for the fellings of others, patience, humility and friendliness and every square you are in will be a winner.

## SQUARE DANCE MANNERS

(Supplied by the Texas State Federation of Square and Round Dancers.)

Assuming that you always wear your best manners in public, lets talk about manners that apply specifically to square dancing. A well informed suqare dancer will follow the rules noted here:

1. Arrive on time whenever possible.
2. Form a circle or set up squares promptly when the music starts or at the callers request. Bear in mind that one can be prompt without running. A square dance is not the proper place for a 50 yard dash.
3. Join the nearest square that is forming. If all the nearby squares are filled, hold you hand up high so that the caller can either guide you to a square where you ar are needed or get some other couples to join you.
4. If time permits, introduce yourself and others within the square. You'll not only acquire a reputation for being friendly but you' 11 also acquire many new and interesting friends.
5. Listen quietly during any and all instructions from the caller. If you are an average good-hearted soul and you know the call being explained, resist the temptation to explain it to the others in your square. Let the caller do the teaching at that time. When the square is set up and ready to go, the well-informed dancer will let his fellow-dancers hear all of the professional instruction they have come to enjoy. However, after that tip, your friends may appreciate some help from you and it is perfectly in order to offer it.
6. There is no acceptable excuse for rough handling of fellow dancers. Roughness is the mark of ignorance whether by chance or by choice - and you will do well not to imitate even a more experienced dancer who has chosen to ignore this elementary rule of proper square dance conduct.
7. At the end of every dance be sure to thank the caller with your applause first, then the others in your square. They did contribute to your fun. Thank your partner, too, and escort her to a chair.
8. Friendliness is part of good manners. Square dancing promotes friendliness since it offers endless opportunities for making new friendships. If you are not continually making new friends, you are not getting the most out of square dancing. Another way to insure a friendly atmosphere is to consider yourself as a host. Friendliness comes from within yourself and can best be described as your interest in others. Those who seek it will be wise to look for it at its source; those who display it are never obliged to seek it.
9. Be a well-informed square dancer. Review these rule urles of etiquitte often.

## MAINSTREAM QUARTERLY SELECTION

For the quarter beginning October 1, 1983, the Committee has selected the movement "Ripple" for use during workshops in the Mainstream Programs. The defination of "Ripple", written by Curley Custer, followes:

From facing couples: Facing dancers join both hands with each other and circle half, then pass thru. Ends with dancers back to back.
Ripple Right, Left, In or Out. After doing the Ripple, dancers face in the direction indicated by the caller. 1. Ripple - Facing lines end with lines facing out, 8 Chain Thru ends with a trade by set up.
2. Ripple Right - 8 chain thru start and ends with right hand waves. Facing lines ends with Right Hand columns. 3. Ripple In - 8 Chain Thru ends in Facing Lines Facing Lines ends in starting Double Pass. Thru.
4. Ripple Out - 8 Chain Thru ends with lines facing out - Lines facing in ends in completed double pass thru. 5. Ripple Left will result in left handed formations but the dancers will have to adjust their ending positions.

## ADVANCED QUARTERLY SELECTION

For the quarter beginning October 1, 1983, John Marshall, Chairman of the CALLERLAB Advanced Quarterly Selection Committee has announced that Shadow To A Diamond has been selected by his committee as the 4th quarterly selection for 1983.
Shadow To A Diamond - From two-faced lines or waves, or 3 and 1 lines with the centers facing out, the ends do a normal Cast the Shadow, the center facing in will Extend and Trade, the center facing out will Split Circulate $1 \frac{1}{2}$ to become the end of an ocean wave. The result will be diamonds in one of their various forms, right-handed, left-handed, facing, etc.

## SOME TIPS, AND HINTS ON SQUARE DANCE ETIQUETTE

1 Mix around a lot - this keeps you from becoming dependant on yourfriends for help. A number system is an attempt to keep the same people from dancing together every tip and also to create a situation where each of you can meet and dance with everyone in the group.
2. Always try to be pleasant and patient with each other. Not everyone learns and dances as well as you do. 3. We are engaged in a close contact activity. We must observe the obvious courtesies of neatness, cleanliness and consideration. Halitosis and B.O. add little to the enjoyment of personal contact. Baths before comming to the dance, and Breath Mints, and anti-persperents can always help avoid embarassing situations.
4. Men - long sleeves at all times please. The ladies dislike the feel of sweaty hairy arms. You are permitted to perspire, but you don't dare be malodorous. 5. Let the people in your square hear the caller/instructor. Honest folks, he is aware of the problems in your square. If you still feel something needs more attention tell the caller after the tip.
6. Did your set break down? Don't feel bad, just learn to recover:
A. Keep listening to the caller
B. Regroup at home quickly
C. Take any partner in any sequence and form into whatever line, circle or square the rest of the floor is in.
D. Don't discuss why the group broke down during the tip, the cause is not as important as the recovery. Nobody dislikes a person who makes mistakes, they will eventuall improve, but everybody dislikes a dancer who will not regroup and help the square continue to dance.
7. Be sure to do your part as you have learned to do it properly. Being where you should be is more importan important than telling somebody else where they should have been. The "lost soul: will find the empty niche if everyone else is in the right place.
8. Please dance to the beat of the music. There are no prizes for getting there first or running over people in your way or getting back to home position before the caller or the other sets. This is particularly important in figures like grand square and four ladies chain, and etc.
9. Please be patient with your caller! Callers are people and are not infallible. You are lucky to have a caller. Your patience with the caller, and with each other is most appreciated and will be the most important lesson you will learn in your square dance expperience.
