Swingin' Eights



PRESENTING THE SWINGIN' EIGHTS

It was at the Summerville Presbyterian Church in September of 1958, that a tall, slender redhead, dressed in western clothes and sporting a badge which read "Tink Tinkler" spoke to a group of people interested in doing some square dancing -- Western style. This meeting was the result of the combined efforts of Al and Jane Manning, Russ and Doris Jenkins, and Bill and Inez Boyd, who had all recently been exposed to Western Square Dancing.

By word of mouth and through church announcements, news spread fast that there would be a square dance at Summerville Church. After three dances there were enough couples to form a club. Mannings became the first president with Tink as the first caller.

A move to Irondequoit School came in the fall of 1960, when the Swingin' Eights came under the sponsorship of the Irondequoit Recreation Commission. The first beginners' class was held at Seneca School with Tink as instructor.

A custom emerged from beginners' classes. As each couple graduated, they were asked to sign a "gallows" constructed of wood, with a swinging 8 dangling from the top piece. To this day, new dancers add their signatures, wherever they can find a space.

The Swingin' Eights added a new word to our square dancing vocabulary. In the spring of 1964 the term "angel" was first used to describe class helpers. Bud Young suggested that all the helpers be given angel badges at graduation. Our most celebrated angels were Bud and Fran Macomber, who, until they moved to Florida, angelically assisted every new class.

Round dancing was added to the Swingin' Eights in 1961, when Mike and Mary Prado volunteered their services. Round dancing continues to be a part of every Swingin' Eights dance.

Our club has contributed much to our area's square dance culture. Swingin' Eights members have been Federation presidents. The Rochester Callers Association (the predecessor of the Callers' Co-Op) was begun by many Swingin' Eights members.

The Swingin' Eights main contribution, though, is to the fun of dancing. Swingin' Eights have never lost sight of this major purpose. Our excellent caller, Bruce Shaw, makes certain that everyone enjoys dancing as well as learns new skills. Linda and Mike Liberti flavor our evenings with change-of-pace round dancing. The Swingin' Eights have a well-deserved reputation for being a friendly group. Choose one of our Saturday dances, and come see for yourself!

GOOD LEADERSHIP

The success of any square dance club; area, state or national association can be directly attributed to the competence of its management or leadership. Moreover, it is not just the expertise of the leaders of the higher organizations but the expertise of all levels from committees of a club to the top leaders of the national and international associations. All of us are either in a leadership position now or will soon be approached for a position of leadership at some level within the square dance activity. Therefore, everyone should know something about leadership.

Things do not just happen in the wonderful world of square dancing, they are brought about and made to happen Examples: National Square Dance Convention, State Conventions, Area Federation Dances, Club Specials, Club regular dance nights, Square Dance Classes, etc. Someone had to take the actions necessary to assure that the event would happen at the designated time at the designated place and all details executed at the precise planned time. To accomplish this required planning, organizing, directing, coordinating and controling. Each of these actions are part of management and leadership.

Before any square dance event at any level can be launched, a plan of action must be developed. Once a plan of action has been developed, it must be organized in such a manner as to enable it to be implemented. The square dance leader must then direct his dancers or committees to accomplish the required tasks. To obtain the "right people for the right job" requires a careful analysis of the jobs and then the recruitment, selection and training of these people. Coordination is of prime importance in the square dance activity to assure that duplication or conflicting dance dates are not scheduled and that everyone concerned knows the objectives of the event and all are working harmoniously toward those objectives. Controlling is simply making sure that what has been planned is actually accomplished - a successful dance, festival, convention or class.

Most leaders of national, state and area organizations have obtained their square dance management knowledge by experience "on-the-job" and attending Legacy and other informational training seminars. One of the major responsibilities of these top leaders of the square dance movement is to make sure that subsequent and potential leaders are properly trained to understand and apply the basic management and leadership principles that will assure the promotion and perpetuation of the square dance activity.

All square dance leaders at all levels must be know-ledgeable of the purpose, function and operation of the international, national, state and club organizations. They should also be willing to share that knowledge with fellow leaders and dancers. A good leader must be willing to expand that knowledge by self-study, attending seminars at various large and national festivals and learning from the experience and knowledge of others. Knowledge-the familiarity, awareness or understanding of the square dance activity gained through experience, study or learning process. (mandatory to be a good leader)

 $\underline{\mathsf{Speak}}$ to $\underline{\mathsf{people:}}$ There is nothing as nice as a cheerful word of greeting.

<u>Smile at people:</u> It takes 72 muscles to frown - only 14 to smile.

<u>Call people by name:</u> The sweetest music to anyone sears is the sound of his own name.

Be friendly and helpful: If you would have friends, be friendly.

Be cordial: Speak and act as if everything you do, were a genuine pleasure.

Be genuinely interested in people: You can like everybody if you try.

Be generous with praises: Cautious with criticism.

 $\underline{\text{Be considerate}};$ with the feelings of others: it will be appreciated.

Be thoughtful of the opinion of others: There are three sides to a controversy, yours - the other fellow's - and the right one.

Be alert to give service: What counts most in life is what we do for others.

Good leadership is truly an art and requires a special talent or ability to effectively deal with dancers, callers, instructors, organization leaders and the general public. The two biggest responsibilities of any square dance leader are getting the "job" done and taking care of the people in his organization. Since the job gets done through people, the leader must use his or her special talents and abilities to influence the individuals to do the job. These skills are acquired only through experience. Skill - the proficiency, ability to use one's management and square dance knowledge effectively, the expertise, trade or technique. (required to be a good leader)

The attitude or orientation of a leader in the square dance activity is very important. a sound foundation or point of reference must be available to the leader for use in comparisions. Just because someone else feels differently about a subject, such as square dance programs - mainstream, plus, advanced 1, advanced 2, challenge or round dancing at square dance events, does that mean that person has a "bad attitude"? Attitudes can change through understanding and knowledge of the subject matter. Attitude - the state of mind or feeling with regard to the square dance activity; disposition; or orientation reference. (prime concern of a good leader)

Educational institutions provide the necessary training for people to enter the business world and the business world conduct both formal management and leadership training programs for new managers and leaders. Who is training the future leaders of the square dance movement? You arel Are you a good leader? Can you say "I have developed my replacement and have provided the opportunity for all those interested in becoming leaders to gain the knowledge, skill and attitude that will promote and perpetuate the square dance activity."

John wanted to be a caller since his high school days in Cheektowaga, New York where he moved from Pensylvania when he was nine years old. John and his wife, Mae, together decided that he would take up calling. The Haleys live in Bergen and are members of the Promenading B's.

At first John did some demonstrations and made several appearances doing singing calls. Last spring he worked with Gary Bubel at the Which Way Whirlers club in Pavilion and called during Dance-O-Rama in Brockport.

To make dancing more fun, we might like to take John's suggestion not to correct others in the square while the dance is taking place. He says square dancing's biggest problem is the failure to get younger couples.

John says his greatest thrill was that first amateur callers night, and greatest enjoyment is watching people have fun. He expects his greatest challenge will be teaching basic and mainstream classes at Victor Swing-A-Longs.

RESPONSIBILITIES/DUTIES OF THE CLUB CALLER

- Maintain club dancing proficiency at the level designated by the Board of Directors of the Club.
- Conduct Club Dances as scheduled by the Board of Directors.
- Provide all sound equipment and records. Latest records will be utilized as deemed desirable by the Caller.
- 4. Conduct Club Classes in Western Style Square
- Dancing as scheduled by the Club Board of Directors.

 5. Obtain approval of the Club President of substitute Caller in event of absence.
- Attend Club Board of Directors meetings in an advisory capacity. Report on activities of Local and State Caller's Association, Callerlab, etc.. Make recommendations for improvement of Club operations.
- Promote proper square dance styling, dress, promptness, enthusiasm and attendance at Club, Area and State functions.
- Adhere to the Callerlab "Code of Ethics" to the maximum extent possible.
- Prepare and offer a variety of programs to avoid boredom and sterotyped dance nights. Periodically develop gimmicks or special events to create and atmosphere of fun and excitement. Don't let interest wane.
- 10. Present a professional appearance and attitude at all Club functions. Western style attire is required at all Club dances and square dance activities. Set an example for Club Officers and members to follow to include, dress, badge, promptness, enthusiasm, knowledge of the square dance community activities, and most important show cooperation.
- Participate in all Club functions. Mingle with the Club members to obtain the feelings of the Club dancers.
- Assist and cooperate in other Club activities as deem necessary.

MHY ARE OUR CLUBS IN TROUBLE

WHAT CAN I DO ABOUT IT?

The air is tast escaping from our square dance balloon! It will collapse if we don't apply some corrective action very soon. There are three clubs listed that dance the mainstream program regularly. There are sixteen clubs that dance the plus program regularly, and three that dance the advanced program. Doesn't that sound a little top heavy? Shouldn't any area have a solid foundation of mainstream?

It is my contention that only Mainstream Clubs should be sponsoring beginners classes. The Plus Clubs should be sponsoring workshops for the two year dancer (with a solid foundation in mainstream dancing), and the Advanced Clubs should be sponsoring Advanced Workshops. If there are only three clubs where people can go to enter square dancing successfully, how are we going to keep our balloon inflated!

A plus club with beginners classes does more harm to square dancing than if they didn't have a class. They rush the new people through class, then rush them through a workshop, (often in one year!!) so they can dance with the club the following fall! Is it any wonder that we loose 75-85% of our class? Wouldn't it be better to leave those perspective square dancers to the Mainstream Clubs, where they can obtain a solid foundation in square dancing, meet with success, and experience the joys of square dancing? Why push them out of square dancing by pushing them into plus? This makes them feel frustrated, and unacceptable because they can't keep up.

What Can I Do About It

I'm only one dancer, what can I do about it? There's lots one person can do, but it takes a lot of guts. No, not a lot of work or time, just a lot of courage! Let's start with your current program of dancing.

1. If you're an advanced dancer: Soon, if there are not enough dancers in the mainstream and plus programs, where is your club going to get new advanced dancers? Aren't you tired of dancing with people that can't handle plus yet and here they are struggling with advanced? Solution: Actively support a plus or mainstream club. Get to know and enjoy the members. Then when you invite them to your advanced workshop, they'll have friends in the advanced program that they can look forward to dancing with. They'll know you are friendly people that enjoy dancing.

Now the part that takes courage. Propose to your advanced club leaders that two years of plus dancing, and membership in either a plus or mainstream club be a prerequsit for admittance to your workshops and club membership. A prerequsit like this would insure people with good a dancing foundation, and people with friends that may want to follow them into your workshops.

2. If you're a plus dancer: Soon, if there are not enough people in the mainstream clubs, where is your club going to get new dancers from? Aren't you tired of dancing with people that can't handle mainstream with proficiency, and here they are struggling with plus? Solution: Actively support a mainstream club, get to know and enjoy the members. Help recruit new people for their beginners classes. This increased pool of mainstream dancers is vitally needed to feed the plus and advanced clubs. After people have danced mainstream for two years, you'll want to invite them to your plus workshop. You'll know they are ready and so will they. They will look forward to dancing with you and other plus dancers because they know you.

Now the part that takes courage: Make active membership in a mainstream club a prerequsit to joining your plus club and workshop. Speak to each of your club officers and persuade them that a plus club needs to be fed by well founded mainstream dancers. The only way to get these mainstream dancers is for your plus club members to be an active part of the mainstream clubs. Never allow your plus club to sponsor beginners classes. If each of your plus club members have been actively supporting the mainstream clubs, the two year mainstream dancers will be there to fill your plus workshop.

3. If you're a mainstream dancer: We had all better be if we want to keep the plus and advanced programs in this area. Unless these (precious few) mainstream clubs are healthy and successful, the plus and advanced clubs are in serious trouble. We bring new people to the mainstream class where they will achieve success and satisfaction upon graduation. The retention rate of the mainstream clubs is definitely superior to those unfortunate plus clubs that attempt to push beginners into the plus program in one year.

To sum up, let's start our new people where they should be started - in the mainstream program. There, they will attain a good foundation, with enjoyment and success. They will be retained to generate new square

dancers for years to come.

We must all actively support the mainstream clubs by regular attendance and participation. This will ensure healthy successful mainstream clubs to feed and enhence our plus and advanced clubs. Square dancing, will once again, be on a solid foundation and flourshing.
