## HENRIETTA FRIENDSHIP SQUARES

Henrietta Friendship Squares had its beginning in 1964 as a caller-run club, led by Don Pratt. Don and his wife Lucille had become interested in square dancing and joined the Genesee Dancers in the late 1950's. In 1962, Don became disabled with a back injury. While he was recuperating, he began studyling square dance calling. Later that year, Don and Lucille started holding square dance parties in their basement, with Don as caller. From these basement dance parties emerged the Henrietta Friendshlp Squares.

The first Open House was held in September 1964 at the Winslow School in Henrietta. George and Mary Tompkins, friends of the Pratts, led the club as presidents. When a full slate of officers was Installed, it was decided that Henrletta Friendship Squares should be the club's name. Don Pratt later formed two other "Friendship" clubs, one in Geneva in 1966 and one in Penn Yan in 1967.

Don Pratt's era with Henrietta Friendship Squares ended in 1971, when the long driving distance from his Fenn Yan home became too time-consuming. Two young callers, Mike Callahan and Bruce Shaw, became club caller and class instructor from 1971 to 1976.

Ben McGilvery leu the club until 1981, when Ron Fotch assumed the roles of caller and instructor. He remained with Henrietta until 1984, when he and his wife, Betty, moved to Florida.

The Friendship Squares were once again searching for a caller/instructor. Gary Bubel and his wife Alice were the unanimous choice of the board. Since 1985, they have been calling and cuing for the club, as well as instructing classes in both square and round dancing.

Henrietta friendship Squares is responsible for the creation of two major events in the square dancing season. In 1975, Jim and Connle Harper jolned other club members to sponsor the first Leukemia dance. With several callers donating time, couples danced on the Harper's front lawn. The theme of the dance was "hiapplness is a Cure". All proceeds were sent to support chlldren with leukemia. Thus, the Cure Childhood Cancer Association was formed. A dance is held every year for the benefit of children with cancer.

The George Washington Birthday Ball was also instituted by Henrietta Friendship Squares. This dance, now referred to as the President's Ball, is one of the early club/class dances. The dance wlll be held February 27, 1988 at Roth School in Henr letta. It's sure to be a great mid-winter blues chaser:

Square dancing has had its ups and downs in Henrietta, just as it has in most square dance clubs. After many years at the Finnacle Lutheran Church in Henrietta, the club had to relocate because of classroom construction at the church. We are now dancing at a beatiful facility - the Fyle School in Volkmer Parkway In Henrietta. Ve dance two Saturday evenings a month fromi 8:00 until 10:3c. The evenings vary, depending on the school schedule, so check your Promenader for the night to visit us.

After a year without a class, plus a dwindling club membership list, this coming year promises to bring new life intc our club. We have an enthusiastic class of nine couples. They are progressing very rapidly, under the patient instruction of Gary Bubel.

Henrlette Frlenciship Squares' main objective is the pronotion of all phases of Western Square Dancing. At the same time, we are having a lot of fun! Come and dance with us... Remember, "Friendship" is our middle name! For information call 624-3061 or 254-8869.

Clubs that have existed for years are folding faster than new ones are starting. Many callers have given up and quit. New callers are few and far between. Classes are down or non-existent. Class "angels" have become an endangered specles and young couple involvement in square dancing is nearly gone.

Things can't be the way they used to be, but in the case of square dancing, they should be better! with the recent trend towards the exercise craze, square dancing should be growing by leaps and bounds, but it isn't! Why? (Continued next column.)

## WHERE ARE ALL THE DANCERS?



There are three major problems with recruiting new dancers.

First is that we don't get square dancing in front of the public! With all the advertisement geared towards the exercise programs on television, the competition for new square dancers is monumental. If John Q. Public dcesn't know we exist, how can we recrult him? When we get to a potential dancer, he's already involved in another type of exercise progran. How does he know that our activity is highly recommended by many specialists as a substitute for those needing exercise and is mental relaxation for those people in high stress vocations?

How about the fun, fellowship, and making of new friendships for life? Let's go publlc with the most well kept secret in the world today! While we're at It, let's find a way to involve the younger generation!

The second problem is caused by the above situation! Most square dancers today have been dancing long enough that they've tried recrulting everyone they know perscnally and have become disenchanted with rećrulting new dancers. Because new blood isn't continually brought into the square dance world, we've narrowed our potential for growing.

New square dancers beget new square dancers! Lack of new classes has caused many club members ( especially the class helpers) to move into the higher level programis or rounds. Once this happens, it becomes even more difficult to start classes because these dancers are tied up with the ir own workshops/lessons and can't help with classes and tend not to recruit because they can't attend lessons to "angel" their new recruits.

## BE AN ANGEL.

Our third problem is the many different programs. When we try to recrult new dancers, they want to know how long they must commit their time to learn to square dance. This time varies, from area to area, but generally, it's between 25 to 40 weeks and who knows what programs they can dance when they graduate! Are they Basic, Malnstream or Plus dancers?

The new dancers don't really care untll they find out they cen't dance with their frlends who recruited them. They discover that they don't know that particular program or they're forced to dance with other new dancers because the experienced dancers avoid them. They either drop out or finelly learn whatever progran their friends are danclng. often, the new dancer is forced to dance with other new dancers in the back of the hell and continually break down, become discouraged and leave, never to return.

If they do make it and seem to have that extra potential that some have, they're besleged by others to seek a higher program before they have time to enjoy the program that they graduated into. Why can't we have only one program (not including the $A$ and $C$ programs) and just call it "Square Dancing"?

I don't care which combined, reduced, integrated or whatever list we use just as long as it can be taught in one season and the new dancer can dance with whoever and wherever he wants! I know each area has its own program and each caller/dancer has his own opinion but for the future of square dancing, let's combine our efforts to make "Square Dancing the activity it was ment to be"!

If you have any ideas/opinions to share with me, I urge you to write me and ll| compile and forward your comments to organizations that concern themselves with problems in square dancing. Maybe someone has an idea that will excite us all and do something great for our activityl Please write me!

## Rochester Caller's Co-op

## RESPONSES TO THE CCR 1987 QUESTIONNAIRE

At the request of the Callers' Cooperative of Rochester, a questionnaire was circulated through the presidents and Federation representatives of the RAF clubs, last November. 159 responses were received, and here is a summary of those responses. I consider this an excellent return, especially since $45 \%$ of the returns also had written comments in addition to simple answers to the questions. Both figures tell us that there are many dancers in the Rochester Area who are really interested in the welfare of square dancing.

This month we present a summary of the answers to the questionnaire; next month we will print all of the added comments.

The answers to Question 12: How Do You Feel About Square Dancing Today are so important that I'm going to start out with the responses to that question, and see how they relate to all the other questions. What I mean is that the answers to Question 12 say that 128 of the people responding are "Thoroughly Enjoying" square dancing, but 20\% are not:--- 26 are "Beginning to think that something is wrong", 3 are "Wondering where all the fun is', 3 are "Rapidly approaching complete burnout". In other words, 20\% are less than completely enchanted with square dancing in the Rochester Area.

Considering that anyone with a worse feeling about square dancing has already dropped out and is not available to give us answers, 1 think that these 32 responses are saying something very important to us. So, in this report $I$ include the statistics from the 32 responses, putting them in parentheses with an asterisk: (*_). If they feel the same way as the rest of the dancers, their response figures should be close to $1 / 5$ of the overall responses, so if their figures for any question don't come out that way, we'd better take a close look at that particular question.

1. One Dancer or a Couple?

64 (*10) marked down 1 dancer, although a part of them may well have been both members of a couple making separate returns.

## 2. Length of time dancing since graduation:

Less than 1 year: 7 (*2)....One year: 11 (*0)....
2 years: 10 (*2).... 3 years: 15 (*0).... 4 years:
$6(* 0) \ldots 5-8$ years: $34(* 9) \ldots$ over 8 years: $74(* 19)$.
Note that, except for the 4 -year group, the most-interested dancers were the ones with the longest experience, with $68 \%$ ( $* 88 \%$ ) of the responders having over 5 years.
3. How often do you dance?:

Less than 3 times per month: 20 ( $* 6$ ).... 3-4 times:
56 (*13)... 5-6 times: 30 (*6).... Over 6: 51 (*7).
4. What type of square dancing? (first choice includes those who are workshopping, and number after the hyphen represents second choice): Mainstream: 38-41 (*5-9)....Plus: 107-24 (*20-8) A1: 20-14 (*6-2)....A2: 17-0 (*3-0) C1: 4-0 (*1-0).
Not very surprising, unless it's the number who take MS as second choice.
5. 96 (60\%) (*25-78\%) are now or have recently been a club officer.
6. How many clubs do you regularly dance with?

One club: 69 ( $(17) \ldots . .2$ clubs: 49 ( ${ }^{(10)}$
3 clubs: 23 (*4)....More than 3: 16 (*1).
7. How many callers do you regularly dance with?

One caller: 60 (*16).... 2 callers: 50 (*8)
3 callers: 25 ( $* 5$ )....More than 3: 21 (*3).
We also have some cross-comparisons here: 57 responses (36\%) danced at 1 club to 1 caller....32 (20\%) at 2 clubs to 2 callers.... 9 for 3 clubs and callers....
12 at more than three of each.
While one might expect dancers to follow a favorite caller to more than one club, just the opposite happens: there are 15 that dance at one more club than caller, and 2 that claim one caller at 3 clubs. On the other side there are 29 who put down one more caller than clubs, and 2 with two clubs and 4 callers. The most likely explanation is that they belong to at least one club that has more than one regular caller.

## 8. Time of year dancing in Rochester:

All year: 100 (*16).....Not in summer: 51 (*15) Not in winter: 7 (*1).
Maybe we were too late in the year to catch a lot of the snow-birds. No information on whether one-third of the dancers prefer not to dance in the summer, or their club is unable to hold summer sessions.
9. Dance during extended stays out of town:

Regularly: 21 (*4).....Occasionally: 37 (*11)
Never: 39 (*9).
10. Dance while traveling: Frequently: 18 (*4).....Occasionally: 57 (*12) Never: 57 (*14).
11. Travel to conventions, festivals, party weekends, \&e Frequently: 25 (*4)....Occasionally: 85 (*20) Never: 40 (*8).
--- The following ratings are on a scale of 1 to 5:
13. The idea of this question is to get a dancer's rating of his original class teacher, after he/she has had enough experience in club dancing to be able to evaluate how good his instruction was. A minimum of 30 dances with callers other than the class teacher were asked for. The responses were:

Excellent (5): 54 (*9)....Good (4): 52 ( $\mathrm{*}^{(10)}$
Fair (3): 6 (*4)....Poor (1): 1 (*1).
The Area dancers appear to be well-satisfied with their class instruction, although the 32 commenters are a little less so than the others (Remember that the starred answers are also included in the total count, so for instance there are only 2 'Fair' answers outside the group of 32).
14. Dancers were asked to write in ratings for as many local callers as they had had experience with, with a minimum of 3 dances with the caller. The dancers were asked to write the figures in the order of the amount of experience they had with each caller up to a total of five callers. There were 67 ( $* 14$ ) that rated only one caller, and $30(* 27)$ that did not put down any rating. The three figures below are the numbers of responses for ratings of 5-4-3 (only one return gave a rating of 1 in the fifth place):

First caller: 72-53-5.... Second caller: 36-20-5
Third caller: 10-22-13....Fourth caller: 7-9-4 Fifth caller: 1-2-7.
Altogether, it appears that Rochester dancers are wellsatisfied with at least several of the local callers. Callers' names were listed on several of the returns, and these will not be divulged, except that two or three of the returns, apparently from Geneva, mentioned Cubby Van Loon.
15. Do you think your club is losing dancers because of the caller?:

No: 118.....No answer: 33 ( $\mathrm{k}^{2}$ ).....Yes: 8 (6).
The number of people who could not answer No should be considered a danger sign. (Continued next page.)

## Callers Co-op (continued)

16. Does your caller/class teacher lose patience with his dancers? (Answers in the order Never-Occ.-Yes):

Club: 141-3-1 (*28-1-0).....Class: 86-2-8 (*15-2-4).
The high number of yeses for the class is regrettable. We do not have any way of finding out how many callers are responsible for these answers.
17. Do you think your caller draws dancers to the club?: Yes: 111 (*16).....Not sure: 3 (*1)....No: 20 (*9).
Some of the no-answers and the negative answers indicated that there were other reasons that their club attracts dancers (sociability, friendliness, etc.).
18. Do you think you gain or lose dancers because of
(a) Location: Gain 73 (*14), Lose 19 (*7)
(b) Dance night, Gain 59 (*14), Lose 42 (*9)
(c) Club's attitude to strangers, 98 (*19), 12 (*2)
(d) Attitude toward new dancers?: 83 (*14), 21 (*7) Four additional sections of this question were poorly constructed, so that dancers were confused at how to answer, and the meaning of their answers was difficult to determine.... The answers to question (d) reinforce the widespread opinion that many club dancers, especially in Plus clubs, do not like dancers who "drag down the level' ${ }^{1}$ of the dancing.
19. a. Is there something you do not like about your caller?: No: 115 (*17), Yes: 22 (*11)
b. Do you wish you could talk to him about it? No: $40(* 7)$, Yes: $10(* 5)$
c. Would you like to replace him?: No: 88 ( $* 16$ ), Yes: $2(* 0)$, Not sure: 3
It's too bad that there is any dancer who feels that his/her caller can't accept suggestions.
20. How would you go about replacing your caller?

The large majority of those responding (108) marked the obvious compromise answer: Have a serious conference with the caller to correct his actions before firing him. 16 would like to ask for advice, but a majority of these did not have any idea where to ask. Two each voted for hire first then fire, and fire before hiring.
21. Do you feel that you can talk to your caller about problems? The responses were 131 (*24) yes, 4 (*3) no.

The no's here and even the 24 no-answer's are most unfortunate. Again, we don't know how many callers these responses apply to.
22. Rate the teacher of your present class (again in the numbers of 5's - 4's - 3's):

Club caller teaches: 31-31-8 ( $22-10-3$ );
Other caller teaches: 11-17-5 (*0-6-2).
It seems that the 32 commenters think there's not much excellence in class teaching.
23. 4 ( $* 2$ ) think the caller is paid too much, 20 ( $* 4$ ) think he should get more, and $86(* 21)$ think it's just about right. Lots didn't know how much their caller is getting paid.
24. 21 had attended at least one Leadership meeting. There were not enough ratings to be meaningful, and all comments are included in a separate section. See next month's Promenader.
