Timing: 16-18 beats.
About the Quarterly Selections...
The purpose of the Mainstream Quarterly Selection is to provide directed variety for the Mainstream program. These calls are not a mandatory part of any program, but are to be used at the caller's discretion. Dancers are not to be held accountable for selections past or present. A QS call should be verbally mentioned and, if any dancers don't know it, physically workshopped prior to being called the first time at an open dance.

## LEGACY LOOKS TO THE NINETIES

These are only a few of the present committee projects now in progress.

Square dancing may see a surge in membership as baby boomers mature in the nineties and seek soclal activity to contrast with their high-tech job responsibilities. Legacy trustees will seek to prepare themselves and square dancers to meet this moment when it arrives and welcome these new dancers to the activity.
