COLLEGIOS member

Familiar and Predictable

On my way to work the other day I heard on the radio that a survey concluded the kind of TV programs most people like are those that are familiar and predictable. For years we have been lamenting we are losing out to the couch potato. We wonder why fewer and fewer people enter our beginner classes and still fewer remain to dance with the club. Maybe this is a clue and we ought to sit up and listen. Would we like to tap this vast resource - or, at least, stop the leak?

Assuming the survey was true, I made a list of the qualities I thought a successful TV show, i.e. the Cosby Show, should have. I came up with:

Familiar and predictable most of the time Entertaining - simple humor that most can relate

Variety of situations within a limited framework Non-offending to any particular group Convenient - "prime time"

How many of these qualities do we need in our square dance programs? How can we apply this to the square dance environment?

Callers and many dancers alike have been preaching just the opposite for maximum pleasure - unfamiliar and unpredictable. We think the dancer has to be constantly challenged or he will go away.

Some prominent caller-educators believe that the majority of current dancers represent "survivors" who, having endured the indignities bestowed on a new dancer, thrive on a high learning pace because of the excitement of more challenge and the desire to excel. They also believe that too much challenge fosters competition and division of abilities rather than the cohesive atmosphere there should be in a club. If this is true, where does this leave those who are out for a social night of fun and friendship? Are these the couch potatoes who have tried square dancing and returned to being couch potatoes? JEDDY CADMEN

Familiar and Predictable Continued

How does this relate to the "rush to plus"? How much dancer success is necessary to keep the new graduate in the activity - or better yet, have him remain a member of your club? How can this be combined with sufficient variety to satisfy the experienced club member? These are good questions, but ones which have no simple answer and are dependent on the attitude of the club and the ability and judgment of the caller.

Even though it may appear they do not practice it, many callers realize that high dancer success (not breaking down much) is a key to retention. Most callers also realize that a certain amount of challenge is necessary to add excitement and variety to the evening. Actually the most difficult part of a caller's job is to know how much challenge to add in without significantly affecting dancer success. As you know, some of us do it better than others.

What is challenging to a new grad is not necessarily challenging to the experienced dancer. If a club were to apply the criteria of the successful TV program to its new graduates, how many would they retain vs. how many current club members would leave in search of more challenge? It's my guess more would be retained than lost. If this is true, we have our choice. We can dance a high level with few dancers or we can dance a lower level with many.

Our survival strongly depends on a constant flow of new people coming into the club. If this flow should stop, it's like shutting off the faucet to the sink with a leaky drain. The sink will eventually empty. Club officers are faced with a dilemma. Keep the level high and discourage most of the new people or lower the level and risk losing some of the others. Club officers have to realize that every one cannot be pleased the entire evening and some will be louder than others on the parts that they don't particularly like. One might ask if we really want to retain those that are only concerned with their own pleasure and are unwilling to compromise to help the club grow? It's a difficult choice, but one that has to be weighed and made. When doing this, keep in mind that businessmen know that a satisfied customer will keep on returning but probably not say much, but a dissatisfied one will not only stay away, but will tell everyone who will listen what a bad deal he got. Since our classes largely rely on new members bringing in next year's crop, it is to our benefit not to turn these people off. Our activity has always relied mostly on word of mouth and friends bringing in friends to grow.
