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## A View From the Square

CARMEN'S COLLUNN in November was pretty much right on the money. If you have a club dancing any amount of Plus material, you cannot mix in new class graduates without either frustrating and losing the graduates, or lowering the level thereby frustrating and losing the experienced dancers.

My solution is not to have classes directly associated with clubs, but rather have the Federation operate a small number of large classes at geographically strategic locations. Class graduates could decide on any future course of action, ranging from joining an easy level mainstream club to starting on a Plus class. They would not be "gullted" into staying with the club that graduated them.

The benefits of classes not linked to clubs are many. It is always more attractive to participate in a class with six squares than just one or two; the activity would seem to be more alive and flourishing. There would be less chance of having a student sit out a tip. Angels would not have to attend as many dances. You could use the area's most competent teachers to impress the students. Money could be saved by renting fewer halls for classes, and paying fewer teachers. You might even save enough to cut the students' dance fee. More important than any other issue is that the Federation as a whole would lose fewer dancers.

On another toplc, please be careful about call definition books. We recently received one in the mail that contains many distorted and dead-wrong call descriptions. My favorite example in the book dealt with the call "recyclen. The definition given: 1. From a wave, women u-turn. 2. Couples turn to center. 3. Ending. My opinion is that the definition may as well have been written in anclent Gaelic.

There are several ways that you could be thinking about recycle. The 1960's definition is not too bad: Centers of the wave fold on the nearest end; then the four dancers single file promenade one quarter around their box; then all turn to face the center of the box; ends in facing couples. My 1991 definition is a tiny bit more accurate: all hinge, all split circulate, then all turn to face the center of the box. Finally, the advanced dancer should learn recycle as follows: centers fold while the end steps ahead slightly, and all form normal columns (1/3); all split counter rotate (2/3) and roll (3/3). Notice that nothing is mentioned about people of specific sex, or anybody doing a uturn.

## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

I was pleased to read a response to my September column in the PROMENADER. It is generous of the PROMENADER staff to provide a platform for opinions and opposing points of view. It is only through this type of interchange we can get to know what our real problems are and look for ways to fix them.

In reply to Ron Ehrlich, who wrote the letter, his response is a good example of how much the details mean to us depending where we are in the program ladder. Most people don't give a hoot as long as they don't mess up the square. Without being specific, definitions describe the action of a particular call so others can replicate them. The definitions are rules, which in a lot of cases are made to be broken, altered, spindled or in other ways mutilated. Although I think he missed the point of the article. he is correct in assuming that I think each dancer has his own set of rules and each caller has his own ideas on how to teach the calls. Has he ever watched a square circle to a line? I also know that some calls are done differently in different parts of the country. I have seen differing interpretations time and time again right up through $\mathrm{C}-1$ (which is as far as I go). Several times I have taught a call reciting the CALLERLAB definition only to have experienced dancers say "We don't do it that way" or, "That isn't how I learned it." I wrote a call myself some years back I didn't recognize when it was published in the square dance "dictionary". Over the years, a number of calls have been changed so more could be done with them. I can name others which are taught one way to beginners and another way when you are more "advanced". I am guilty of similar transgressions, transforming the definition when I think it will help the dancers learn the call easier.

All of the above are meaningless details to most dancers. Ultimately, the caller wants to present danceable choreographic patterns and the dancer wants to be able to follow the caller. If the two can get together no matter what the level, then both are happy. If the caller says two men chain, and the floor can do it, who gives a darn if it doesn't fit the definition? Note: our basic program list does not have men chain - only ladies chain!

Orlo Hoadley's letter "Let's Stop the Bleeding!" in the December/January PROMENADER has sparked some thoughts.

Times change. So do lifestyles, fashions, social attitudes, and yes, even recreations. In order to be a successful leader, caller, business person, sales person, or whatever your life's endeavor is, you must change and be willing to adapt to new ideas. The "good old days" are gone forever and, no doubt, today's ideals will someday be the "good old days" for my generation.

Like it or not, modern square dancing has evolved into what it is today. Square dancing is not for everyone. Neither is golf, bowling, cross-country skilng, nor playing bridge. Compare a person's 土ime for recreation to a ple that square dancing is competing with other recreations for a slice. That slice is a lot smaller than it was 20 years ago. Perhaps we should-try to think of new recruiting methods that will make square dancing more attractive to today's lifestyle.

Lastly, I must take exception to Orlo's making no effort to get anybody interested in square dancing because he "refuses to be a person who sells the poor innocents a blll of goods." How can we be a judge of what a person wlll or will not like? Sure, there will be dropouts just as there are in any other recreation. But there also will be people who will enjoy the exercise, the sociability, the traveling and, yes, even the challenge.

Orlo Hoadley makes good points in the December issue about making square dancing more attractive to new dancers. I agree that "we do not get repeat buslness if the customer is not satisfied."

Jerry Carmen, in his November column, explained the problems: too long a learning period, and dancers unwilling to dance at the Malnstream level. The result: discouraged class graduates who soon decide that square dancing is not for them.

Since hundreds of clubs have tried their best ideas with little success, perhaps it is time to look at the other slde of the ledger: to the professionals. Specifically, this means CALLERLAB, where callers make up lists of "levels." It is these professionals who set the tone, who can lead dancers to feel that they must dance at some level to be considered "good dancers," or who can lead them away from the idea.

Perhaps we should look back to about 1970, when square dancing was active and growing, and ask what was different. First, there were no formal levels such as we have today. There was an informal "club level" that varied some from place to place. Almost everyone danced at Club Level and they were obvlously enjoying it.

Today, Jerry Carmen's teaching list has 77 calls (plus variations) for Mainstream. Then there are 29 more for Plus Level--108 for today's standard level. On the 1971 list, there were 50 Basics and 25 "Extended Basics." Those 75 were what everyone was expected to know. By today's measure there were only about 65, because some were variations of other basics or too simple to list (one was "Walk").

Why then, were dancers happy with 65 calls in 1971 and unhappy in 1991 with 108? I think the answer is that people want to dance for fun and sociability, not to be continually challenged. Was it boring with only 65 basics? No, because callers were accustomed to creating variety with basics, and because frequently some new experimental call was introduced. The important difference was: we were not expected to remember these calls. They were learned and enjoyed for an evening, and then forgotten.

Another unfortunate result of the "levels" is that the dancer-operated club--the heart of the hobby--gets hit from both ends: it is hard to get new members, and then the more enthusiastic ones are drained off by the "Advanced" clubs, where they no longer help to bring in beginners.

My message to callers is this: "Go back and listen to the tapes and records, and read the magazines, of the $70^{\prime}$ s. Recall what it was that brought people into square dancing and kept them there. Take this message to CALLERLAB and start working for sensible programs that promote fun and sociability instead of competition and ill feeling. it will take a few years to turn the trend around. But we must get started or there will be fewer and fewer dancers to pay your fees."

## LETTERS TO THE <br> EDITOR

In November the Caller's Cooperative of Rochester (CCR) held a very informative and interesting round table discussion of square dancing concerns and problems. A number of club offlcers, callers, cuers, Federation reps, PROMENADER editors, reporters, and dancers participated in a lively session discussing many topics.

One concern that has been around as long as square dancing itself is $R \& R$, or recruitment and retention of dancers. Orlo Hoadley made some very apt comments about this aspect in the last issue of the PROMENADER. But other comments and questions about our activity were also raised, which deserve further deliberation. Some of these were:

1) How can the relationship between the Federation, CCR, and the ciubs be improved?
2) Why doesn't the Federation promote dancing for the clubs?
3) Is a 30 -week commitment for class too long?
4) Why are some clubs more successful than others In recruitment?
5) How can we aftract young people to square dancing?
6) Mall demonstrations are ineffective for recruting new dancers.
7) New club officers are uninformed and illprepared.
8) Club presidents should meet to discuss topics of mutual interest.

These matters have been kicked around for years at varlous forums and meetings, and it sometimes seems that we are getting no closer to resolving them than we ever were. But there are new people joining the activity every year with new ideas, and we should seek their input.

Another opportunity for discussion and debate is the annual Leadership Conference and Dancer Forum sponsored by CCR to be held on Sunday, February 2. This event will involve a panel discussion and is scheduled to start at 2:00 p.m. at the Covenant United Methodist Church, 1124 Culver Road. Everyone who is interested in the future of square dancing is urged to attend and put forth their oplnions and ideas. Who knows--someone may come up with just the right idea or plan to rejuvenate our activity.

Round Dancing will use 110,299 square feet, enough to accommodate over 3,000 couples.
Clogging will have 5,800 square feet assigned, Contra 4,400 and Hoedown 3,600.
Additional space has been reserved and allocated for non-dancing activities such as the Showease of Ideas, Education Seminars, Sewing activities and, of course, space for vendors of every imaginable type of dance related merchandise.
Besides the Convention Center which we will occupy fully, the Convention organizers have been able to reserve excellent space in RiverfrontColiseum and in the 5 largest Downtown Hotels including the Clarion, the Hyatt Regency, the Westin, the Terrace Hilton and the Omni Netherland Plaza. All these hotels are just a short walk from the Convention Center. In addition, we will make good use of Riverfront Coliseum which is a short ride by shuttle bus from the Convention Center and the surrounding hotels. Aside from good dancing space, the Coliseum offers seating for 16,000 tired dancers to watch the Fashion Show, the Parade of States and the Bid Session for the 1996 Convention.
There will be continuous shuttle service between the Convention Center and the Coliseum and the various Hotels as well as the large camp grounds and certain hotels outside the Downtown area. And walking is easy since downtown Cincinnati features a series of Skywalks linking the hotels to the Convention Center.
