## A View From the Square

Thirty years ago, a significant attraction to new dancers was the opportunity to participate in an activity dressed in flamboyant Olde Western costumes. It was as if you were being transported via time machine to the year 1850, to the state of Kansas on a Saturday night, to an atmosphere of kerosene lanterns, wood floors, barbershop quartets, and live musicians. The dance hall would boast dozens of squares of brightly dressed dancers moving gaily to the beat. When a dancer entered the door to a square dance in 1968, like EKC-O Squares, the old west nostalgia was overpowering. Newly graduated square dancers eagerly anticipated the ritual of picking out their first western outfit for graduation. Dancers of every age group were in abundance.

In 1992, our clubs are smaller, and, regrettably more subdued. The western flavor has begun to disappear. The average dancer age is above 55. Some dancers feel that if they can't wear street clothes to a dance, they would rather drop the entire activity. Some dancers that do dress western would rather not attend dances where some of the other people show up in street clothes.

We may never be able to recapture the flavor of 1960 dancing. Not everyone can afford to make or buy western wardrobes. What we may be able to do in each club, is to structure dress codes to accommodate differing tastes. Dancers in each club could vote to make their club one of the following types:

- Type A: members and quests are expected to wear western clothes to every dance

- Type B: some dances will be exclusively western dress, while other dances will be targeted as informal dress

- Type C: all dances will be targeted as informal dress


Once the members voted to make their club one of these three types, that choice would be displayed next to the dance listings at the back of the Promenader. That way, no one would show up at a dance dressed improperly.

Each club would also need to explicitly define "western dress" as it applied to that club's dances. Men required to wear ties or boots or slacks with big belt loops? Ladies required to wear skirts or dresses or petticoats?

Shifting to choreography discussion, let's look at the call, Wheel Around, called from an all four couples promenading star setup. It is really important, from a square survival standpoint, that following a Wheel Around, all dancers line themselves up with either a head wall or a side wall. When a set is in a facing lines of four setup, it is imperative that these lines be parallel to either a head or side wall, rather than diagonally oriented. In fact, the only formations that are exceptions to this rule are Circles and Alamos.

Look at this scenario: couples are promenading, and the calls Heads Wheel Around, Pass Thru, and Bend the Line are given. There is a major probability of square breakdown here if the entire set does not agree to be parallel to either the North-South walls or the East-West walls. Take the time when you see your alignment becoming diagonal, to adjust your square back to wall orientation. This will also give a more uniform look to any spectators.

#### LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

#### "HOW DO WE STOP THE BLEEDING"

Square dancing in general has been losing dancers at an alarming rate. Yet, while some square dance clubs are weak and even dying, others are vibrantly alive and growing. What makes the difference?

1) First and most important, dancers and clubs must have a positive attitude!

2) We must constantly promote square dancing to attract new dancers.

 We must provide the dancing skills to allow dancers to reach a level that they will enjoy.

4) We must have square dance clubs that provide such an enjoyable experience that dancers remain dancing.

5) We must attempt to attract the drop-out dancers back to dancing.

The five points are easy to outline but how do we implement these ideas? Here are some ideas:

A POSITIVE ATTITUDE: Some people always have a positive attitude, some have it sometimes, some never have it. I'm betting on square dancers predominately having a positive attitude! It's the nature of people that once, twice, or more times a week, join fellow dancers in an evening of fun and fellowship! Next time you are in a square, smile and let your fellow dancers know how much fun you are having. A smile is a very powerful tool. If you are not having fun, analyze the situation and try to determine why you are not. Communicate your feelings to your club officers.

ATTRACTING NEW DANCERS: After various parade floats, public demonstrations and prime newspaper coverage of Boots 'N' Slippers, my conclusion is...one on one, person to person, word of mouth advertising is the best way to attract new dancers!

DANCING SKILLS: ! believe that for the most part our square dance teachers and club callers do a great job keeping our dancing skills where they should be. If you believe otherwise, share your concerns with your teacher, caller, and officers.

ENJOYABLE DANCING: "We throw a party every Friday night,...at this party we dance." I quote Manny Schwartz. Manny has been very successful with this approach. When was the last time your club threw a party?

DROP-OUTS: Approach your drop-outs, invite them back and make the return to dancing easy. BOOTS 'N' SLIPPERS is offering workshops for returning drop-outs. Ask the hard questions to find out why they "really" left your club. It might tell you something about your club that you NEED to know.

**CLUB OFFICERS:** It is up to YOU to guide your club to success. In some cases you must be willing to change, to see a new point of view. Seek out those people that have special talents and get them involved. You must give your dancers a sense of belonging and commitment.

DANCERS: Help your officers, they have much to do. If you have a real concern, bring it to an OFFICERS MEETING. If the concern remains, remember: that we elect new officers each year!

How do we stop the bleeding? We don't! The bleeding will always be with us, life is that way. But we can and must SLOW the bleeding and with the INFUSION of new blood, your club and square dancing can and will grow healthier!

#### DO SQUARE DANCERS GROW ON TREES?

No, they do not and I agree with Orlo, the blood bank is quite dry. Square dancers do not grow on trees, but they seem to be still living in the trees and the leaves are withering and blowing away.

It's a known fact that men must reproduce themselves. The real struggle began when we started to become civilized and had to earn a living. First apprenticeship days. Then we worked and had leisure time. We used this time to play games like golf, which started in the 14th century in the Netherlands, then baseball which started in 1879--square dancing came much later. Henry Ford was an avid square dancer. Golf is a very large sponsor and subsidizer of teenage people. Baseball does likewise.

Square dancers think new dancers grow on trees. They don't. Where are our teenage clubs? We really should try to organize them. It would give them an alternative to the alcohol, drug and bed activity. It would be very nice if we could have a Federation that could have as one of its goals the organizing of the teenagers.

It has been mentioned that we lose many class people before graduation. This is very true. Again, it seems as though poor organization and improper use of "angels"--some who are unskilled and, especially after the 12th week, could be the reason. New members lost after graduation is mostly due to inconsiderate remarks made by experienced dancers who forget they were once class graduates. Also lack of fun, sociability and stress of level.

Paul and I have been dancing 24 years. We have danced with the Davidsons', Hoadleys', Ehrlich's, Mike Callahan, Jerry Carmen, et. al. We have danced at many levels.

As we read the **PROMENADER**, we feel the clubs represented therein radiate pleasure with the social side, as well as dancing.

We have attended CCR, Leadership and Federation meetings. The problem of recruiting and retaining club members has always been on the agenda.

It appears that the complaint being made is with levels. Our observation is that the people who have gone on to higher levels, did so because they enjoyed the challenge to their minds and bodies. (Most would have dropped out of dancing if they had not been offered more challenging calls.) We think the people who are unhappy with levels are forgetting that the Challenge dancers are still part of the square dance community.

Mike Callahan was right in saying "dancing is just a piece of the recreational pie". If you look at any recreation - jogging (some go one mile--others five), tennis (some play for fun--others competitively). Bowlers, bridge, swimming all are the same--even walkers vary their time and length of their walk.

As people look for inexpensive ways to have fun, more will join square dancing. We need more newspaper ads for Open Houses.


There have been many articles lately about what is causing the demise of square dancing with a multitude of various reasons given.


We hear Theresa Closser has graduated to a cane. Hope that foot gets mended very soon.
