PROMOTION OF ADDITIONAL SQUARE DANCE GROUPS NEEDED IN THE AREA

Since the spring of 1961 there haven't been any new clubs added to the Rochester Area Federation; particularly, recreational groups sponsored by an industrial firm. It seems to us that in an area as large as Rochester, with others an opportunity to enjoy the same the many manufacturing plants with their recreational programs, there is certainly room for a square dance program.

Looking around the country we find many industrial firms sponsoring square dance clubs. Kaiser Aluminum Plant at Ravenwood, West Virginia, started with a mere four couples last year and now has a membership of over two Guide Lamp Division of G.M. has a program that has become so popular that they have built a special lodge on the outskirts of town to take care of this ever growing These are only two of the many hundreds throughout the country that have been mentioned in the National Magazine of Recreation in Business & Industry. In our town, the Eastman Kodak Company sponsors the only industrial club.

We feel certain that if the Recreation Directors of the plants in which some of our readers work, were alerted to this type of program and were invited to visit some of the clubs in the area, this sort of activity would be a welcome addition to their activities program.

As of this writing, we have received encouraging reactions to such a plan from Mr. Arden Howland, director of employee activities for the Rochester Gas & Electric Corp. Mr. Howland and his associate, Mr. James Fassenella, have been invited, along with their "taws" to attend both a regular dance night at EKC-0 Squares and an instruction session of our beginners class

The RGSE has ample auditorium space at their operation on Jefferson Road for a sizeable dancing club.

You, as a square dancer, may help by talking up such a program with your Recreational Departments' Directors and thereby give recreation in which you, yourself, are having so much fun.

It might be pointed out to them that these clubs are practically self sufficient if a place to dance is provided. An additional activity at no added cost to their budget - what more can one ask!

Contact your Federation through the board of directors of your club or through the editors of PROMENADER for more information. If you are able to generate some interest, we will be most happy to provide a coordinating committee to meet with the prospect to assist in getting things under way.

To further this aim, we generally accept into membership only those who already belong to, and who agree to continue to support, one of the other local clubs.

We have also sponsored several advanced workshop series, open to all local club level dancers.

Since our founding, we have been fortunate to continue dancing regularly on the 2nd, 4th and 5th Fridays at the Barn, and Don Duffin, the old smoothie, continues to delight and challenge us with his now expert calling.

Over the years our series of capable officers have democratically managed to maintain our original goal, with the happy result that our slogan, "We Dance For Fun," has indeed come true.

Dip slips in above solution and hang on line to drip dry. No ironing is necessary; if needed, use a very cool iron to press. If whitish residue remains on dried petticoats, it can be shaken or lightly brushed off.
