Three members of the Rochester Callers Association will augment the fine staff already scheduled for Dance-O-Rama.

Bill Bartsch, Bob Brunshidle and Myron Huss have agreed to call - which makes this year's group the largest (and probably the finest) array of talent in Dance-O-Rama history.

CREDIT WHERE CREDIT IS DUE
(Views of a neophyte caller)
Consider the "national" caller who "tours" an area, or even the country, for a goodly number of months and rarely stops off at the same city, or club, twice the same year. His preparation for a 3-hour calling stint must be worked out carefully ONCE.

Each engagement places him and his material in front of a fresh, new audience. A year or two from now a return engagement to the same town, same club, nets him an audience of brand new dancers fresh out of basics to whom the visiting caller's material hasn't become "old hat". This new, eager group has been nurtured by none other than your local club caller.

Consider the "club" caller. Week after week he appears before the <u>same</u> group or groups. As his dancers become more proficient, their lust for something new, something different, grows -- and Mr. Club Caller is expected to deliver the fresh, new material to the same audience. A lot of credit goes to the introduction of new figures like swing thru, spin the wheel and island chain which maintain interest. Revival of older figures or routines like teacup chain, hey, and riptide also fill this need.

But, let's give credit where credit is really due; to the club caller who can take the basics, the new figures, the almost forgotten routines and weave them into evening after evening of enjoyment for the same people week after week. His preparation for the next performance is not just a sometimes thing. Each club night he must feed the appetites of his dancers with an attractive menu requiring a dressing up of the same old hash with a side dish of something old, something new and something borrowed to interest YOU.
