21-24 Repeat action of Meas 17-20 in RLOD, ending in BUTTERFLY pos M facing wall, both hands joined.

EKC-0 SQUARES TO HOST 1964 DANCE-O-RAMA
The EKC-0 SQUARES will host Rochester's 6th Annual Dance-O-Rama which is sponsored by the Rochester Area Federation of Western Round and Square Dance Clubs. April 18, 1964 will find the Kodak Park Recreation Center "Swingin" and "Swayin" to the calls of the Rochester and four national callers. The larger facilities at Kodak will accommodate the increased needs of Rochester's fast growing square and round dance enthusiasts.

The growth of the activity also permits an expanded dance menu to whet the appetites of all area dancers. The plans for the banquet are not complete; however, the chefs providing the culinary art will be the Rochester callers along with Al Brundage of Westport, Connecticut; Earl Johnston of Vernon, Connecticut; Lloyd Litman and Frank Mayerske of Cleveland, Ohio. The hash, patter and singing calls will be a gourmet's delight.

Late last year Earl Stafford, the 1963 Dance-O-Rama general chairman, and Ralph Weber, executive secretary of the Federation, made preliminary arrangements with the Eastman Kodak Company which resulted in the invitation to hold the Dance-O-Rama at Kodak as the guests of the EKC-0 Squares. The facilities will accommodate over 800 dancers with adequate room for each square.

QUICKIE WORKSHOP SQUARE CHAIN THRU

Position: Squared Up Set

Active couples Half-Square Thru, but instead of pulling partner by hang on to her left hand and pull her around to both face back into set--chain ladies diagonally to opposite man who takes her left hand in his left hand and pulls her by to end up in Eight Chain Thru position with men facing their Right Hand Lady and original partner alongside facing her Corner.

Position: Two Couples Facing In Middle After Dive Thru.

Same as above except when men pull opposite ladies by, both couples end up facing out of set with backs opposite to home position and original partner alongside.
