## IN MEMORIAM

Apparently, the recording companies are being named as the culprits on this matter since they are now attempting pressure on the callers who use their recording facilities not to permit taping at dances. The underlying fact remains that our copywrite laws are not new, they always have been there but we all sort of looked the other way and no one was getting hurt. Except, a few of the dancing public began to use the tapes to promote dances, using tapes, and charging admission. This causes a slump in sales of records, both square and rounds. We have even noted comment in other journals that evidence indicates "dancers" would take a record on trial, tape it and return it to the store on the basis of not liking it!

## THERE'S DANCING AT THE FAIR

Word has reached us of the appointment of popular Al Brundage as Director and Coordinator of Square Dancing for the New York World's Fair in 1964.

Al is now lining up groups who would like to participate in the square dance--round dance demonstrations of regular club level for an hour on Tuesday nights beginning May 19, 1964 and running thru Sept. 22, 1964. Dancing will take place in the outdoor amphitheater and will be postponed to Wednesday night in case of rain.

There is room for approximately eight squares and the whole affair will be run much like a regular club dance. Al is expecting thousands of spectators at each session. He plans to use nationally known callers and will try to line them up by states. Thus, when a Michigan caller is on, Michigan dancers will be encouraged to register and make it a Michigan night.

Al requests that any interested groups contact him so that their names can be registered. He is attempting to have the registrants sign up a whole set at a time but apparently will also accept couples who cannot arrange to bring an entire square.

Generally, the callers who have worked with Al at Funstitute and various weekends and Festivals will be featured. It appears that our end of the state will be represented by "The Voice", Art Harris. Tentative calling date for Art at the Fair is June 30, 1964.
