Henry comments that the more grievous mourners will be those who spent many years in guiding the affairs, building on the fragile framework to accomplish a record of growth which culminated in having Detroit act as host to the 10th National Convention. The 10th was attended and enjoyed by a goodly number of Rochester area dancers.

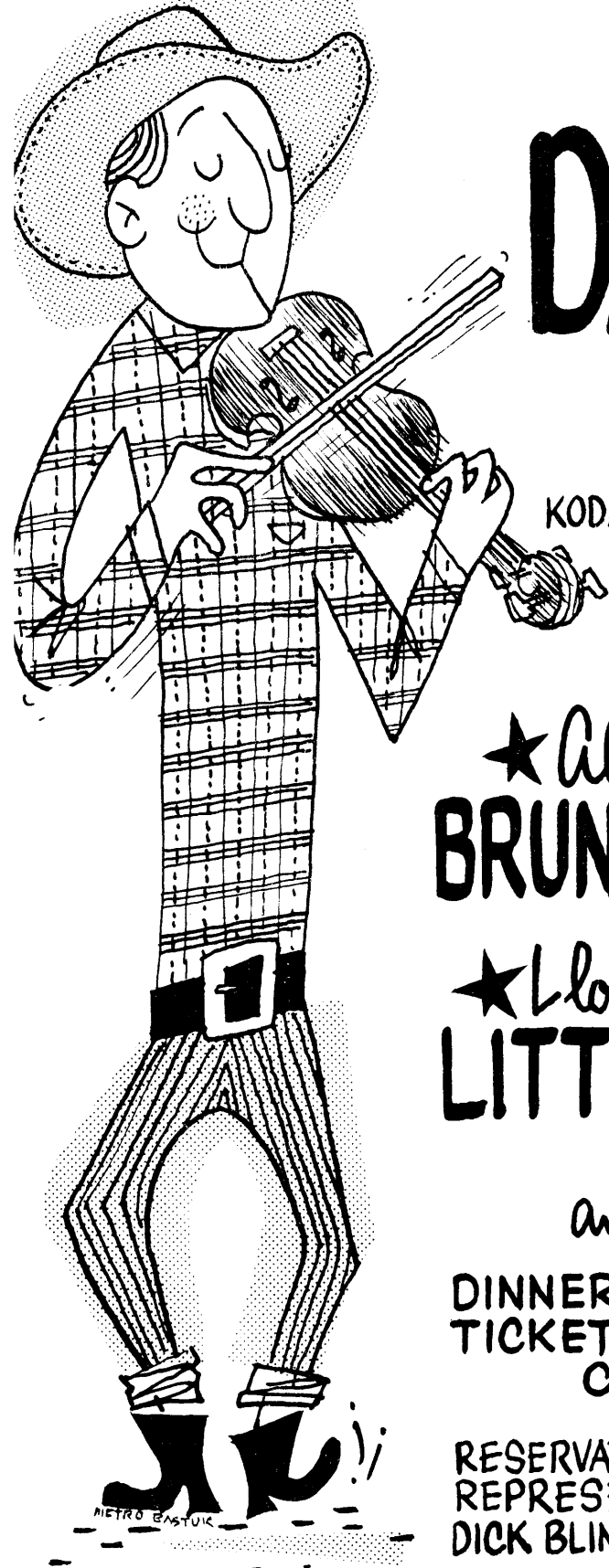

DO YOU LIKE HOT, DILL PICKLES?

At the "after party" for Red Bates, a number of guests remarked about the "hot" flavor of the home made dill pickles which are a specialty of Joe and Audree Brodner, president of the Irondequoit Squares.

By special permission, PROMENADER is pleased to print the Brodner recipe as follows:

Use clean, firm, freshly picked pickles, otherwise the pickles may be hollow and soft. They should be not more than four inches long and not more than one or two days old. Wash and brush pickles and place in ice to chill. Snip ends and place in jar. Then add:

½ hot pepper
small stalk of celery
½ or medium clove garlic
1 tablespoon salt
small amount of dill
add cold water and seal the jar.

Shake jar to dissolve salt, and jar should be shaken twice a day for about four days, as salt will settle to bottom.

Pickles may be eaten after two weeks, that's when they taste the best.
