#### OFF TO THE ORIENT

The evening of April 30, 1964 — a reunion was held in the Blue Room of the International Airport Hotel in Los Angeles. We met many of the people who were taking the square dance tour as well as some of our friends who were on the European trip. Unfortunately, some were unable to make the Orient vacation this year. How wonderful to meet them again. It's surprising how perfect strangers can become good friends on a three week tour.

At 10 A.M. May 1st, 76 happy square dancers left Los Angeles by jet and landed in Tokyo, 12% hours later.

Eleven days were spent in Japan visiting Tokyo, Nikko, Miyanosito, Kyoto, Kobe, Takamatsu and Osaka. We travelled by bus, train and once by steamer across the Inland Sea from Kobe to Takamatsu. We found the Japanese people to be very friendly and groups of children followed us about, requesting our autographs. We were greatly impressed by the 700 year old bronze image of the Great Buddah which stands 42° 6" high.

While in Tokyo we had dinner at the famous Mikada Theatre Restaurant where we enjoyed a Geisha Show and a sukuyaki dinner served by the geisha girls.

We toured the countryside one day and saw the land being prepared for the planting of rice seedlings. We were thrilled by the grandeur of Mt. Fuji and will long remember our night's stay in a Japanese lnn where we removed our snoes before entering and slept on the floor. We even mastered the art of eating with chop sticks.

We can timagine any group of dancers getting a greater reception than we received at our first dance given by the Japanese and American G.I. square dancers. As we entered the school, they formed two lines, zigzagging around the room. We had to pass through the lines and after they greeted us, we danced to our callers and (believe it, or not) to a young Japanese lad who could not speak our language. He had purchased a record which he had memorized.

Reluctantly, we left the friendly Japanese people and headed for Bangkok, Singapore, Hong Kong, the Philippines and Honolulu. More about these exciting spots next month. See you then, we hope.

FEDERATION DELEGATES CLOSE OUT THE YEAR - ELECT OFFICERS TO CARRY ON Final meeting of the year under the leadership of Jim Higgins as executive secretary was held on June 16, 1964.

Higgins announced that Lou and Lillian Stork had consented to act as co-chairman with the Dance-O-Rama chairman of \*65, Don and Norma Weekes, to understudy the operation in order to serve as chairman in \*66. The Storks were selected from a list of several candidates presented by member delegates at an earlier meeting.

A special committee of Charlie Tucker and Jim Shear presented a draft of a proposed amendment to the constitution pertaining to control of financial obligations incurred by federation committees. After discussion, it was moved to table the matter for the next board of delegates to ponder.

Higgins also presented a slate of candidates for the offices of Executive Secretary, Bill and Pepper Bibler of the Irondequoit Squares; Secretary, Dick and Mary Blind of Country Twirlers; Treasurer, Don and Dottie Clark of Genesee Dancers. No other nominations were made so the above were voted into office effective July 1, 1964.

A letter of application for membership from the Boots in Slippers Club of Hilton was read and voted upon favorably. This new admission to our Federation makes ten clubs total membership.

The Board of Delegates also voted to give a monetary gift to each of the three staff members of PROMENADER, Lew Dietz, Bill Harvey and Bill Bibler.

Higgins again expressed the thanks of all Rochester's square dancers to the 1964 Dance-O-Rama committee for a superb job. In addition, he thanked Secretary Lorene Phillips and Treasurer Al Fiege for their 100% efforts to make this closing season a successful one.

After a review of the financial matters of the Federation account and the PROMENADER account. Jim Shear introduced a popular motion that the meeting be adjourned and the fiscal year closed out with a cup of coffee. All were "Aye" in favor.
