## DELEGATES WORK HARD

At a well-run and efficiently organized business meeting, club delegates to the Rochester Area Federation of Western Round and Square Dance Clubs convened at Cutler Union on Tuesday, Sept. 29 for their first get-together of the new season.

Executive Secretary Bill Bibler, in his welcoming talk, thanked the members for their 100% attendance and proceeded to outline the rules and regulations that would be strictly adhered to in carrying on the business of the meetings. He also stressed informality in discussions and urged the delegates to vote as representatives of their clubs and not as individuals.

Minutes of the last meeting in June were read by Secretary Mary Blind; Treasurer Don Clark also made his report-at the moment, the Federation is solvent. Both statements were approved.

An application for admission to the Federation was received from the Triggers, a square dance club that has been in existence since January 1963.

Several letters were read and among them was one from Travelling Caller, Jack Livingston, asking for dance dates. Another from the Rochester Callers Association over the name of President Bill Bartsch suggesting areas of cooperative exploration in the promotion of square dancing in the area.

These and other matters were tabled temporarily because of the important urgency of Dance-O-Rama problems.

Don Weekes, chairman of the 1965 Dance-O-Rama, brought the Federation members up-to-date on this annual affair which will be held April 3, 1965 at Vince's 50 Acres on

West Henrietta Road.

Four travelling callers have been hired: Dick Enderle, Kansas City, Missouri; Bern Aubuchon, St. Louis, Missouri; Gloria Rios, Westfield, Mass. and Ben Baldwin, Champaign, Ill. Charlie and Perkie Tucker have again agreed to teach and supervise the round dancing.

The capacity for the facility is 850 dancers at the most. In 1964, the Dance-O-Rama attracted just about 1000 dancers so that ticket sales must be limited. There will be no limit on dinner tickets.

Up to now there has been a three man committee: Don & Norma Weekes, chairman; Lou & Lillian Stork, vice-chairman (who will be chairman in 1966) and John and Jean Muench, caller chairman. However, on Don Weekes' asking, the following committees and their sponsoring clubs were selected:

Treasurer, Don & Dottie Clark; Callers, Rochester Rollaways; House, Country Twirlers and Boots 'N Slippers; Dancing Conditions and Equipment, Lima Grand Squares; Decorations, Irondequoit Squares; Tickets, Swinging Eights; Printing, EKC-O Squares; Dinner, Genesee Dancers and Publicity, Belles 'N Beaus.

Lou Stork reported on his activities for '66 Dance-O-Rama. After contacting various locations, he had narrowed his selections to Bishop Kearney High School, East and Ben Franklin High Schools and Vince's 50 Acres. It was deemed necessary because of future commitments that a choice be made at this meeting. After deliberation, the delegates again chose Vince's 50 Acres.

The next meeting of the Federation will be held on Tuesday, October 27.

## OFF TO THE ORIENT

### 2nd Installment

We arrived in Bangkok at 9:30 P.M., May 12, 1964. It was so hot aboard the plane, we felt it must have been afire. It was really frightening.

Next morning we took a trip on the Chao Phraya River, where life has changed very little over the past 100 years. Tiny sampans were afloat, the occupants hawking everything from needles to babies' teething rings. There were many of these craft and once we noticed a floating restaurant with charcoal broilers emitting spicy aromas. Others were occupied by merchants selling tropical fruits, rice cakes, banana leaves and flowers. A modern motor launch occasionally passed us as we stopped at various stilted houses to pick up the youngsters who were going to school.

The river is the market place as well as the local highway and is used for bathing, laundry, cooking etc. Canal-side babies must learn to swim as quickly as they learn to walk. We both felt this canal trip was the outstanding point of interest in the entire tour.

In the evening we went to a typical Thai restaurant where we enjoyed a good dinner and the dancing of the Thai Dancers. We later went shopping and I purchased some of the Thai dolls for my collection.

Our next stop was Singapore where we were guests for just one day at the Raffles Hotel, a real luxurious place.

On May 17 we left for Hongkong and attended a flower show, later touring the Island and dining at the Aberdeen Sea Palace, a floating restaurant.

After one of the days of sight-seeing we returned to our hotel and stopped in the cocktail lounge where some of the guests were dancing. Bob Van Antwerp, our caller, persuaded the manager to let us show them something about square dancing. We promptly formed a couple of sets and really did a job.

Arriving in the Philippine Islands on May 21, we went to a square dance in the evening. It was almost too hot to dance but we thoroughly enjoyed meeting and dancing with the Filipino people. May 23rd we left

on a hydrofoil boat trip to Corregidor where we took pictures of the ruins. Later that afternoon we left for Honolulu. Upon our arrival we were presented with orchid leis by the square dancers and on May 24 we danced with 30 squares. Had a wonderful time and regretted leaving the following day for the U.S.A.

The Bill Biblers, Don Clarks and Dick Blinds, officers of the Federation, were hosts to the Presidents of the 10 area clubs at an unprecedented joint discussion meeting concerning the present and future problems of square dancing in this area.

The talk assumed a panel routine with Executive Secretary Bill Bibler guiding the questions and answers. Type and rate of growth of square dancing in our area; should more positive action be taken to stimulate interest such as, a program with local industries to support instruction classes--these were typical of some of the topics.

The subject of Dance-O-Rama was discussed quite fully: time and space problems; consideration of a different approach relative to including the new graduates with the more experienced dancers; should the Federation sponsor two dances, one a graduation dance for all club class graduates and then a dance for the more experienced dancers at a different time of year.

Also a lively interest was shown for the coordination of dance dates for Travelling Callers to prevent possible conflicts with scheduled dances of other clubs.

These and similar problems were discussed frankly and honestly by all participants in this new approach to the furtherance of closer relationship among the clubs.
