PROMENADER ended its third year of publishing with the September 1965 issue.

Even as you read this article, dedicated dancers, acting as club subscription chairmen, are beating the bushes to get the remewals coming in early and in quantity. This year, we're going to put the pressure on—we want 100% subscription response from dancers who are members of clubs who are members of our Federation.

So, let's look at this PROMENADER bit, where did it come from, etc. We would say that Ralph Weber, while serving as Executive Secretary of the Federation, "fathered" the project. Through his leadership the project was accepted by the Board of Delegates and it was agreed that the Federation would underwrite the expense of publication, paying whatever expenses that occurred not covered by subscription money. A few chance remarks at a few dances here and there resulted in "midwifes" Dietz and Bibler becoming editors,

From the very start, PROMENADER has been able to pay its own way. The costs of printing actually are in excess of money collected from subscriptions. We need one to two ads each issue to carry our own. We have attempted, each year, to bring an expanded paper to our readers without raising the subscription cost of \$1,50.

Costs of the process include paying a typist to prepare the multilith masters, printing, collating, folding and stapling charges; mailing. The staff is voluntary,

- 5 8 Side, Close, Fwd, -; Side, Close, Thru, -; Turn Two-Step; Turn Two-Step;
- 9 -16 Repeat Meas 1-8 but end in Bfly-Pos M facing wall.
- 17-20 Side, Close, Side Turn; Side, Close, Side, Turn; Roll, -, 2, -; 3, -, Back, -;
- 21-24 Back, Close, Fwd, -; Side, Close, Thru, -; Turn Two-Step; Turn Two-Step;
- 25-32 Repeat Meas 17-24 End SCP.

Dance entire dance thru twice then meas. 1-16, step apart and point.


