FEDERATION DELEGATES MEET... WIND UP '66 D-O-R, LOOK AHEAD TO '67

John Hendron, Jim Brower and "Red" Bates will call for the 1967 Dance-O-Rama. A fourth caller will be selected soon.

This was made official by '67 Dance-O-Rama Chairmen, Ambrose and Dorothy Baker, at a well attended meeting of the Federation Delegates at the Echo Club on May 17th.

Ken Schreib, Executive Secretary of the Federation, presided and called on 1966 D-O-R Chairmen, Lou and Lillian Stork, for a report on the area's most recent successful all day venture.

Lou was well pleased with the turnout of 1,080 dancers with approximately 250 of this number coming from out of town. This was an improvement over the 850 in 1965 (because of limited space) and equaled the 1964 event held at Kodak Park.

Many Buffalo guests, in complimenting the Storks and their committees, were impressed with the smooth machinery and enthusiastic cooperation of all concerned. They wondered why the people in their area had never been able to successfully launch a festival such as ours. As Jackie Gleason would say, "How sweet it is!"

Because Bishop Kearney High School appears to be the site for the '67 dance, Lou pointed out that the few bugs of this year's festival can be more easily overcome, such as the necessity for a parking committee, inter-com for announcements and name badges for out-of-town guests.

According to Treasurer Ollie and Grace Perry, the financial results of the D-O-R were satisfactory. Did you know that a budget of over \$3,000 is required to operate this one day show? The Perrys mentioned that \$72.00 was collected for the Helping Hand Fund to be sent to the survivors of the Swing-Ezy Club in Keokuk, Iowa.

The Federation Delegates approved the selection of Bill and Pepper Bibler, Irondequoit Squares President, as Co-Chairmen for the '67 Dance-O-Rama. The Biblers will serve as Chairmen in 1968.

The Sing-A-Long Club, which previously had applied for membership in the Federation, withdrew their application for the present time.

An amendment to the Federation constitution changing the maximum amount of money to be retained in the treasury from \$100 to \$500 was defeated.

In accordance with the delegates' wishes at a

previous meeting, Chairman Schreib announced that he has chosen and is now in consultation with lawyer Arthur Chatman, in regard to the legal aspects of Federation business and organization.

New Federation officers for the coming fiscal year will be elected at the next meeting. Executive Secretary Schreib appointed a nominating committee headed by Howard and Arlene Newton, Boots 'n Slippers, who will choose the other two members of the committee.

The final business meeting of the year will be held at the Echo Club in mid-June, the actual date to be announced later.

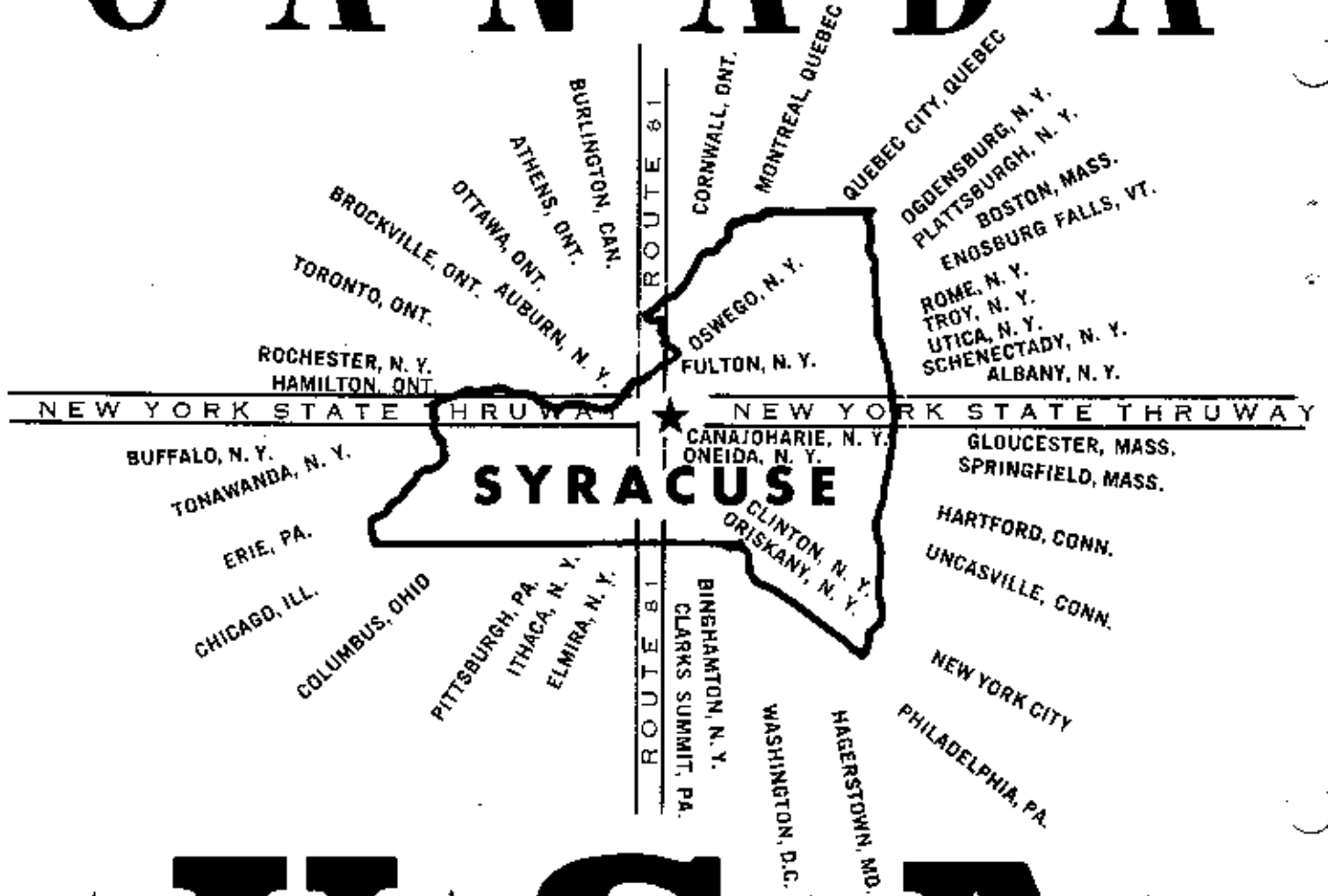

COUNTRY TWIRLERS

Dear God, give me the sight not to see the mistakes of others...only my own. Here is a little prayer quite apropos to square dancing that we'd like to share with you. There were times during the Dance-O-Rama when we wished we had included it in our April article.
