SPOT LIGHT ON SQUARE DANCING IN BUFFALO

This is the first of a planned series to bring to our readers informative reviews of the square dance movement as it exists in various areas near to Rochester. While we have attempted to secure accurate information from a variety of written and personal sources, some inaccuracies are bound to creep in. We would gladly print corrections received from our readers at any time.....The Editors.

Square dancing in Buffalo began to emerge about 25 years ago when Herb Suedmeyer was doing all the latest calls, Eastern style. Herb and his wife, Lou, have left a permanent mark on the area's growth into Western style dancing. He is now deceased but Lou still maintains some activity with various groups. Western style was actually introduced through the efforts of Anne Barbour who located in Buffalo from Scotland. On a western trip, she picked up the "western" style, brought it back east with her and, with her native ability, she taught a small church group.

Eventually, Herb Suedmeyer was to call a one night stand for this group and Anne had her pupils demonstrate the western style. Her next attended a calling school run by Al Brundage and western square dancing in Buffalo was on its way

The early club activity centered around the Stylist Squares whose membership included Mike Stark, Jerry Reynolds, Art Harris, John Staby, Buddy Stewart and others whose names are now familiar as callers. The period of 1956-58 saw these dancers establish themselves as callers, adding the name of Don Duffin to their rosters Buffalo Squares, now 12 years old, began to draw dancers from Rochester.

The Western New York Federation of Round and Square Dance Clubs, Inc. was established in the 1957-58 period with a membership of eleven clubs, including Rochester's Genesee Dancers and Belle 'n Beaus. The late George Kerridge served as delegate to the Buffalo Federation at that time.

In 1966, the Federation has a membership of 24 clubs; four of these are round dance clubs, six are dancer operated clubs and eighteen are caller operated clubs. There are about 3 clubs in the area which do not have Federation membership.

Member clubs are represented by one person acting as a voting delegate to the Federation. There is also a one person alternate to represent the club in the absence of the voting delegate.

RICHMOND NEWS REPORTER INTERVIEWS THE TUCKERS

In the October 29, 1966 issue of the Richmond Times Dispatch, columnist Emma Livingstone interviewed Rochester's Charlie and Perkie Tucker as they served as Associate Staff member at the 11th Annual Richmond Square and Round Dance Festival.

Talking to the Tuckers as they arrived for a workshop in the Roof Garden Ballroom of the Hotel John Marshall, the reporter was filled in on the benefits of the round and square dance activities by Charlie.

"We'll probably be ready for retirement in about 10 years and we believe we have a hobby we can take anywhere in the United States and we will be able to find places to dance and people we know," commented Charlie. Perkie added, "And when we get too old to dance, we'll probably sit on the sidelines and watch."

The Tuckers who admit to being in their 50s, learned to square dance about 15 years ago while living in Philadelphia.

"We were strangers, and lonesome, and needed to meet people," Perkie said. "So, I came home and found myself enrolled in a class," added Charlie. "We've been dancing ever since and thru the years have met some wonderful and fascinating people."

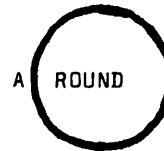
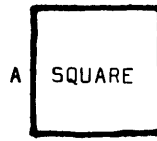
Charlie and Perkie were first introduced to their first love, round dancing, by the nation-

nationally. These figures were taken from a survey of 330 callers across the country.

Slide thru (95-100%), Round Off (60-70%), Turn Thru (60-65%), Dixie Spin (40-45%), and Alamo Circulate (40-45%). All of these figures were expected to be doing well nationally by the local callers with the exception of the Alamo Circulate which may rate another look. This one was a surprise to many of us since most callers had treated it as a gimmick and stopped using it.

Dixie Spin -- This is a combination call of dixie style and spin the top. The call was written by Chuck Raley of Lakewood, California in February 1966.

Definition: the designated persons give a right, pull by, turn the one you meet by the left, as to go into a dixie style ocean wave. Centers swing right 3/4, ends move up 1/4.

Head ladies lead to a "Dixie Spin", then slide thru and star thru would be a zero movement bringing you back to original starting position.

Dixie Turn Thru -- This is a combination call of Dixie Chain and Turn Thru. As you might expect, it can easily be confused with the above call, Dixie Spin. This call was written by our own area caller, Dan Dedo, of North Tonawanda, N. Y.

Definition: Girls (or men) start a Dixie Chain. However, the men instead of following their partner all the way thru as in a regular dixie chain, do a "Turn Thru" and follow the girl that was originally opposite them.

This call should rate a second look for no other reason than the fact that it was written by a local boy and is now in the hands of callers across the country. It works real well in the cloverleaf and roundoff patterns which are presently much used in our square dance choreography. If you haven't heard much of it, it's probably because it is hot off the press, so to speak, being in the November issue of Callers Material.

Officers of the Federation are elected from delegate membership. In contrast with our Rochester group, the Buffalo Federation incorporated immediately because of the apparent protection from liabilities, etc.

Buffalo's square dance newspaper, Script-0-Squares appeared in 1959 and has always been ably edited by Herb and Monica Seitz. In 1960, the Federation voted its cooperation with the publishing and decided that S-0-S would be sent out on a subscription basis. Subscription cost is \$1.50 per year, six issues, and is mailed First Class to approximately 550 subscribers.

See advertisement elsewhere in this issue for information regarding an upcoming subscription dance to be held in January.

At this time, the Federation does not sponsor an area wide annual dance festival similar to our Rochester Dance-0-Rama. In past years, however, it has provided several March of Dimes dances, six summer festivals and two winter festivals.

The callers and teachers in the area are formed in the Western New York Callers and Leaders Association which is about as old as the dancers' Federation. At this time, there are about 30 members with most of the callers in the area maintaining membership.

We salute the square dancers of Buffalo whose efforts fostered our own Rochester dancing.

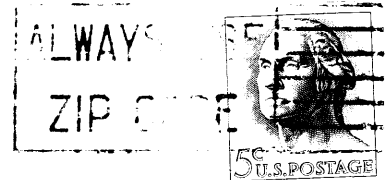
