

Burgundy Caterers supplied an excellent and plentiful buffet supper for 370 diners with all the food you could eat.


Financially, we made out fine, so we feel you will all agree that it was a tremendous success!

CUES-N-CALLS
By Don Kennedy

It has been suggested to us that some of you might be interested to know how a caller, for anyone else, gets a new movement into national publication.

The path of a "sudden idea" from a caller is a God-forsaken hamlet, to a movement that thrills the crowds in a ballroom in Washington or Philadelphia is not the long, cubersome one that you might think.

There are many national clearing houses of ideas. They are scattered from East Lynn, Mass. to Los Angeles, Calif. One particular "center" is the Akron, Ohio Workshop Group, run by Willard Orlich. Willard, surprisingly, is not a caller. He calls himself a choreographer. His subscription list reads like a who's who in square dancing, many of whom are travelling nationally. I might also add that these same callers are subscribing to other sources of material, thus keeping the "centers" honest. By this, I mean that if two sources come out in the same month with the same call, using two different names, the result is a flood of mail to both, which usually will result in a compromise name.

When the caller in Timbuktu gets his branstorm and christens a new call, he will generally write it in with examples of how it is used to all his material sources. In the case of Wiltard Orlich, an idea is screened as to legality within the accepted framework. Name confusion, similarity and duplication is tested. If it passes these and seems like a basically good idea, it is actually danced by the workshop group. Here it is tested to see how easily it can be taught, how it dances, how it fits with present day choreography, whether or not it creates enthusiasm, and how adaptable it is in different set-ups and situations.

If the movement is used by the workshop group, all these things are reported the following month to the subscribers, pro and con. Let's go back and take an idea like Spin the Top. This was picked up by the local callers and taught in their workshop sessions. The travelling callers soon realized that they no longer had to teach it at the dances when they wanted to use it because it was being used locally. Soon after, it began to show up in singing calls, and a new basic was born.

This is approximately the route that new ideas take. The time elapsed between the idea and the national exposure is about two months. Some calls flower and die, others stand the test of usage and remain to become basics. At the end of each subscription year, the Akron Group, prints a list based on a survey of subscribers, as to which movements are blooming and which are dying nationally.

Random observations on the 9th Annual Dance-O-Rama.

There was a time when it was considered impolite to walk inrough the center of a square dance set. At one point early in the evening, so many people walked through our set I thought we had squared up on the corner of Main and Clinton during the Christmas rush.

As usual, we had challenge and relaxed dancing. The biggest challenge in either hall at night was trying to find room for a set. To prepare for Dance-O-Rama 1968, squeeze a set into a telephone booth. When you can get through a whole tip without knocking the phone off the hook, you're ready.

It's had to believe that at the first Dance-O-Rama, even in the challenge hall, we danced all day and night without a single Ocean Wave, Swing Through, Star Thru, Eight Chain Thru, Circulate, Trade, Substitute, Dixie Daisy, Tea Cup Chain or Round Off. But the call "Swing Your Partner" went over big that year.

Since the call "load the Boat" came out, I've sunk more boats than the whole German U-Boat fleet in World War II. Dance-U-Rama simply added to my record. I'll be glad when that call goes the way of the equally directional "Shoot the Moon" and "Bucket of Worms" of a few years back.

The big difference between your first and your 9th Dance-O-Rama: At your first Dance-O-Rama, you wish you could do everything the caller is calling, and you get frustrated when you can't. At your 9th Dance-O-Rama, you still can't do everything the caller is calling, but you welcome the rest between allemande lefts.
