"CHICK" WOLFE SETS GOALS FOR DELEGATES

Presiding as Executive Secretary, "Chick" Wolfe, Swingin' Eights, lost no time in outlining his goals for the present Federation Board of Delegates at the first, organizational meeting held on September 26 at the Echo Club.

In answer to the question: "What does the Federation do?", Chick pointed out that it sponsors the Dance-C-Rama and PROMENADER, both significant contributions to Rochester square dancing, and both of invariable high quality. But, it was added, both of these are done outside the Federation framework and little else of significance has been done by the Federation itself.

"I feel that we can and should take a much more active part in support of the purposes of this organization as stated in our constitution, the primary purpose being to 'promote interest in Western style round and square dance'."

An effective Federation has been hampered by several things. The concern that it would destroy the autonomy of the member clubs is not a small one. Such concern is quite evident in the constitution statement that, "the Federation shall have no voice in the internal affairs of a member club". An unnatural apprehension about such domination has been only to our detriment.

Contributing further has been the reluctance of delegates to commit themselves to a position without first consulting with their sponsoring clubs. Such may be in order from time to time on issues of major consequence, but, continued delaying of decisions leads to lack of positive action. Complete rapport between delegates and their clubs is a prerequisite.

Indifference, particularly of club officers, toward the Federation contributes to a "do-nothing" Federation.

In order to give the Federation more time to think and act on important issues, I plan to establish standing committees as follows, whose responsibility will be to study issues in detail, present proposals and to take action where necessary: 1) a constitution committee, 2) a publicity committee, 3) a finance committee, 4) a club coordination and relations committee, 5) a dancer retention committee and 6) a social committee.

These committees will give us the capabilities of studying problems in depth on a continuing basis to enable us to have motions concerning major policies or actions presented as the result of some previous serious study of the question. It should be our goal to be an effective force serving Rochester's square dancers.

Round Dancing for the Square Dancer . . . For the past four years, the round dance leaders of our area, with the help of dancer couples from different clubs, have selected four rounds a season, primarily for the square dance clubs. These are simple rounds that most folks can do who have had some introduction to the basic round dance steps.

We, as a part of this movement, feel that simple basics, perhaps by a mixer introduced to a dancer at his square dance lessons, gives him a chance to feel what this part of the program is all about. The clubs who do this have their dancers participate in this at an earlier date.

Our belief is that these dances should be cued so as not to discourage the dancer by his feeling that he has to memorize each routine. Some disagree, but it is only because our memories are short, and we tend to forget how we felt when we first started to round dance.

From our experience, if we know the dance we shut out the cues, and hear them not; but they should be there if needed and most dancers do need them.

All of us do not have the time to practice the dances except at the clubs and we feel that cueing here is "a must". No one wants to make this activity a memory test if it is to be a pleasure.

. . . . Fwd two-step and happy dancing.

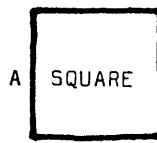

Our Christmas party will be on Dec. 8 at the Penn Yan Grange. This will be a dinner dance and promises to be a grand evening.

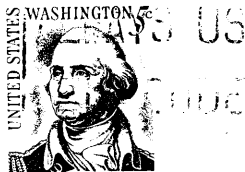
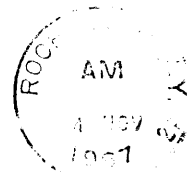
