## FEDERATION FACTS

The purpose, aims and operational mechanics of the Rochester Area Federation of Round and Square Dance Clubs Inc. are embodied in its Constitution and By Laws. PROMENADER has chosen some of the more pertinent Articles and condensed them so that members of the affiliated clubs would be better informed about the general workings of their Federation.

## PURPOSE

1 - To provide information about and promote interest in Western Style Round and Square Dancing through such activities as may be expedient to the Board of Delegates.
2 - To operate as a service organization in coordinating Club activities.
3 - The Federation shall have no voice in the internal affairs of a Member Club.
4 - No part of the net earnings or income of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of any private shareholder or member or individual. Upon the dissolution of the corporation or the winding up of its affairs, the assets of the corporation shall be distributed exclusively to the affiliated clubs.

## AFFILIATION AND MEMBERSHIP

1 - Any square or round dance club that supports the objectives of this corporation is eligible for affiliation with the corporation, provided that the club-
a. Meets regularly at least 8 times a year.
b. Is governed by officers elected by the club membership.
c. Has the power to contract and discharge all of its callers.
d. Has been organized and dancing at least oneyear. e. Shall operate without profit to any individual.

2 - Election to affiliation shall be by ballot of the Federation. Such an approved club shall be known as an affiliated club, and shall be authorized to delegate two couples as members of the Federation. The terms of membership for the two member couples shall be for two years and staggered so that one term of membership shall expire every year.

## BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The affairs and business of this Corporation shall be administered by a Board of Directors consisting of the five Officers of the Corporation.

## OFFICERS

The officers of this Corporation shall be a President, a Vice- President, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary and a Treasurer.

An officer shall have been a member of the Federation during the year immediately preceding his term of office. No officer shall succeed himself in the same office.

## FINANCE

A - The initial membership fee for newly affiliated clubs shall be ten dollars. The annual dues shall be five dollars payable by October 31.
B - The fiscal year shall be from August 1 through July 31.
C - Affiliated clubs shall share equal responsibility for underwriting all deficits of the Federation.

"Don't push the new dancers!" This is a comment that I make every year in every class. These people came because you led them
here, but they didn't come to be pushed.
I realize that at times it is difficult for an experienced dancer to stand there and watch the neophyte struggle through a new figure (to him). There is always the tendency to give a gentle shove in the right direction. But if we continue to shove and push the new dancer, one of these things will happen: l- He will lose any confidence he has in his own abilities and rely on experienced dancers to push him along, 2-He will become disgusted and quit, 3- Will not get the full enjoyment of his accomplishmints.

Sometimes the best way we can help new dancers is not to help them. Then they have no choice but to rely on their ears, to hear exactly how he is supposed to move. His sense of accomplishment will be fulfilled, and he is ready to cross the next barrier.

If you want to help, offer encouragement, not instruction to the new dancer. You have hired, what you feel to be, a competent instructor for your class. Let him tell the new dancer where to go and how to get there. Chances are that coming from him it will seem like fun. And the new dancer will be sure of himself.

One other thing, don't scare the beginner. He is worried enough about how he will stack up compared to the others in the class. Tell him how good he is doing, and how much you will enjoy dancing with him in the club. Let him know that you want him, but don't make him think he will have to go through fires of Hell to get there. Get him to believe in himself, and you will have a friend for life and a new dancer for a long time.

Everybody does it and $99 \%$ of the experienced dancers can still remember their own beginner days. If you do goof, don't stand there trying to figure out what happened.
