Spring is here! Classes are graduating, and new dancers are entering the clubs. This is going to be my first real serious column. I am taking this opportunity to help the new dancers by putting down a few important rules on the dress and etiquette for square dancers.

Mens Dress

- 1- Shoes necessary, especially if you want to appear gracious in de-feet.
- 2- Belt in most cases necessary to stop a disaster.
- 3- Shirt should have collar and cuffs or both.
- 4- Hair not necessary, but apparently side burns are.
- 5- Hat not necessary, unless you are dancing up a storm.

Ladies' Dress

- 1- Dresses are necessary, mini, maxi or duck.
- 2- Petticoats should show only at the bottom.
- 3- Belt necessary to break up the contours.
- 4- Hair teased or re-teased, on head, any shade.
- 5- Fancy laces- not necessary on shoes without laces.
- 6- Anything else, true or false, should be hidden.

Etiquette

- 1- Don't enter a set that already has four couples unless you intend to round dance.
- 2- Always put your best foot forward, if you have one.
- 3- Don't allemande left your left hand lady if she is right handed.
- 4- Don't bow to your partner unless you are facing her.
- 5- Don't goof up a set unless you know what you are doing.
- 6- Don't imitate the caller he is supposed to stand still.
- 7- Don't star thru with your left foot.
- 8- Don't whistle for your corner if he or she is out of position. Call them gently. Say, "Hey Gently, commere."
- 9- Don't walk out of a set, unless the other three couples leave you standing alone.
- 10- Don't talk during a dance unless you can hear what you are saying, that way you won't offend anyone else.

If you follow these rules, you will never go wrong more than once, $\ensuremath{\mathbb{I}}$ think.

To the new dancers: Don't believe all you hear about me. Nobody, but nobody, could dance that lousy. Thanks, anyway,

A Letter To The Editors

PROTEST TIME, or YOU CAN ALWAYS TELL A SQUARE DANCER.... BUT, YOU CAN'T TELL HIM MUCH.

It's about time that square dancers woke up to the facts about the SYSTEM of "processing" new dancers. Eight years ago we tried to learn 20 basics in 15 or 20 lessons. Today the instructor must force-feed 80 basics in 20 or 30 short lessons. Four times the material in double the time or less. The instructor's role is a Judas goat leading the flock to an activity promising fun and relaxation but which turns into a cram course in TRANSIENT VACABULARY.

Todays classes spawn two types of dancers. Those deluged with much vocabulary, poorly learned, who drop out in large numbers because nobody wants to dance with a dum-dum who doesn't dance properly. Then those who are properly taught but can't bridge the vocabulary and experience gap between class and club. Club members tolerate them for awhile to "bring them along" or just simply leave for a dance situation where they don't have to "drag the raw meat around."

I agree it's no fun to constantly retrogress each time a new group joins the "club". However, expecting the new dancer to perform at an achievement level we arrived at after 2 to 10 years, is insanity bordering on idiocy. Send your 5th grader to compete in college and you are acting as sensibly. Unlike bowling or golf, you cannot "handicap" a dancer to make it more interesting. Isn't it time the CLUBS woke up to the fact that the system presently used needs revising? You must let the new dancer develop long enough to reach the general achievement level, or remain at "his own" level without going back to "beginners" class.

In Rochester where the club callers use material lifted HOT OFF THE WORKSHOP SHEETS, you must groom the new dancers for SURVIVAL. How many times have you danced WHEEL THRU, GRAND STROLL, SHOOT THE MOON, SQUARE CHAIN THRU SWOP AROUND, ROTATE THE LINE, CENTERS THRU AND CLOSE THE GATE, EXPLODE THE LINE and LOAD THE BOAT at the club you belong to which sponsors a beginners class?

Recruit dancers without promising "club membership ONLY after finishing basics" (whether you know them or not). Extend club membership and provide successive opportunities to gradually attain each achievement level in the same unhurried manner the 10 year dancer has done. It won't take 10 years, but it does take more than "30 lessons". It would also eliminate the "dropping of level" and give the instructor the option of suggesting the next step-up be delayed for some. Too, a couple who has had to take a sabbatical would have a place to review and learn the very few movements which stick, without the ego shattering experience of joining the beginners.

A beginner insulted or humiliated is forever lost; the fault not being with the injurer but with the system which graduates everyone regardless of capability to withstand the grist mill of today's requirements. Beginners are still the lifeblood of square dancing; don't keep spilling this lifeblood as you now are doing.
