After only six years of working with square dance beginners, it is possible to see "types" emerge from the group. Dynamic types who plunge in and get involved, usually ending up as club officers or honchoing the various committees. The "sleepers" who start off shy or unsure and gradually emerge into the realm of contributing to the club activities. There are the "hangers-on" who come and go with little or no participation or involvement. Isn't it great that we have all types or we would have all chiefs and no indians. The square dance activity is broad enough and flexible enough to accomodate all the types; challenge dancers, fun level dancers, intermediate level and high intermediates, call it what you may.

An even greater variation exists in dancing styles depending on the mood of the moment or the personalities involved in a particular square. Of course the instructors would like to see everyone dance the way they were taught, with due regard for the comfort and considerations of others. Yet there exists a need for enthusiasm's outlet. Callers spring from a breed who have a "hey, look at me!" complex. They can't stand letting the other guy have the limelight. BUT they earn the right by investing time, money and total involvement to becoming the man behind the mike. Those not wishing to make the total commitment frequently succumb to this same desire to stand out in a crowd by adding flourishes, twirls, high kicks, etc. These cute variations are picked up at conventions and square dance festivals where individual expressions of enthusiasm spawned them. Absolutely nothing wrong with it when executed skillfully and everyone in your square is going along with it.

Of course, square dance purists, of which callers comprise the largest group, tend to interpret these variations as an insult. Why hire a caller to call a dance if you are going to make up your own? Why teach basics uniformly throughout the world if see-saw means six different things to six different couples? The answer is individualism. Individual needs for expression within a broad framework of conformity.

The KEY to the whole approach is not to infringe on the rights of those sharing your square. Just

as the mediocre caller does not gain the wholehearted approval of the square dance population because of his ineptness of doing his thing, so too, the inept, bumbling dancer poorly (and literally) executing the variations of the basics deserves the frowns they receive in their square. You can't change people, they resist conformity. The surest way to failure is to try to please everyone or make them conform rigidly.

"Express" yourself if you must, but not at the expense of others. Self expression is important, why else RING-A-DING DING DO YOUR OWN THING?

They have four children; Carol Ann, 17; Melinda, 14; Alan, 10 and Eliot, 7. They family enjoys camping and travelling.



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
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Rochester Rollaways
